About the sunniest thing I have ound lately is a newspaper repor of the address given by our President General, Mrs. Alden, at the biennial convention of the Federation of Women's clubs, at Los Angeles. Her topic naturally was "How to be

Happy."
"In defining sunshine she quoted a little Los Angeles boy who had answered her query on the subject "It's in keeping the corners of your mouth turned up and doing something for somebody, quick," he said. Following is a little part of Mrs. Alden's talk:

"Sometimes people ask "what denomination do you represent?" And then I have to plead absolute ignorance. We have whole Sunday schools as branches in Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Episcopalian and Dutch Reformed churches. The Jewish congregations have gregations have taken up the work, and the best of the periodicals carry a Sunshine department in every number. How can I say what denomination we represent? And yet it may be truthfully said that free as it is from the mechanics of organization, broad as is its range of officers. Sunshine has a creed. If influence, Sunshine has a creed. If I were to follow the ordinary lines of

demarcation, I might say we have a hundred creeds, but they are really "Yes, we are Confucians, for we depend on the little courtesies and kindnesses of life to make up the great whole by which one must stand or fall. We are tender to the aged, and gentle to the little children. To the sage maxims of the venerable celestial we only beg leave to add humbly, but firmly, as a suggestion for the removal of most human dis-

comforts, our watchword, "Do something for somebody quick."
"We are Hindoos, for our charity takes within its range every living thing, and a good Sunshiner couldn't even be cross to a dumb animal. We are stoics, for poverty and wealth are all the same to us, and we find that one needs sympathy and help as often as the other. But to the faith of Epictetus, with all due regard to his epigrammatic versatility, we could differentially fasten the supplemen-tary creed, "Do something for some-

body quick." "We are epicureans as well, for we believe in enjoying life, and in mak-ing others enjoy it, too. And we have learned something that the old philosopher never discovered: so to him we would say, if he would appear to us in person, 'the surest way

to be happy is to forget yourself.'
The receipt is an unfailing one, "Do something for somebody quick."
"We are Parsees, fire worshippers, sun worshippers, of course, as becomes our name, eager to testify at all times to the vital and mystic significance of the rays that shine alike on the just and on the unjust, and excepting alive on the altars of out hearts the simulacrum of the ever-lasting Sunshine. But on these alters there is a deep carved legend that Zoroaster never knew, a legend that will hear repeating a hundred times and never weary the listeners, "Do-something for somebody quick."

"But most of all, we are Christians, for it was Christ who said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive,' and Whatsonver are would that 'Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them.' And to this teaching we have no addition to make, we only insist that it finds its briefest formulation as a guide to conduct, in our motto which thrills with the very essence of Christianity—of Christianity as Christ taught it, of Christianity stripped of the worldliness of modern fashions, "Do something for somebody
