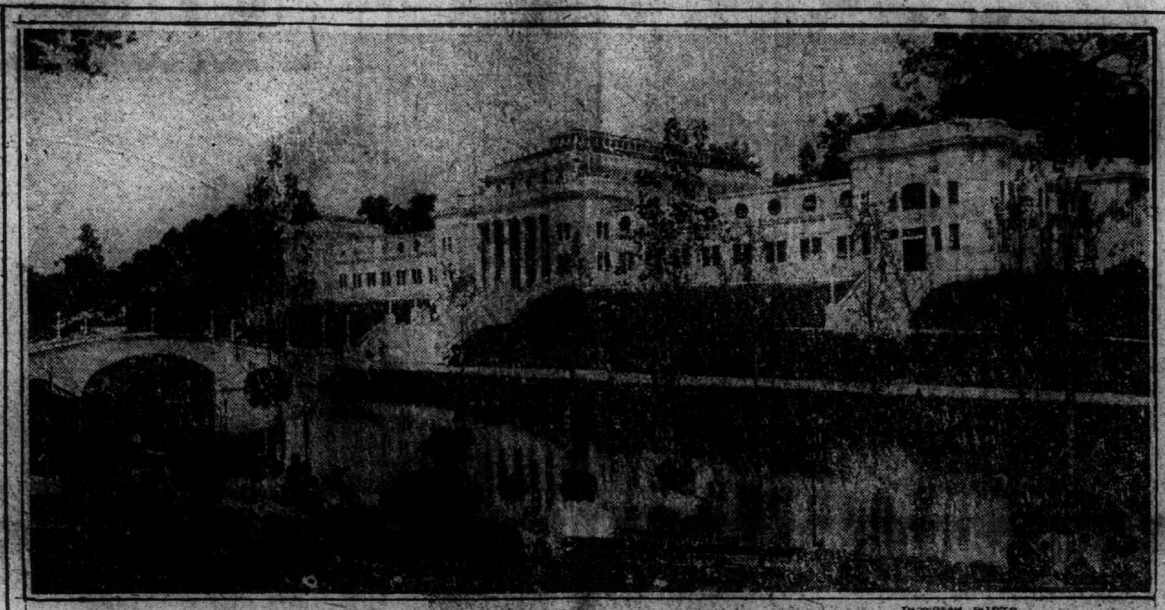

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CARPENTERS WERE AT CONVENTION

A Provincial Conference Was Held in the City on Saturday.

The provincial conference of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters was held in Brantford on Saturday. Delegates were present from various cities and towns, and were enthusiastic over the good work accomplished by the organization.

The question of changing the name to the "Ontario Provincial Conference" was dealt with, many good points in favor of this change were put forth by General Organizer Tom Moore. After a general discussion, the motion was passed.

Reports of delegates as to wages and the hours for journeymen were submitted as follows: Port Colborne—50 hours per week, trade good; 9 hours day, 35c per hour. St. Catharines—Trade good, 40c per hour, 9 hours, 50c per week. Hamilton—50 hours, 8 hour day, 44 hours a week. Conditions fair. North Toronto—45c hour, 8 hours a day, 44 hours week. Niagara Falls—Trade conditions fair. Rate, 45c per hour, 8 hour day, 44 week.

Berlin—Building brisk, 40c per hour, 10 hour day, 50 hour week. Thorold—42-2c per week, 9 hours per day, 54 hours per week. Galt—Trade conditions fair, 35c per hour, 10 hour day, 55 per week. Bridgeport—Building good, trade good, 40c per hour, 9 hour day, 54 per week. Welland—In good shape, trade conditions good, 40c per hour, 9 hours per day.

The following resolution was put and adopted, asking for the resignation of the Hon. F. J. Cochrane, Minister of Railways and Canals: "Whereas the efforts of our organization having so far proved ineffective in having the wages of the government employees in the gate of the Welland Canal raised to standard of the district, and as the same reflects upon the industry of the Dominion Government, which reflects upon the honor of the Dominion Government, therefore be it resolved that the organization call upon the Premier to remove from his position, the Hon. F. J. Cochrane and appoint a man as minister of railways and canals who will act in harmony with the policy of the Government and in sympathy with the workers, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier and the press.

Officers Elected. President—Bro. Wm. Irvine, Toronto. 1st Vice-Pres.—Bro. Abert Blythe, Hamilton. 2nd Vice-Pres.—James Carry, St. Catharines. 3rd Vice-Pres.—Bro. Robt. Cavers, Galt. Sec.-Treas.—Bro. T. Jackson, Toronto.

Mr. Albert Brown was a candidate for third vice-president, and twice the vote was a tie, Mr. Cavers finally winning out. It was moved and passed that the Province of Ontario be divided into five districts and that the officers be elected to act as an executive board. It was moved that the convention be held in the city of St. Catharines.

Company Must Be Responsible. White Star Line Cannot Print Tickets. (Canadian Press Despatch) LONDON, June 30.—The conditions printed on the steamship tickets issued by the White Star Line exempting the company from liability for loss by passengers, even through negligence of the company's servants, is illegal, according to a judgment pronounced today by Sir Clement M. Ballhache, Justice of the King's Bench division of the English High Court of Justice.

The point had been held over for decision from the last case decided last week in which an Irish farmer, Thomas Ryan, was awarded \$3000 and costs against the White Star Co. for the loss of his son in the Titanic disaster.

When the additional machinery is installed a staff of between thirty and forty mechanics will be employed regularly.

Princed Albert at St. Johns. ST. The Prince is scheduled to sail for England on the Cumberland on Wednesday morning.

T. H. & B. USING TELEPHONES NOW. New System is Installed to Facilitate Dispatching of Trains. A telephone system is being installed over the T. H. and B. Railway, which will be used for dispatching, but principally to enable the agents to get in touch quickly with the operating department and the executive offices in Hamilton when necessary. The present telegraph system is not being done away with. Two telephones were installed here Friday, one in the station and the other in the freight office. The telephones are in use at the eastern end of the line from Hamilton to Welland, and the western end of the system will be completed and ready for operation within a week or ten days.
