LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

BRIT HARTY, the celebrated novelist and poet is dead.

The past week was a good one among the lobster fishermen on all sides of the Island.

JOHN J. McDonald, Fort Selkirk, P. E. I., has been appointed customs officer there vice Edward Morrisey, deceased.

BISHOP ROGERS is seriously ill at Charlottetown, N. B. Prayers are being offered on his behalf in the Catholic Churches throughout the Province.

The City Schools observed Arbor Day, May 1st, by planting trees, and each carrying out an appropriate programme of songs, recitations, etc.

THIRTEEN hundred men went on strike in Toronto on Thursday. The trades represented are bricklayers, carpenters, machine wood workers, wire, wood and metal makers, carriage makers, jewellery workers, stove mounters and the street railway mechanics.

The schooner Bear River which sailed from Port George, N. S., for Fort Williams, April 26th, has not been reported and has been given up for lost with all hands. Saturday night southeaster is said to have been the worst storm experienced in the head waters of the Bay of Fundy for years.

CEREMONIAL CHANGES—Rev. E. B. McDonald, of St. Augustine's, Rustico, is transferred to the pastorate of St. Mary's, Souris, in succession to the Rev. F. D. McDonald, deceased. Rev. John Chaisson, D. D., is transferred from the Immaculate Conception, Palmer Road, to Rustico, in succession to Rev. R. B. McDonald.

Two unknown men called at the house kept by Albino Marchione, an Italian ice cream vendor situated on Cadieux Street, Montreal, on Sunday afternoon. A dispute followed culminating in a fight during which the proprietor, Marchione, was stabbed over the heart, dying half an hour later. The men succeeded in making their escape.

St. JOHN'S, Nfld., advices say that the steamer Kite escaped from the ice floes at White Bay on Wednesday last, and reached St. John's Monday. The seal fishing is now over and the total catch amounts to 275,000 seals. No vessel of the fleet has sustained serious injury, and only three men have perished. The value of the catch approaches \$150,000.

A FATAL accident took place at the farm of Vernon McIntyre, Bedoune Road, about four miles from North River Bridge on Monday afternoon. Mr. Wm. McAlister, aged 80 years, was standing on a load of hay when the horse suddenly started, with the result that the unfortunate man was thrown to the ground, and his neck broken by the fall, making death instantaneous. He leaves four children.

At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade held on Saturday afternoon the following resolution was passed: Resolved that this Board strongly urge the Dominion Gov't to grant a subsidy sufficient for a suitable steamer for a regular service between Charlottetown and Pughwash believing that such a service between above points with reasonable freight and passenger rates would greatly stimulate trade, etc.

LOUIS MOORE, aged 18, employed in Mark Wright & Co.'s factory had his leg badly lacerated above the knee while working at the machine for making cheese boxes. There are three small saws about a quarter of an inch thick running on a spindle and in some way young Moore's overalls got caught in the outer saw, which drew up his leg, giving it an ugly rip about half a foot in length. Medical aid was summoned and the boy was removed to the hospital.

An Ottawa despatch of the 6th says: Judge Burbridge, of the Exchequer Court, has given a judgment of \$337,000 in the case of McKenzie & Mann against the Government for damages through loss on the Yukon railway contract and work done and materials furnished towards work. This award is the result of a reference by the Government to Judge Burbridge, the arbitrators having admitted the responsibility of the Government in the matter.

It is now certain that the Newfoundland seal fishery of 1902 will result in a catch considerably below the average. Several ships are yet to arrive from the icefields; but these, for the most part, are known to be poorly fitted, and the season is now too far advanced to admit of their springing to any appreciable extent. It is true that some good work has been done by the landmen of White Bay, but this will not go very far towards making up for the shortage in the crop gathered by the steam fleet. The total catch will be in the neighborhood of 250,000.—Halifax Herald.

ARCHBISHOP CORRIGAN died in New York Monday night. Deceased had been metropolitan of the Diocese of New York since 1885. He was born at Newark, N.J., in 1839, and educated at St. Mary's College, Wilmington, Delaware, and Mount St. Mary's, Emmetsburg, Maryland. He was ordained priest at Rome in 1868, was Professor of Dogmatic Theology and Sacred Scripture at Seton Hall College, Orange, N. J., and became President of this institution in 1878. He was made Bishop of Newark in 1879, and Coadjutor to Archbishop of New York in 1890.

The Plant Line steamer Halifax, arrived here from Boston, via Halifax, on her first trip for the season, about half past eight o'clock on Tuesday morning with a large cargo and eighteen passengers. The popular Captain Pye and his gallant officers and crew were given a hearty welcome. The Halifax has undergone a great many improvements since last year. It will be remembered that she was badly damaged in consequence of running aground in Boston harbor last autumn and she was then sent to dock for repairs, which have been so extensive as to make her practically a new boat. Her state room accommodation has been increased and otherwise improved, and other changes in the line of improvement have been made. She sailed on return about midnight last night, with cargo and twelve passengers. We wish the Halifax and her gallant Captain and sturdy crew a prosperous and prosperous season.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The building laborers, stonecutters, and plasterers of Halifax are on strike.

