When the wheat markets during the week ended January 29 have been less one sided than previous weeks. There have been some reactions, such as are generally expected no matter how strong the undertone may appear. These reactions may be of short duration. It is true the production of the wheat growing countries has been enormous, but in gute of the high level of prices large sales at the scalourd are being made, and exporters continue to buy our futures, takink advantage of the break in prices which occur. The cercorted damage to the American winter wheat by exposure does not appear to have any influence on prices as yet.

Outs Gats prices have remained quote sleady during the week, and anything in the way of cash offerings is easily disposed of.

Bartey Barley prices are 2 is lower than a week ago, with little business being done. Flax flax prices closed 2 is lower than a week ago. The amount of trading in flax futures is small, and at the present high level, prices are easily influenced by small buying or selling pressing.

The movement of grain during the past week has been limited and difficult owing to the sewere storms. Country vosits are almost impassable and the railway companies can scarcely operate their passenger trains on account of the heavy snowfalls.

Cattle—Receipts have been very small on account of the very stormy weather so that local demand has tended to make all butcher cattle self strong at last week's prices. Best butcher steers are selling at \$7.25 to \$2.50 and odd bunches of the best trach even \$7.75. Hest beifers are around 7 cents. Bulls and oven are steady. As long as the supply keeps light the price will stay good, but any heavy rush would undoubtedly depress prices. There is a good enquiry for storkers and feeders, but very little of this class is coming to large.

10 hand Hogs have been scarce. Local packers have a offering 9 cents all week, but haven't bought many selects at that figure. Most shipments sold for \$9.10. Sows sell at from \$6.75 to \$7.25, and light pigs at from \$7.25 to \$8.00.
