The Chinese process of printing is ascertained to be as follows: —I hev first write or draw a fair copp of the work intended to be printed; it is then given to the engraver, or more properly the car ver, who gloss the leaves of the manuscript upon a piece of hard board, or plank, properly prepared, on which he traces over with a suitable instrument, the lines of the writing carves out the character in relief, and cuts down the intermediate part of the wroad; therefore the beauty of the letters depends of the person who writes the copy. The adrontuses of the carver is such, that he copies every stroke exterly. How work is sometimes so usually executed, it is difficult to distinguish a book that is written from one which is purioted. The board thus carved or engraved, generally contains the characters for two pages. When the work of the carver is completed, it is taken by the printer, laid level and fixed in that post on. The pointer living provided wift two brushes, he takes that which is hardest, digs it into the ink, and therewith lays the ink on the carved board in such a manner as to have a quantity which will be exactly sufficient for four or five impressions, as he does not link the board for every impression. When the board has received as much ink as the art at judges to be sufficient, he lays on the paper, and with the other brush, which is of an oblong figure, and softer than the first, he presses the paper upon the board, by gently drawing the brush over it, which his little increased for each impression, unfit the ink on the letters is taken off by the paper.
