A Man of Many Titles.

LANSLOWNE IS A SMALL PEER-AGE BY HIMSELF.

The Leader of the British Tory Peers Who is Fighting the Liberal Legislation so Vigorously, Goes Back to Strongbow, Earl of Pembroke, and Has Titles in England, Scotland and Ireland.

Lord Lansdowne, Unionist leader in the British House of Lords, and consequently chieftain of the Tory party's big majority in that august chamber, has returned to a prominent place in the public eye. When the celebrated Veto Bill which broke the back of the Conservative peers as a legislative obstacle to the Liberal Government, was in the hands of the nobility, Lansdowne figured large in the daily prints. When he accepted the distasteful measure the scene of battle shifted back to the Commons and the Home Rule Bill, for which the Veto Bill was merely an advance guard, was fought out in the lower House. Then, amid dust of battle and shouts of victorious Liberals, it went to the Lords, only to be gullied summarily. Passed twice again it becomes law, and the Green Isle will be free to settle its feud with Ulster.

Lord Lansdowne figured only officially in the first rejection of Home Rule, but the other day he came into prominence as one of the leaders who favored the dropping of food taxes temporarily from the Unionist platform.

The Marquess of Lansdowne is the fifth of that title, which was created in 1784, but his family goes back much further than the eighteenth century. He is also the twenty-sixth baron of Kerry and Lixnaw, a peerage created away back in 1181. He holds also the barony of Keith and Nairne, founded in 1681, the Earldom of Kerry and the Viscounty of Clancarty, created in 1723, the Viscounty of Fitzmaurice, and the barony of Dunkerron, 1751, the Earldom of Shelburne, the barony of Wycombe, the Earldom of Wycombe, and the Viscounty of Canine. His earliest celebrated ancestor was Strongbow, Earl of Pembroke, famous in our histories, and many of

his forebears have since held notable places in the realm.

The present Lord Lansdowne is now sixty-eight years of age and has had a career filled with honors. He has held several Cabinet positions, but his post of chief interest to Canadians was the Governor Generalship of the Dominion, which he occupied from 1883 to 1888. He is a large landowner, possessing 143,000 acres, a London mansion and a handsome estate in each of England, Scotland and Ireland.

Migration Confirmed.

Egyptian Papyrus Corroborates Story of Forty Years' Wandering.

An ancient Egyptian papyrus has been discovered which throws light on the Exodus, the Bible story of the forty years' migration of the Israelites from Egypt, to the Promised Land.

The papyrus is a gazetteer of the principal places in the Eastern Delta or the Nile from which the migration began. It has been translated by Prof. Spiegelberg, of Cairo, and the principal results of his translation are published in the last report of the Palestine Exploration Fund.

The papyrus mentions the places of this region in nearly the same order as they are given in the book of Exodus. The Israelites started from the land of Goshen, which is proved to have been a district of the Eastern Delta called by the Egyptians "Gescm." Their march began at the town of Ramesses, in Goshen, on the fifteenth day of the first month.

Their first halt was at Succoth, according to Exodus. The papyrus combines this place with Pithom, a town also mentioned in Exodus. The Egyptian expression is "Pe-Atum-Zuktu," which may easily be identified as "Pithom-Succoth."

The Israelites then proceeded south-east to Pi-hahiroth and encamped between Migdol and the Red Sea, over against Baal-Zephon. It was at this spot that the armies of Pharaoh overtook the Israelites.

What followed is described in the fourteenth chapter of Genesis:

"And Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and the Lord caused the sea to go back by a strong east wind all that night, and made the sea dry land, and the waters were divided."

"And the children of Israel went in the midst of the sea upon the dry ground; and the waters were a wall upon them on their right hand and on their left."

"And the Egyptians pursued and went in after them to the midst of the sea, even all Pharaoh's horses, his chariots and his horsemen."

"And the Lord said unto Moses, Stretch out thine hand over the sea, that the waters may come again upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and upon their horsemen."

"And Moses stretched forth his hand over the sea, and the sea returned to his strength when the morning appeared, and the Egyptians fled against it; and the Lord overthrew the Egyptians in the midst of the sea."

"And the waters returned and covered the chariots, and the horsemen, and all the host of Pharaoh that came into the sea after them; there remaining not so much as one of them."

One phrase in the papyrus is "Lake of Kharta," which has been identified with the Pi-hahiroth of Genesis. When you spell the last two syllables, "Kharta," as the Hebrews pronounced it, you see the resemblance to Kharta.

The papyrus mentions the "Miklat of Baal-Zephon" while the Bible speaks of "Migdol over against Baal-Zephon." A migdol was an Egyptian tower or fort, and possibly this one stood outside the town of Baal-Zephon.

The papyrus strongly confirms the geography of the Book of Exodus, and shows that some of the places bear similar names to the present day.

After crossing the Red Sea the Israelites passed out of Egyptian territory. They turned south to avoid the Philistines and journeyed on to the Wilderness of Sinai, where Moses received the Ten Commandments and the law from the Lord on Mount Sinai. Here they tarried a year.

Then they turned north and after battles with the Amalekites and many trials they slowly struggled on, keeping east of southern Canaan and the Dead Sea. After forty years they reached Mount Nebo, east of the Jordan, whence Moses could see Jericho and the Promised Land.
