Chilly Days Ahead.

(From the New York Herald.)

An altogether abnormal demand is esponsible for the rapidly soaring cost of coal, according to reports gathered by departments of the Government. Exportation statistics furnished by the Bureau of Foreign and omestic Commerce show that for the nine months of this year ending with eptember the export of bituminous coal was more than 2,000,000 tons in excess of that for September, 1915, the ncreased export of anthracite for the me period being approximately 00,000 tons. The heavier demand is nestic, however, and comes from ctories working day and night on var orders. Many of their contract tain time penalties, so it is neces ary to lay in heavy supplies of coal s early as possible to guard against ilure to make contract deliveries atistics furnished by the Geologica rvey show that there is no shortage the supply of coal, and that the oads are carrying more than ever re. But there is a car shortage ving to the railroads having been able to purchase needed equipment ring recent "lean years." Here in ew York the price is doing a "leaps and bounds" act, and the supply in the ands of dealers is small. There may e chilly days ahead for those who id not do their coal buying early.
