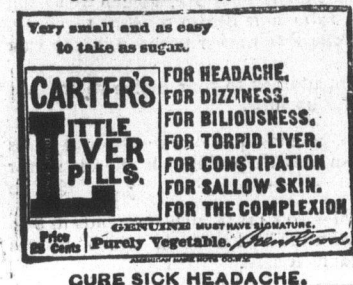

The Advisory Board of the Kent Children's Aid Society held their regular monthly meeting in the County Clerk's office Monday afternoon at 1.30.

There were present Mesdames W. E. McKeough, Goodland, Malott, H. D. Smith, Brady, Fraser, and Sheldon, also Messrs. Paterson, Gosnell, Baxter, Austin, R. V. Bray, Mayor Cowan and Inspector Mounteer.

The executive officer reported as follows: Visits made, 12; letters written, 77; cases reported, 3; cases investigated, 2; interviews, 8; children in Police Court, 1; applications for children, 2. The report was passed and accepted after a long discussion.

The trustee officer tendered his monthly report. A good deal of discussion then ensued re school book supplies and the visiting of poor families.

Mrs. Goodland, Mrs. Brady and D. S. Paterson were appointed a committee to wait on the principals of the McKeough, Separate and Central schools respectively to make inquiries along the line of school book supplies.

It was decided to hold the annual meeting of the Board on Thursday, Nov. 30, and Mayor Cowan and D. S. Paterson were appointed a committee to secure a hall for that purpose. Mrs. McKeough, Mrs. Malcolmsen and R. V. Bray were selected a committee to arrange a program.

The executive officer reported visiting Sarnia and addressing the annual meeting of the society. He also reported his visit to Windsor, where he met with much success in organizing a society. Dr. R. V. Bray was elected delegate to the convention which was held at Toronto, Nov. 14. The secretary was instructed to acknowledge the receipt of \$3.76 from the Harwich Union Christian Endeavor.

After a little discussion the meeting adjourned.

International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow.

Nehemiah's Prayer—Neh. 1, 1-11.

Golden Text—"The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

"Breathes there a man with soul so dead,

Why not to himself hath said, This is my own, my native land."

What a splendid exhibition of religious patriotism in this noble man of God and true patriot, Nehemiah. Note how when he learned of the affliction and condition of God's people and the Holy City he sat down and wept and mourned for days before God. Note the great difference between real prayer and saying prayers. Whenever we settle down satisfied with our religious surroundings, the present condition of God's people and His church, and mind our own business and prospects, instead of seeking first His kingdom and glory, we may say as many prayers as we like, but the Lord will not hear; we only insult Him, but how, different when the Holy Spirit leads to fasting, prayer, confession of sin, national and personal—"I and my father's house"—see verse 6, 7.

When we remind God of His promise—see verses 8-10—and claim them, then are we assured. He will hear and answer, and show us great and mighty things.

The affliction of the Jew at the present time must, by the power and grace of the Holy Spirit, produce in the case of many of them, just what He did in the case of Nehemiah; and we shall ere long, we trust, see results in their restoration on a grand scale.

But let us be personal; are not our afflictions now, often used of God for the restoration to Himself of poor captives of the world, the flesh and the devil, who may have wandered apart from their first love?

Return unto me and I will return unto you, saith the Lord, and He will abundantly pardon.
