THE CAROLINE ISLANDS. Missionaries of the American Board have for twenty-five years carried on their good work in the Cagoline Islands in peace and with a fair amount of success. They had established forty-five churches on those small and fertile is-lands, and the number of communicants in them numbered over four thousand.
Two years ago, alarmed by the seionizing spirit exhibited by Germany, Spain revived her claim to the Caroline is tende. Spenish and Spanish Governors to those islands and Spanish Governors were landed from them who took possession and proceeded to direct their public affairs. The natives, it appears did not take kindly to their naw mass. ters and the Spaniards, perceiving this became jealous of the American mis ing incited the natives to disregard the new laws and of exercising an influence unfavorable to their rule. The mismionaries denied the charges, but in spite of this decial their work has been seriously interrupted, and one of the oldest and most influential of them has been arrested and imprisoned in a Spanish man-of-war. The natives naturally sided with their old friends and teachers, and a riot took place in Ponape, the largest of the group, in which the Spaniards were worsted and the Governor killed. Troops have been sent for to Manila to subdue the "rebels," and a bad time is expected in the Carolina Islands. The American missionaries and their friends at home petitioned the American Govern ment to use its good officers on behalf of the perseented missionaries, but it is Wile Ansa not likely that it can preserve to them the result of their quarter of a century's labor. The United States Government will, no doubt, see that no injustice i inflicted on the missionaries who are citizens of the Republic without reparation, but wether it can or will use its influencetto adjust the differences between the "rebellious" Caroline Islanders and their new masters is another question.

NOTES.

Great Western Railway debentures to the amount of £891,000 sterling fall due on the 1st of December, 1890. The Grand Trunk Company offers to buy these debentures for cash at £106 for each £100 bond, or to give in exchange for them 4 per cent. perpetual deben tures at the rate of £115 for each £100 of the present stock. The new debenwill rank pari passu with the whole of the perpetual 4 per cent. con-solidated debenture stock already issued, amounting at the 80th of June last to £2,036,000." It is at present worth about 94. The equivalent of £100 of the present bonds will yield £4 12s. per

A correspondent of the Globe, W.Drydeu, jr., in a letter on commercial union "Give the Canadian farmer 10 cents a bushel more for his barley and there will be such a stimulus given to the production of barley that in place of sending \$5,000,000 of barley to the United States we will send \$10,000,000. Give the farmer twenty per cent. more for every horse sent to the United States, and in place of \$2,000,000 worth of horses we will send annually across the line \$5,900,000." From whence is the Canadian farmer to get his ten cents a bushel more for his barley and 20 per cent. more on every horse? Evidently Mr. Dryden expects him to pocket the duty now paid to the U. S. 


