TALK OF THE AND OF THE. INCREASE FISH STOCK IN ONTARIO WATERS. The Department of Game and Fisheries has this year made a greater effort than ever before to increase the fish stock in Ontario waters. Three times more spawn urds than in previous years have been placed in the lakes and rivers.
