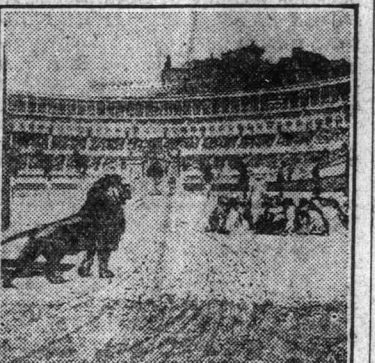

Military Notes

The Dufferin Rifles guard of honor
for the Duke of Connaught will par-
ade to-night at 8 o'clock in full dress.

They will be inspected by Col.
Howard and will without a doubt be
the finest guard ever made up from
the 38th. Dress, black uniform, leg-
gings, Wolsley helmets.

The Recruit class will parade at 8
o'clock for inspection by the Adjut-
ant.

The N. N. O's class will have their
squad drill examination also, to-night.
O. C. O's have so far this season ob-
tained 14 recruits and have several
more in line.

Ontario has the largest representa-
tion for the Dominion of Canada on
the Bisley team as will be seen by the
following:

OTTAWA, Ont., May 8.—The
twenty men who have accepted posi-
tions on the Bisley team represent
the Provinces as follows: Ontario 11;

Quebec 2; Nova Scotia 5; Alberta 2.
Toronto has four representatives,
Hamilton 2, Montreal 2, Guelph 2,
Halifax 3, Ottawa 1, Bowmanville 1,
Truro 1, Alma N. S., 1.

The 48th Highlanders, with three
representatives, has more than any
other military unit.

An old crack shot and a familiar
figure on Wimbledon Common, has
received news of his selection.

Bowmanville, May 8.—Major W.
C. King, paymaster 46th Durham
Regiment, has received a message
from Major R. J. Birwhistle, Secre-
tary of the Dominion Rifle Associa-
tion, Ottawa, stating that Capt. C. R.
Crowe, 30th Regiment Wellington
Rifles, having resigned his place on
the Canadian Bisley team for 1914, he
has been selected to fill the vacancy,
being the first waiting man. Major
King is postmaster here, but hopes
to obtain leave of absence to accom-
pany the Canadian team. Major King
is a familiar figure at the Bisley meet,
having been there once as adjutant
and several times as member of the
team, so that this year will be his

ninth visit to the annual international
rifle competition.

B. C. I. Cadets.

The guard of honor from the B. C.
I. Cadets will be in command of Capt.
Slemm and Lieuts. Buckborough and
Sweet.

The Cadets are drilling hard and
will present a smart appearance on
Saturday afternoon.

The annual inspection of cadets will
be held on 15th. May, when the two
companies will be inspected by Major
Marshall, Inspector of Cadet Corps.

Jottings From Parliament Hill

The Liberal majority in the Senate
is dwindling with gruesome speed. If
as is pretty certain, Mr. Borden ap-
points Conservatives to succeed Sen-
ators Cox, Ross and Gibson, it will be
down to 15, and when the nine new
senators are appointed it will be but
six.

Only two and a half years ago the
Liberal majority in the Upper Cham-
ber was 47. The composition of the
Senate at the 1911 election was: Lib-
erals 66, Conservatives 19, vacancies
2. One of these Liberals, Sir Lyman-
dine, has changed his views. Sir
Melvin-Jones has changed his views.
The oldest Senator is a Conserva-
tive, on C. E. Boucher de Boucherville,
a former Premier of Quebec,
who is 92. It is curious that the next
oldest, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, who is

90, is also a Conservative. They are
youngsters compared with Senator
Wark who died a few years ago at
102.

The long list of Government legis-
lation which Mr. Borden announced
this week would be brought down this
session fairly made the House gasp.
Visions of prorogation on May 20, or
even June 1, faded away.

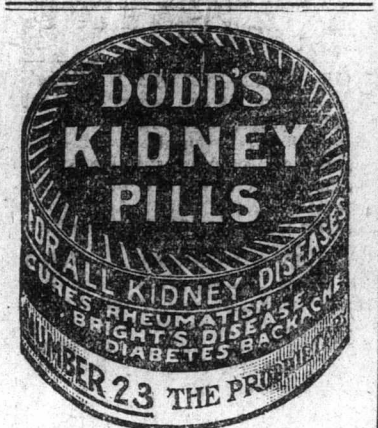
When the Marquis of Lorne was
governor-general from 1878 to 1883,
Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Dr. Sproule
were youngsters in the House. They
are the oldest members of the Com-
mons to-day who were members then.
Several of the Senators were in the
Commons at that time, however: Hon.
Jas. Bolduc, Hon. Wm. McDonald,
Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Hon. James
Dorville, Hon. George Taylor, Speak-
er of the House, and Hon. John Gossigan,
Senators W. J. Macdonald, L. G.
Power and Boucher de Boucherville
were in the Senate.

coast of Mexico.

Prince Alexander of Teck will suc-
ceed the Duke of Connaught as Gov-
ernor-General of Canada.
