Mr. Gerald Ward has been ap-

 R. shops.

Mr. Harry L. Dennison, barrister,
 of Digby, spent a few days of this
 week in town.

The Conservatives will meet at
 Ottawa on February 5th, when a
 leader will be chosen.

The special meeting of the Town
 Council which was called for last
 Wednesday evening was postponed
 until Monday the 21st inst.

A unique feature of Kitchner's
 fighting scouts is the enrolment of
 300 Marabel camp followers for rid-
 ing and leading the spare horses.
 This is likely to renew the color
 agitation.

A large number attended the dance
 given by the Pastime Athletic Club
 in their rooms last Monday evening.
 After several hours of dancing a sup-
 per was partaken, after which the
 company broke up.

Report says that Sir Henry Mc-
 Callum governor of Newfoundland
 will be succeeded by Sir John Brams-
 ton who was chairman of the royal
 commission of enquiry into the
 French shore question in 1898.

The marriage of Foster Blaikie to
 Miss Maggie E. Goode took place at
 Truro on Monday, January 14th.
 Mr. and Mrs. Blaikie came to Ken-
 tville on Monday evening and remain-
 ed here until yesterday, when they
 left for their home in Truro.

Some time ago Gen. DeWet wit-
 nessed the burning of his farm which
 was done by Lord Kitchner's men,
 and since that time the Boer general
 has sworn that he would not give up
 until he himself or Kitchner had
 been killed. A proposal to surrender
 to him would be useless.

The Prince Pro Tem company
 played to a very good house on Wed-
 nesday evening. The play was a
 very laughable vaudeville and the
 singing of different members of the
 troupe was excellent. The whole
 performance from start to finish was
 interesting and the costumes were
 very fine.

An application will be made at the
 next session of parliament for an act
 to incorporate a company to be called
 the Nova Scotia Central Railway
 Co., with all necessary power, to con-
 struct a line of railway or tramway
 from New Glasgow to a point on the
 southern shore of the province, run-
 ning through the counties of Pictou
 and Guysboro.

Judge Savary of Annapolis senten-
 ced Arch Connors on Wednesday to
 seven years in the penitentiary with
 hard labor, six years for stealing a
 barrel of flour from a D. A. R. car
 near Digby, and an extra year for
 endeavoring to assault the prose-
 cutor, H. T. Warne, during a recess
 in the trial.

The name of the battery to which
 our brave officer R. H. Ryan is at-
 tached is the Canadian Scouts and
 Colt Gun Battery, Pretoria. He is a
 captain in the above and from what
 we know of the Canadians in war we
 shall expect to hear something of im-
 portance from the efforts of this
 body of men under such able leaders
 as "Gat" Howard and Capt. R. H.
 Ryan.

Lord Roberts has for the present
 declined to accept the sword which
 the city of Portsmouth intended to
 present him in a few weeks. He
 says: "It is most distasteful to me
 to be honored and feted and called
 upon to rejoice while so many are in
 bitter grief, and before we can prop-
 erly return thanks that the cloud is
 being rolled away which has for
 more than a year darkened the homes
 and crushed the hearts of so many
 in our country."

The Annual meeting of the Up-
 per Canada Presbyterian church
 took place on Monday afternoon.
 Owing to the state of the roads the
 attendance was small. Reports
 from most of the societies and or-
 ganizations were received. The re-
 port of the managers showed the
 finances in a healthy condition.
 All the financial obligations includ-
 ing stipend had been met leaving a
 small balance in Treas. hands.
 During the year the Ladies Aid
 had paid on debt \$157.00. Most
 of this was a balance from 99.
 They now reported a balance of
 \$153.00 which they were ready to
 apply to church debt. The perma-
 nent liability of the church amount-
 ing to \$375.00 would be thus re-
 duced to \$222.00 which will doubt-
 lessly be completely discharged this
 spring by subscriptions towards the
 Century Fund. The Y.P.S.C.E.
 and S. School alike showed consid-
 erable sums collected during the year.
 A full report of the schemes of the
 church was not given as most of
 the subscriptions to these schemes
 had not yet been received. Every-
 one present was highly pleased as
 the reports surpassed expectations.
