SPECIAL TO EVENING TELEGRAM.
MISSISSAUGA, To-day.
A strong earthquake shock occurred here followed by two other shocks of less severity. People are greatly alarmed at the frequency of the disturbances.

SYDNEY, To-day.
There is no word of the missing steamer Bridgeport. The steamer Louisburg has been sent out for the purpose of making a thorough search for the collier.

READING, England, To-day.
The Socialists adopted suffragist tactics and have decided to oppose all Liberal candidates and refuse them a hearing at public meetings until James Larkin, leader of the striking Irish Transport Workers, recently sentenced to seven months imprisonment in Dublin is released.

READING, Eng., To-day.
Unionists were victorious at the by-election made necessary by the withdrawal of Sir Rufus Isaacs to assume the Lord Chief Justiceship. Great interest centered in the contest. Capt. Wilson, Unionist, captured the seat by 5,144 votes. Geo. Peabody Gooch, Liberal, 4,031. Socialist candidate Butler 1063. Socialists made a feature of the Marconi controversy. The Unionists avoided mention of Marconi, and made opposition to Home Rule and the Insurance Act. The Militant suffragettes supported Wilson. Just before the polls closed a squad of militiamen arrived at the Town Hall where the counting took place. It was strongly guarded by a double force of police while the polling places were carefully watched all day as attacks on ballot boxes were feared. The Liberal candidate Gooch, formerly member for Bath, entered the constituency only on the eve of the contest.

LONDON, To-day.
The Times gives prominence to a dispatch from their correspondent in Dublin, which says the Government is seriously alarmed at recent developments in Ulster. The Dublin Castle authorities dispatch says they have been badly informed concerning the Ulster agitation against Home Rule, as Mr. Birrell, unlike former Chief Secretaries of Ireland, does not keep in touch with the Administration's reports contrary and consequently the authorities are only now awaking to the situation. The meeting of Commercial Unionists on Tuesday last when an enormous sum of money was pledged to the cause profoundly affected the Government and now it is realized, says the correspondent of the Times, that Ulster can, and will fight if Home Rule is forced upon her head, that well informed persons in Dublin take the gloomiest view of the situation and do not believe that any compromise acceptable to Ulster can be devised, believing that a general election is the only way out of the difficulty.

MEXICO City, To-day.
Government officials, foreign residents and the people of Mexico realize that the relations between this country and the United States are strained almost to the point of war. John Lind who represents the President of the States is ignorant of the intentions of his Chief and if Huerta is anxious at all regarding what may develop, he does not betray it, al-

though he has sent to the Diplomatic representatives of Foreign Nations, a note which in effect is a defence of Washington. He was conspicuous in safes about town long after midnight and indulged in relaxation in the company of his military friends. In a formal statement to the Diplomatic, Huerta said that it was now foreseen that recent elections were null, as to a few precincts which had participated in voting and that therefore the new Congress would annul the elections. A new election would be called and he would continue his program of pacification. More uneasiness is apparent at the American Embassy than at the National Palace. Opinion was freely expressed not infrequently accompanied by sneers, that the States would never intervene in Mexico. Mr. Lind expressed the views that this waiting policy would not be continued for many days. As is known here that he has recommended that all diplomatic negotiations with Mexico be terminated. At the American Embassy, it is regarded as logical that Washington perhaps to-day will furnish vital developments in the relations between the two countries.

Lovey, of Marytown, stated that the schooner Arnold, Thornhill, master, of Grand Bank, arrived at Marytown, Saturday night, and reported the losing of a member of the crew named Frederick Wetherall, who dropped from the main boom into the sea while unreefing sail, about four miles off Grand Bank. Deceased was seventeen years of age, single, and belonged to FORTUNE. No further particulars were received and an enquiry is being held.

Was Executed at Dawn.

Spanish Army Officer Shot by Firing Squad.

Madrid, Nov. 2.—A firing squad of Spanish troops at dawn to-day executed by shooting Capt. Manuel Sanchez, a Spanish army officer, found guilty by court martial for the murder of Don Garcia Jalon, a wealthy landowner, last May. Detachments of all the regiments in garrison witnessed the execution.

Capt. Sanchez was tried and condemned for the crime as a sequel to the confession of a woman, Luisa Sanchez, said to be his daughter, who was sentenced to 12 years imprisonment as his accomplice. Jalon was missing for several weeks after he had won about \$1,000 at cards, and the evidence showed that he had been enticed to Sanchez's flat and murdered by the officer, who, with the woman, cut up the body and threw it into an adjacent sewer.

Snatched From Death's Door

Hallifax, Nov. 4.—Artemus Oickle, an employee of the Cook Company, to-day while at work directing the movements of the big steam shovel at the south end terminals, was caught in the adjusting wheel of the mammoth machine and held for seven hours in a death grip. His body was in such a position that if the wheel had moved six inches one way or the other it meant death for the man by decapitation. At five minutes past ten o'clock to-night, after seven hours heroic and strenuous work on the part of his fellow workers, doctors and hospital attendants, the pinion supporting the big wheel was filed apart, and amid the cheers of hundreds of on-lookers the imprisoned man was released with no worse injuries than a grazed forearm and bruised and cramped body. The wounded man was immediately conveyed to the hospital and at a late hour to-night was resting easily. Oickle is a native of Bridgewater, aged 30 years, and unmarried.

Banks and Salaries.

Those who do business with the large banking institutions of this country will read with surprise and not without alarm, the statement that tellers and other clerks entrusted with the handling of immense sums of money are paid salaries as low as four hundred dollars per annum. It would be well if some of the money spent in erecting costly buildings, in paying large dividends and in piling up great reserves was used to meet the present day needs of underpaid employees. Even the large sum put away annually for superannuation funds, might better be employed in giving the clerks sufficient to enable them to keep up a semblance of the appearance their position demands. In the light of the information published to-day the occasional fall of a bank clerk, much as it is to be regretted, can hardly be wondered at. In fact, the wonder is that more frequent wrong doing is not told of.—St. John Globe

Cochrane Street Church.

Over one hundred persons were unable to find admission last evening to the above church. Many were desirous of hearing the eloquent preacher, Rev. Alfred Rogers, son of the late Dr. Rogers, while others were drawn by the "Songs of the Sea Service." Mr. Rogers delivered a telling sermon, taking as his subject "The Necessity of Personal Conviction." He spoke of the need there was for faith in God—a faith that not only believed in God's existence but also shaped the life in accordance with God's requirements. There was also needed a faith in Christ as the Son of God and the Saviour of the world—not merely counting him as a great man and a prophet only. Faith was required at the present day in the Bible—not that we should absolutely understand every part of it, but that we should take it as the Word of God and abide by its teachings and principles. We also needed a firm faith in prayer—that our prayers were heard and answered by Him who is the Creator of the universe and the Father of us all. It was only with such faith and conviction that a man could live a proper life here and face the Judgment Day. In closing he made reference to the presence of so many from the ships in port and likening life to a voyage, he asked if the anchor held in the storm as in the calm—had they faith in the eternal verities. The sermon was listened to with breathless attention by the crowded congregation. During the service the choir rendered several pieces, the solos being sung very sweetly and expressively by Miss Vincent. Miss Herder sang Gounod's "Hold Thou My Hand," and her full rich voice filled the church in the climax when faith gave place to the assurance of sight. The singing by the huge congregation was something not soon to be forgotten and the whole service was one the effect of which will linger long in the lives of those who had the privilege of attending.
