CAPT. MANSON SUSPENDED.

Commander Spain's Report Fixes Blame On Argyle's Officer.

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—As a result of the finding of Commander Spain and Captain Donnelly regarding the grounding of the steamer Argyle, made public Saturday, Captain Manson has had his certificate suspended for one year. The report gives a resume of the accident, which happened July 29, when the Argyle ran ashore near Osawaha during a fog. At the time there were 150 passengers on board.

The report states that the steering gear was in good order, that the life-saving equipment was perfectly satisfactory and that officers and men behaved well during the panic. Then the report places the blame on the compasses and captain as follows:

"The compasses were not correct and the captain had no correct idea of the deviation and the compasses had not been corrected for a very long time. The court is of the opinion that the accident to the Argyle was caused by gross carelessness on the part of the captain in running at full speed in a dense fog. The lead was not used and apparently the captain had no idea of the correct compass course. The course steered was the usual one."

"Taking all facts into consideration, the court suspends the certificate of competence for inland waters of Captain William Manson for 12 months from July 29, 1905, the time of the accident."

"The court also wishes to point out that it is to be hoped the method of navigation on board the Argyle is not usual on board passenger steamboats on the lakes, otherwise there is no doubt that some appalling disaster must occur sooner or later."

MOROCCO FLOUTS FRANCE.

Repudiates Claim to Jurisdiction Over Algerian Citizen There.

Tangier, Aug. 28.—News has been received here from Fez, dated August 22, saying that Bouzian, the French-Algerian citizen, is still imprisoned at Gharb.

The Foreign Office has declined the demands of the French Government for the release of Bouzian, thus repudiating France's claim to jurisdiction over French-Algerian citizens in Morocco.

Germany's Reply Favorable.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Prince Von Radolin, the German Ambassador, called at the Foreign Office at noon Saturday and delivered Premier Rouvier the reply of Germany to the French note concerning the program to be discussed at the Moroccan conference. The Ambassador remained for an extended discussion of the question, which is considered to have somewhat improved as the result of Germany's reply.

The reply deals consecutively with the various points of the French program, and with the introduction of some fresh subjects which probably will entail the exchange of pour parlors or further notes. However, it is certain that progress has been made, as Germany accepts the French proposition and merely suggests amendments to them. This fact gives reason for the belief that a definite agreement will be reached in a short time.

The Foreign Office is examining Germany's reply and preparing an answer to it.
