These little tickets are smaller than postage stamps, 20 on a sheet and perforated. You can buy two, t venty or a thousand of them, pay for them at a fixed rate and the company on its part is bound to accept one of them for every mile you travel. You will not require to tell the ticket seller where you want to go; you will say give me a hundred tickets, get on board and give the conductor enough of the little squares to carry you to your destination.
