Grand Falls Academy.**C. H. E. RESULTS.**

During the past three or four years it has become evident to the people of Grand Falls that the efforts of the A.N.D. Co. to provide educational facilities for the children of the town have been crowned with success.

The results of the C.H.E. examinations show the solid foundation laid in the lower school for the successes are no mere "flash in the pan," but a record of steady progress.

Thus 1917—One \$100 scholarship.
1918—One \$100 scholarship and five \$10 scholarships.

1919—Two \$100 scholarships and four \$10 scholarships.

1920—Three \$100 scholarships (one boy over age), and six scholarships of \$10.

The quality of the work has also improved, as is shown by the fact that the highest marks during these years have advanced from 77 to 84 last year and 86 this year.

Out of the 37 pupils entered, 34 passed, viz., Junior Associate 2; Intermediate 9; Preliminary 10, and Primary 13. In the Honours Division were placed 1 Jun. Assoc., 2 Inter., and 10 Prelim., while in the various subjects 83 Distinctions were obtained. In addition, the Primary class had 75 distinctions, the whole class having an average of 77 per cent.

The marked feature of this year's success is found in the Preliminary Class, where out of ten pupils entered, nine qualified for scholarships. The names of the successful pupils are given below.

Industrial Exhibition Well Attended.

Under the auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Girls' Department of the Seaman's Institute an exhibition of the Industrial work done on the Labrador was opened at the Institute yesterday. The affair attracted a large gathering, the toys made by consumers, the various articles of handicraft, attracted much attention and were readily purchased. The woollen goods, table runners, bags, etc., also made at St. Anthony were splendid specimens of needle craft. Samples of bedspreads, curtains, etc., made at the Red Bay Dispensary, of which Miss Pike is in charge, were also shown.

Miss Belwin, Secretary at the Mission Office in the Institute is taking orders for these goods. Rugs hooked by natives at various points along the Labrador were also displayed. These are hooked by women from designs and materials supplied by the Grenfell Mission, who find the work a means of earning power in winter. The rugs bear patterns of the seal, schooners in the ice, komatiks and scenes generally associated with the life of the Esquimaux. About \$56 in cash was taken and orders for nearly \$200 worth of goods were given.

The exhibition was open this morning and will be continued till 9 o'clock to-night.

Tests for 'Phone Girls.
MACHINE TO MEASURE "AWARE-NESS."
A suggestion that telephone operators should undergo psycho-technical tests, with a view to improving the telephone service, is made by Mr. E. S. Hodgson, of Coventry, who writes that a number of telephone operators in Berlin have been tested in this way recently.

The faculty of attention or "awareness" was tested on an instrument designed for that purpose, which enabled the authorities to weed out girls unsuited for this work.

"Although we made no tests of that kind, our operators have to pass through a number of trials," an official of the Telephone Service told a Daily Mail reporter. "Operators are medically examined and are tested by an expert staff of women. The tests include speaking, hearing, and general education. After passing the tests the operators attend a school for a month. One cannot become an operator in a few weeks or months. We do not get the best work from an operator until she has been two years at the work."
