THE WEATHER.

Toronto, April 6.—The disturbance which was over the lower Lakes region and middle Atlantic states yesterday is now over the Maritime Provinces, and another of lesser intensity is approaching the Great Lakes from the west. The weather is cold throughout the Dominion. A heavy snowfall has occurred in the St. Lawrence valley and rain in the Maritime Provinces. Maritime—Moderate southerly and westerly gales, showery; Wednesday, strong westerly winds, fair and colder. Publicity Committee Grant.

A grant of \$150 was moved last evening to the publicity committee to be used by them in meeting outstanding debts. The annual grant, it was stated, would be requested later and it would exceed last year's amount.

Grant for Beautifying Work.

At the committee meeting of the City Council last evening a grant of \$300 was made to the Local Improvement Society to enable the society to carry on their improvement work during the ensuing year.

Preparing for Steamboating.

A petition of Captain Martin Currier, owner of the steam tug Annie Currier, asking for free wharfage during the coming shipping season was granted. The petition was endorsed by a number of local firms.

Retained Membership.

The City Council retained the membership of the city of Fredericton in the Union of Canadian Municipalities last evening by paying a fee of \$24 for that purpose. The rate for membership is \$2 per thousand of population according to the last census.

Asking for Tax Exemption.

A petition from James H. Burns, of this city, presented to the City Council last evening, asking for an exemption from taxation because of the fact that he was unable to obtain a livelihood was referred to the assessment and appeals committee with power to act.

To Wed in the West.

Major G. C. Plimcombe was in St. John yesterday to meet his sister, Miss L. L. Plimcombe, B.A., who arrived from England on the Empress of France. Miss Plimcombe is proceeding to Winnipeg, where she is to be married to W. J. White, of Spalding, Sask. They will reside at Spalding.

Dance at Vocational School.

The staff of the D.S.C.R. entertained last evening at a very enjoyable dance in the Vocational building. About 150 were present and a programme of fifteen dances and three extras was carried out. Tennant's orchestra supplied the music and the extras were played by Miss Adele Fowle, Miss Green and Walter McGinn. Ice cream and cake were served during the evening.

Held Thank Offering Service.

The Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist church held their annual Easter thank offering service in the vestry of the church from 4 to 7 o'clock yesterday. The vestry was very prettily decorated with Easter favors and flowers and a programme of devotional exercises, solos, readings and choruses was carried out, after which supper was served. The thank offering amounted to \$200.

Children's Home Grant Doubled.

A petition from the chairman of the Children's Home committee requesting that the City Council double the grant of \$300 to the Children's Home for the ensuing year was considered by the City Council last night. It was felt that as a splendid work was being done by the committee they needed all the assistance available, and on motion of Ald. Neill, seconded by Ald. Camp, the grant of \$600 was unanimously carried for the work.

Death at South Devon.

The death occurred at South Devon last night of Miss Helen Booth Bradley, only child of Mrs. Margaret and the late Edwin Bradley. Deceased was only 16 years of age and was of a quiet and unassuming nature and rich friends and a large circle of friends who will learn with deep regret of her passing away. She is survived by her mother. The funeral will occur on Thursday afternoon, with service at the home at 2:30 o'clock by Rev. H. H. Ferguson, and interment at Sunnybank cemetery.

WANT TO SECEDE FROM FREDERICTON AND JOIN SUNBURY

Outlying Districts Demand that Their Highways Be Improved.

READY TO LEAVE CITY TO ATTAIN OBJECT

First Petition Presented to the City Council by ex-Ald. Geo. McKnight.

Residents of that district of the city of Fredericton extending from the Wilsey road to the Sunbury county line, including the Dominion Experimental Farm, have demanded that the city of Fredericton either improve the main river road through their district or that the City Council secure legislation to provide for that territory seceding from the city of Fredericton and becoming part of the parish of Lincoln, Sunbury county.

