ANTI-ACCIDENT CAMPAIGN IS WAGED

By large Industries in the Uniceu States

Accidents and their prevention are causing grave concern in American industries today and uprecedented offorts are being made to prevent them. Of the 41,000,000 persons employed throughout the United States at present some 2,500,000 meet every year with more or less serious accidents. As a result of these accidents a total of 227,000, 000 working days were lost last year. If the average pay of \$4.50 a day be multiplied by the total, it will be seen that the loss totals over \$1,000,000.000. In other words the lost time caused by accidents in a year is equivalent to that lost by over 750,000 men out of employment for an entire year. cidents many great industrial plants have organized elaborate campaigns

To reduce the loss caused by a of education and devised highly ingenious systems for safeguarding their employees. This unique warfare is waged relentlessly day and night with increasingly gratifying results. In the ' Bethlehem Steel plants for instance with their 70,000 employees covering many trades, the number of accidents has been re duced by nearly one-half during the past eight years. Accidents to the eyes of workmen which were numerous in the past have been practically eliminated. It is inter esting to find that the largest num ber of all accidents comes from hilling or tripping in the work or from handling materials or tools.

The programme includes safety in pection work, promoting safety canpaigns, stimulating live interest in safety work and the maintenance of worker's safety committees. Over 5,000 workers have been trained der the supervision of the medical staff, in accident prevention and first aid work. Each year over 1.000 men are given this training.

Well-eqipped medical depart ments are maintained and first aid stations ar established at all important Cenrtes in addition hospitals. Members of the first aid units raise a small flag by where they may be working. In the case of an accident the bag indicates where first aid assistance can be had until such time as a doctor can be called.

RADIOGRAPHS TELL STORY One of the most effective methods taking photographs and obtaining descriptions of every accident. From these photographs striking posters are prepared illustrating graphically just how the accident occurred with all possible realism. The poster or illustration is usually in two parts showing the scene be fore and after the accident, and stressing the example which result ed from carelessness. The name of the injured workman accompany the pictures and no details are committed which will help to drive home the lessons of the accidents to other workers.. Charts and vari ous forms of circulars and other literature reporting accidents, and drawing the lesson they teach are prepared and circulated throughout the plants weekly

1 mdon Ost 8-Great Britain's first Labor Government virually came to an end at 11 o'clock to night when by a combination of Conservative and Liberal votes the House of Commons carried a motion demanding that a select committee of the House investigate the action of Attorney General Sir Patrick Hastings in withdrawing prosecution in the case of the Com munist, James K. Campbell acting editor of the Workers Weekly charged with inciting His Majesty's forces to sedition.

The Government declined to accept the motion and treated it as a vote of censure which if adopted by the House would involve an ap peal to the country against Parlia ment's verdict. The debate was sharp and exciting and after it was closed the Opposition wanted to drop Sir Robert S Horne's motion of censure and vote on Sir John A. /Simon's amendment callingfor an investigation. On the Govern ment's refusal to accept this cours he House divided on the question as to which it should vote on. By a vote of 359 to 198 it was decided to vote on the Simon amendment This was equivalent to the defeat of the censure motion and the Simon amendment became the substantive motion and was cari∈d 364


