Police Magistrate Cameron has been dismissed from office for cause and Frank R. Kelly has been appointed in his place.

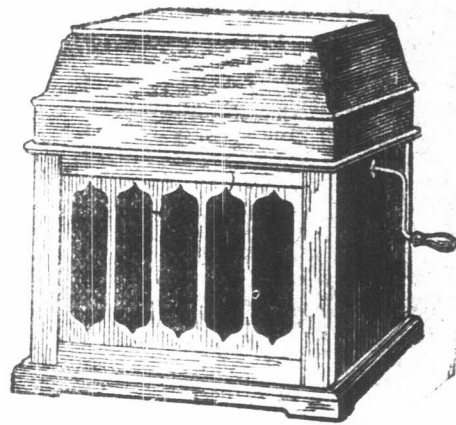
