LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

His Majesty's ship Cornwall arrived in port yesterday afternoon. She will remain a few days.

The large carriage factory of A. S. Fillmore, situated at Southampton twenty miles from Amherst, was destroyed by fire last Wednesday night.

The French dirigible balloon, Clement Bayard, made a voyage from Compeigne to London, a distance of 196 miles direct, in the remarkable time of six hours.

According to the London Daily Chronicle, Joseph Chamberlain's health is so much improved that there is a possibility that he may again sit and speak in Parliament.

Some fifty applications have been received by the Civil Service Commission at Ottawa from prospective candidates for the new Canadian Navy, who intend taking qualification examination this fall, for entrance to the Naval College at Halifax.

Melbourne, Australia, advices of the 18th say: Returns are all in from the New South Wales election. It is admitted that the Labor Party has carried the State by a majority of two. The Ward Government lost 9 seats including the Premier and his two colleagues.

Three men are dead at Sudbury, Ont., as a result of a collision between the Transcontinental Express and a cattle train. They were the engineers of both trains and the fireman of the cattle train. All the others escaped in a remarkable manner. Four cars of express goods, mail and baggage served as a buffer, and the passengers got but a light shaking up.

Twenty-five thousand Catholic citizens of Montreal gathered at Champ Mars last Sunday evening and passed a strongly worded resolution denouncing the recent anti-Christian speech of Mayor Nathan, of Rome. Archbishop Brochu presided and speeches were made by his Grace, Mayor Guerin, Henri Bourassa, Hon. J. DeCarie, provincial secretary, and many others.

A cyclone that returned to Havana, Cuba, late Sunday continued through the night and raged Monday with continued fury. Gale was stronger than at any time since Thursday morning. A heavy loss of life and great property damage is reported. The cyclone kept increasing. Beyond a doubt it is far more serious than the hurricane of 1906 which cost so many lives and the damage to amount of millions of dollars.

Mr. Robert Vanning, Superintendent of Fisheries for Canada, has been located in Brussels. He disappeared about the first of September, and his absence caused great anxiety. Mr. Wm. Hutchinson cables to Ottawa that Mr. Vanning was found in a hotel in Brussels where he has been for the past six weeks suffering from amnesia, which involved complete loss of memory. He is recovering and will start for Canada within a short time.

Guy Tombs, general passenger agent of the Canadian Northern in the province of Quebec, and handling the Royal line steamers from Montreal, was in Halifax Monday and left for St. John that night. He predicts that the time is coming when there will be a daily steamship service between Canada and Britain, and says this is necessary in the imperial interests, and that it will be just as reasonable as a daily train service east and west is today. He says the inauguration of the Bristol-Halifax service is the first step in the fulfilment in the All-Red service proposed by the Canadian and imperial government.

The English coast was recently strewn with wreckage as a result of a storm that had continued for some days. The casualty list is already reported large. Friday morning the bodies of five seamen from the coasting steamer Cranford were picked up off Hartlepool. It is believed that the vessel, which carried a crew of twenty, foundered and that the men were attempting to reach shore in a small boat when they were lost. Some of the wreckage coming ashore indicates that a sailing ship met like fate.

We regret to learn that the dwelling house of Mr. Patrick Konghan, Elliott Vale was totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday last. A very high wind was blowing at the time, and all members of the family except Mrs. Konghan were away some distance from the house. It was about 9 o'clock in the forenoon when Mrs. Konghan noticed flames emanating from the chimney and then observed the roof on fire. The alarm was given and every effort made to subdue the flames; but without avail. The contents of the lower part of the building were saved; but everything upstairs was destroyed. There was no insurance. This is a very serious loss at this time of year and Mr. Konghan and his family have the sympathy of the community.

The twelve mile race between Able Wood, of Montreal, and Fred Cameron, of Amherst, on Every Day Club grounds St. John on Saturday afternoon, was won by Wood in the fast time of one hour, three minutes and six seconds. Cameron was the pace and led for the whole distance, Wood winning on the sprint in the last lap. The only exciting incident during the progress of the race was a brush near the end of the fifth mile. Wood made an effort to pass but Cameron held his distance. The relative positions continued the same until within 100 yards of the finish when Wood drew up level and in the last twenty yards started ahead, winning by four yards while looking backward at his competitor. The time at five miles was given as 25.31 and at ten miles 53.15 sec.

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

Mr. Hearst of New York offers \$50,000 for a flight in a heavier than air machine from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

The Parliamentary Session at Ottawa will open on Thursday November 17th. This has been decided at a recent Cabinet meeting.

Three cases of smallpox have broken out a short distance from Dorchester, N. B., in the Indian settlement, two Indian women and one white man having the disease.

