**Death on Garthaginian**

For a week before the Garthaginian left Philadelphia the Chief Steward, Mr. McKinley, who suffered from heart trouble, had been ill and confined to his cabin, but the day before the ship left and on that day also he greatly improved and all on board looked forward to his speedy recovery. It was not to be, however, as on Friday last, the 1st inst., he again became stricken and after a few hours, despite the efforts of the ship's physician and the kind ministrations of Capt. Bamber and the other officers, his spirit went out into the great unknown. At 4 p.m. on the same day his body was consigned to the deep, the burial service being a most impressive one. At that hour the ship was stopped, all the crew, officers and passengers were assembled on the aft deck and the beautiful prayers of the Church of England prescribed for such an occasion were impressively read by Capt. Bamber, after which the remains were lowered over the ship's side and sank gradually into the depths. Mr. McKinley was in his 51st year, was many years in the Allan service and was two years on the Garthaginian, being very popular with captain, officers and crew. He leaves a wife and family in Glasgow for whom much sympathy is expressed.
