Co., at Bell Island visited the city and made arrangements for the inspection of Wabana Company next month, when probably Lt. Col. Goodridge and staff will visit the island and report the progress made to London, Capt. C. Wearing Hayward was on duty with a squad of recruits. He is here from British Columbia for the winter and has been posted as special training officer. The Old Comrades also met and decided to hold a dance on Dec. 1st. The Band under Bandmaster Morris will hold one in the British Hall on the 25th inst. Paymaster Ash has been granted special leave of absence for 28 days and will visit

for week ending Nov. 27th Rev. and Lt. Fletcher. Next for duty 1st Orderly Sergt. Corp. Adams.

F. C. and duty chaplain Rev. Clayton. Parades next week as routine order No. 33. The following transfers were announced from A. to P. Co.; Ptes. Pottle, Hewardine, J. C. Crocker, R. Nichols, A. James, G. Richards and C. Moore. Next Thursday the O. C. will inspect P. Co. at 8.15. The Officers' Mess held meeting at the close of the parade. Mess Pres. Capt. J. A. Winter in the chair, and arrangements were made for the annual New Year's night concert in the College Hall, in which the leading vocalists will be asked to assist. The Finance Committee meets next week to consider the financial standing after the year and arrange for next year's income.

At the City Hall.

The regular weekly session of the Council was held last night. The Mayor and Councillors Ayre, Vinnicombe and Mullaly were present.

A note was read from Mr. M. McCarthy, re sewerage, in which he held that under the Act prompt payment was not required. This was for laying pipes, etc., in Waterbury Street. He offered to pay one-third down, the remainder in two yearly payments, carrying interest at 6 per cent. This was considered satisfactory.

A letter was read from Conroy, Higgins and Hunt, respecting a claim for Crown rents due on late Kenny's property. The firm are to be asked to see the City Engineer respecting the land in question.

Letters from A. H. Murray and Co. and W. Noseworthy were read, the former regarding a drain in Beck's Cove, the latter respecting alterations to Courtenay's building, Water Street. Both matters were attended to.

A letter was read from Dr. Tait, claiming a sum of money for damage to his service pipe by the erection of the arch there in August. Referred to the Engineer for enquiry, and if right the amount to be paid.

Plan of house for M. Williams was approved, and A. V. Duffy was given permit to lay a platform on New Gower Street.

On the report of the City Engineer, Dr. Macpherson was to be given the information as to cost of pipe for stable.

A light was ordered on Flower Hill and Casey Streets.

Permission was given P. C. O'Driscoll to shift a building on Fearer's Lane.

Uniforms for Inspectors were agreed to, and tenders will be called for same.

The services of the Impounder are to be dispensed with.

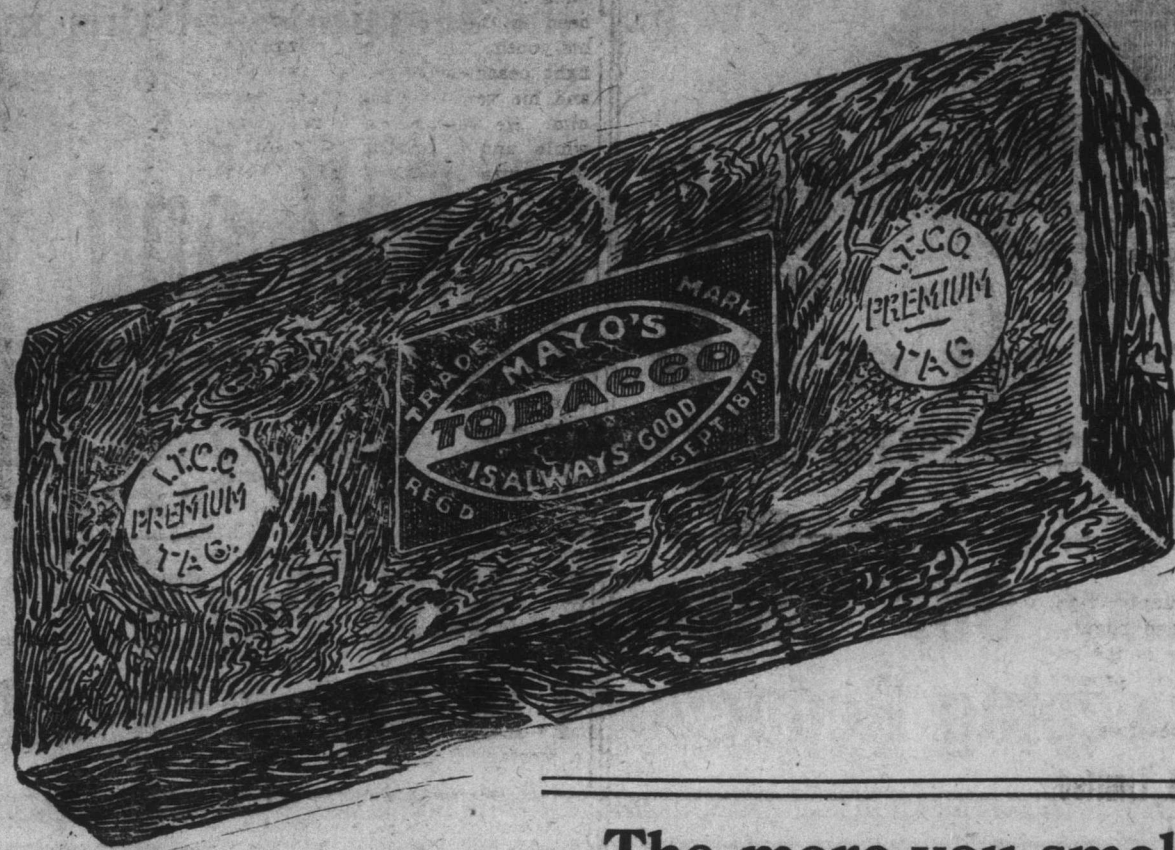
