LONDON, Feb. 3 .- The gale which passed over England on Saturday last was very destructive to life and property. In this city and Liverpool chimneys and signs were blown down and houses unroofed. Many people were struck by the falling objects and severely injured, and in some instances killed outright.

LONDON, Feb. 3, (eve.)—It is reported the French Government is likely to withdraw the new bill for the regulation of the press, in consequence of the opposition to the measure shown by the Liberal party.

In accordance with a request from Lord Stanley, the Pasha of Egypt has recalled the auxiliary corps of native Egyptians which he sent to join the British expedition in Abyssinia. The bill introduced by the Prussian Gov-

ernment, granting large indemnities to the King of Hanover and the Duke of Nassau, have been passed in the Diet.
