Question VI.

We have already expressed the opinion that the Award of the Hague Tribunal is satisfactory. We do not mean by this expression of opinion to imply that Newfoundland obtained the concurrence of the Tribunal on all her contentions. We do, however, mean that she obtained that concurrence on every issue of prime importance except one. The exception to which we refer relates to the contention under Question VI. Newfoundland contended that the treaty waters on the West Coast did not include the bays, harbours and creeks. In advancing this contention in 1905, Sir Robert Bond pointed out its importance in these words:—

"If the position that I have taken up in regard to this section of the coast of this Colony is correct, the exclusive rights to the winter herring fishery are under the British flag to-day, and always have been since the dominion of the British flag was first established in North America."

Its importance is, however, quite apart from the question at issue, which was whether liberty to fish in these inlets had been granted to Americans by the Convention. Great differences of opinion existed as to the meaning of the terms of the Treaty.

Anniversary Sports at Grand Falls.

Grand Falls was en fête last Saturday, the occasion being the first anniversary of the opening of the mammoth paper mill. The Ring Which Makes Fish Dear.

The Telegraph points out, apropos of Sir James Critchton-Brown's address, that the price of fish is unfairly increased:

"Some people blame the freights of the railway companies for the high price of fish, but we do not believe that the cause lies in that direction at all. Prices are not regulated by the railway freights, but by the Billingsgate 'ring' and by the middle-man. Else why is it that when there is an unprecedented catch of herrings or pilchards or cod, or even sprats and cockles, the retail prices remain practically unchanged—though at the slightest sign of scarcity they soar to famine height? Those who talk to the men who catch the fish know very well that the profit does not go into their pockets, and, considering the extraordinary way in which London and the big towns seem to get ninety-tenths of the fish which is landed on the quays and at once rushed away by express train, prices would certainly rule much lower, if only they were allowed to find their natural level."