King George has ordered the British Royal Yacht Victoria and Albert to proceed to Gibraltar to embark King Manuel and Queen Mother Amelia, and bring them to England.

It is stated in intelligence from England, that King Manuel, of Portugal, and the Queen Mother Amelia, have accepted the invitation of the Duke of Orleans to become his guests at Wood-Norton, England.

One of the largest contributions to the fund for the people of Campbellton comes from the Government of British Columbia. It is \$2,500, and has been sent by the Premier of the Pacific Province to the Premier of New Brunswick.

Mayor Evans and other Winnipeggers are in Ottawa on other day to interview the government in support of a request, preferred last session, for a federal grant of \$2,500,000 for the proposed Selkirk Centennial Exposition, at Winnipeg, in 1914.

An outbreak of fire in St. Mary's College on Bierry Street Montreal last Friday evening, caused a stampede among 500 boys. The second alarm was rung, but the outbreak was speedily discovered. Little damage was done and no one was injured although considerable excitement prevailed.

The plans and proposals of the Dominion Dock Company for \$4,000,000 dock at Lewis have been referred back to the Company after an examination by the public works department. It is understood that the examination of the plans does not indicate that the cost should be what the company appears to anticipate.

The loss of a lumber-laden schooner is indicated by the great quantities of lumber floating in the vicinity of St. Pierre. Gales off the Newfoundland coast have been very heavy recently and it is supposed that some schooner has foundered. No Newfoundland vessels are missing.

A very sad and fatal accident occurred Thursday at Brookside near Truro. Two young sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Cook, got hold of a gun in the absence of their parents, and one of them caused it to discharge, the shot entering his head. He died while his brother ran to town to notify his mother.

The annual report of the Canadian Department of Indian Affairs shows that the general condition of the government wards during the last fiscal year was not so satisfactory as in previous years. Improvement in vital statistics, morality, education, industrial conditions, agriculture, sanitation and in a higher scale of civilization generally is noted.

The United States Federal authorities visited the extensive offices of the Redeemable Investment Co., Devonshire Street Boston the other day and came away with the manager, Charles Brooks the books of the company, and several thousand dollars in cash. All were taken under a warrant charging the company with the use of the mails in a scheme to defraud.

The Census Office Ottawa publishes a bulletin on the condition of crops in Canada. The reports show lower averages of condition for the whole of Canada than those of a year ago, but the reduction applies chiefly to the Northwest provinces. In the eastern provinces a high per cent is maintained for nearly all the crops, and quantity and quality are nearly as good as a year ago and better than two years ago.

Action has been taken by the Federal Ministers of Australia to establish a universal penny postage throughout the Commonwealth. The Finance Minister of Victoria delivered the Budget recently. He announced a serious decrease of revenue on account of the Federal authorities having taken a larger share than formerly of the Customs income. A new Land Tax has been levied on improved lands with some important exceptions. The income tax will be increased by lessening the exemptions.

King's Hall, on St. Catherine's Street Montreal was destroyed by fire last Wednesday night, with all its contents, said to be worth at least \$75,000. But the loss of property is as nothing compared with the loss of life. It was found next morning that seven persons lost their lives in the flames. The dead are F. Whittale, night watchman, his wife and two young children, Charles Threlkeld, of Boston in charge of the billiard hall, Harry Richards, and a negro name unknown. All were employed in the building and were caught in their beds by the swift rush of the flames and were suffocated before being burned.

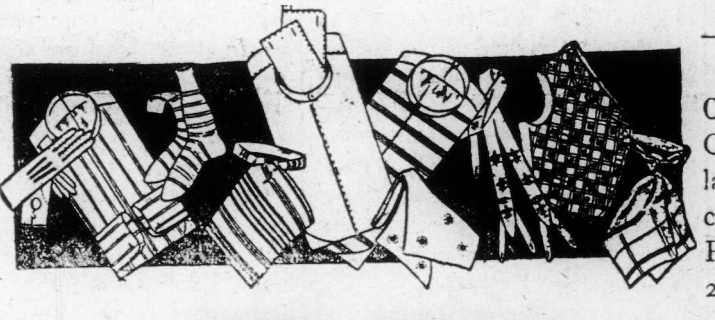

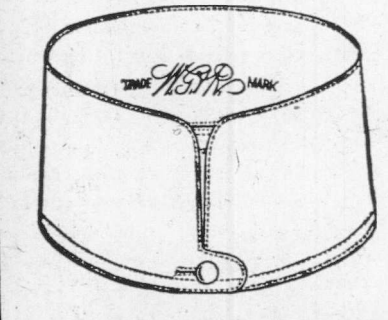