Last night ex-Ald. George McKnight appeared before the City Council on behalf of those interested in the movement and presented a petition to that effect, which he said was signed by every ratepayer of the district affected. He said the petitioners doubted whether the city would consider itself justified in completing the road at an expense estimated at not less than \$12,000, particularly as the people at the rear of the city and at Doak were about to petition the council similarly, and it would mean that the main river road, the Wilsey, the Doak Settlement road and the Maryland road to the top of Maryland Hill, practically all the outlying roads of the city, would be included in the section which desired to secede from the city.

In the discussion that followed Ald. Cooper stated that he thought it was too late this year to secure legislation for such a step, if it could be secured at all or was desirous. Mayor Reid thought that the matter ought to be left to the roads and streets and legislative committees to go into, if the people in the district affected really favored these views.

The matter was finally left to a special committee of Mayor Reid, Ald. Cooper and Ald. Cain to take the matter up with the provincial authorities and to interview the Minister of Public Works regarding provincial assistance in improving the roads referred to and get his views on the matter, the committee to report back to the City Council as soon as possible.

CITY EMPLOYEES WANT MORE PAY

Four Men at Street Lighting Plant Ask from \$290 to \$365 a Month.

A petition of the employees of the electric lighting station for increased wages was considered last evening by the City Council in committee and was finally left over until the regular appointments had been made at the May meeting.

When the matter was brought up Mayor Reid stated that he had heard a good deal of criticism about the number of employees retained at the station, where, before there had only been two employees. Ald. Bastor stated that at no time in his recollection had there been only two men employed at the station, and stated that there were always three employees, one of them being employed as line man.

The matter was, on motion of Ald. Yohm, seconded by Ald. Cain, left over until the regular appointments are made by the council. None of the aldermen objected to the petition for increased wages, but all thought it better to leave the matter over until the electric street lighting question had been decided, and the opinion of the meeting was that the employees would no doubt receive the asked for increase in wages. Alexander Davidson, superintendent of the station, asked for an increase from \$95 to \$125 per month; Ludlow Malloy asked for an increase from \$70 to \$80; Harry Dillon, who has been getting a salary of \$50 a month, asked for \$70, and Thomas Harvey, the line man, asked for an increase from \$75 to \$90 a month.

TENDERS TOO HIGH.

Proposed Renovation of Methodist Church Abandoned for Present on Account of H. C. L.

Tenders for the renovation of the Methodist church closed yesterday, but as the tenders received were far in excess of the amount of money the Methodists intended spending for the purpose no tender was accepted.

The committee, composed of J. M. Lemont, Rev. G. M. Young, Charles K. Palmer, W. J. Osborne and Fred B. Edgecombe, met yesterday and considered the tenders received. No tender for the whole work was received, but several offers were received agreeing to do the work on a percentage basis on account of unsettled labor conditions.

The committee decided that owing to the fact that the city had \$18,000 on hand and the work they had planned to cost in the vicinity of \$20,000 could not be done less than \$40,000, they decided to consider the matter for some time before making any decision. The improvements at the church are to consist of new heating and lighting systems, the main entrance and stairs to be completely remodelled and many other alterations.

SELECTED HISTORY TO REPLACE MYERS' IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Outlines of World's History by a British Author Has Been Chosen.

RECOMMENDATION TO BOARD OF EDUCATION

Public Indignation Aroused by Recent Expose Causes Change.

Outlines of the World's History, by Edgar Sanderson, M.A., law scholar of Clare College, Cambridge, and author of a History of the British Empire, has been recommended by the Literature and History sub-committee of the General Text Book Committee of New Brunswick to the Board of Education as a text book in the public schools of the province, replacing Myers' General History.

This decision was reached at the meeting of the committee at the Education Department offices on Monday afternoon. Swinton's History was also considered but because of objections from religious sources was not regarded with favor. Those present at the meeting included Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education; Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick; Dr. H. S. Bridges, Superintendent of Schools in St. John; R. D. Hanson, School Inspector, Fredericton, and W. J. S. Myles, Principal of the St. John High School.

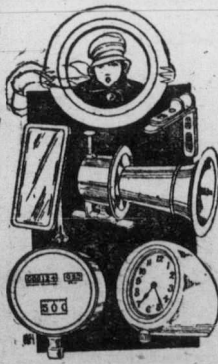