The Canadian teachers for South Africa arrived at Liverpool last Wednesday, all well.

Mrs. Wm. Chandler, Mount Allison, fell from the hay loft one day last week, breaking her ankle.

THIRTEEN new cases of smallpox were reported to the Toronto health department on Saturday. Eight are in eastern Ontario and the others in the northern mining districts.

Messrs. Hyndman & Co., of Charlottetown, insurance men, have formed a partnership with A. C. Lithgow, of Halifax for carrying on a general insurance brokerage business in that city.

A RECENT despatch from Rome announces that Monsignor Falconio, the papal delegate in Canada, is to succeed Cardinal Martinelli as papal delegate to the United States. Mgr. Falconio is a studious man of exquisite manner and a thorough English scholar.

A VETERINARY will be at the Hotel Dalrymple on Thursday, the 5th and Friday the 6th, to bay horses for the 4th contingent. The horses must be perfectly sound between five and ten years old and must stand from 14.3 to 15.2 hands high and weight from 950 to 1050 pounds.

The repairs to Sturgeon Pier were completed on the 30th ult. The two outer spans were filled in and the roadway put in good condition. The outer walls are 26 x 22, and the inner 24 x 22. The work has been inspected and pronounced thoroughly satisfactory.

Mr. George Jamieson of Sturgeon, while duck shooting, recently met with an accident by which he lost a middle finger. The accident was caused by the bursting of the gun at the breach, which contained a cartridge of ammunition powder. He had several fingers badly mangled, and it was found necessary to amputate the middle one.

At the civic election in Halifax last Wednesday A. B. Crosby (Conservative) was elected mayor of Halifax over C. S. Lane (Liberal) by a majority of 16. The vote stood: Crosby, 1,613; Lane, 1,427. A vote was taken on the giving of a bonus of \$1,000 to a stevedore shipbuilding plant. Only about 150 voted against it and the bonus passed practically unanimously.

The House of Commons went into Supply Wednesday, taking up the P. E. Island Railway. Mr. Blair stated that the Murray Harbor Railway cost \$2,600,000 of which \$1,100,000 would be the cost of the Hillsboro Bridge. Mr. Lefebvre made a strong statement as to the need of better accommodation and a better service for the P. E. Island Railway, pressing particularly for station accommodation at Kinkora.

The transport Cestrian sails from Halifax tomorrow the 8th, with the 3rd Regiment and second squadron of the 4th Regiment under Major O'Farrell, for South Africa. The Winnipegian, which will sail on the 15th will have the 6th Regiment and the Headquarters and two squadrons of the 4th Regiment. The Cornishian, which will sail on the 20th, will have the 5th Regiment on board.

A YOUNG man was fined five dollars in the police court on Saturday for carrying a revolver. Supt. McDonald took advantage of the occasion to point out that nearly all the shooting affairs lately, in some of which lives have been lost, have been due to the dangerous and pernicious habit of carrying revolvers. The intention may be innocent, but a person more or less intoxicated, and who gets into a row, is very liable to use a revolver if he has one with him.

A MONTREAL despatch of the 2nd inst., announced the following: The Montreal civic treasury is empty, the whole contents of the safe being in the hands of the sheriff. The seizure was taken as the result of a judgement secured against the City of Montreal by Joseph Levesque for \$6,000. Over \$5,000 was seized today, but this did not satisfy the law and a limb of the law will stand around until the remaining \$1,000 is collected.

The Halifax Herald says: "The St. John's skinner who handled the seals of the schooner Bona Fides cannot restrain their laughter when speaking of the manner in which the Prince Edward Islanders handled them. M of them were hauled ashore "round" or just as they were killed, when the heads were chopped off with an axe. They were then split down and across, the paw of the flippers being severed leaving the shoulder and the skin and fat otherwise mutilated. The portions of fat thus wasted would form quite an item of profit had they been saved. One sealing skipper of the west coast who put into the island, through pieces of weather brought a large quantity of these seals for 25 cents and made an excellent speculation." The Bona Fides, Capt. Chas. Fitzgerald left Georgetown over a month ago, with a cargo of seals which were killed on the north side of the island. The vessel lost her foreboom and rudder in a gale 100 miles from Sydney and was forced to put back into that port where she was repaired on the slip and left again for St. John's. The Bona Fides returned Thursday morning to Cardigan where she reloaded with cattle and produce, shipped by her owner James E. Macdonald, M.L.A.
