LAST NIGHT'S GAME.

Robbie brought Walter safely across, and for his goodness to his brother, Billy slammed out a hot one scoring him Jimmy Power repeated for the rebels in their portion of the frame. It was now very dark and playing was really dangerous. Umpire Cheeman seemed desirous of calling the game fearing casualties but Irish Richard would not hear of such a thing with his team 1 run behind. Here O'Keefe showed his pluck by dispensing with his mask and ped at great bodily risk in order to enable him to give the Lions their twilight sleep. Then the Lions starting in a batting feat and assisted by a bunch of errors around first, Ellis, Munn, Kiely and Callahan romped home. The B.I.S. were unable to do anything in the last with Robbie sizzling them across, and thus the score ended 11 to 6 with a victory for the champions. It was a good exciting game and well worth witnessing. Cocky Munn did an excellent evening's work and figured in all the scoring. Messrs. TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DROWNED WHILE BATHING.
HOUSTON, Tex., July 21.—Twenty or more young people, mostly children, delegates to the Baptist Young People's Union Convention at Palestine, are said to have been drowned there to-day, while bathing. Fifteen bodies are reported recovered. The undertow caught the bathers.

ROYAL GARDEN PARTY.
LONDON, July 21.—King George and Queen Mary to-day gave a garden party at Buckingham Palace to some 4,000 guests. The spacious lawns presented a brilliant scene. All members of the Royal Family were present. The function was attended by various foreign Ambassadors and Ministers, Dominion Premiers, Indian nobles, members of the Government and others.

FATAL EXPLOSION.
BERNE, July 21.—Twenty persons were killed, and one hundred wounded to-day, in an explosion in a nitrate factory at Bodio in the Canton of Ticino. The explosion destroyed the factory and other buildings in the neighborhood.

STANDING PAT.
LONDON, July 21.—Despite a report by Allied High Commissioners from Oppeln, stating that Allied troops in Upper Silesia are insufficient in numbers, Great Britain still maintains it is unnecessary to send reinforcements at present, but believes that the Supreme Council should meet immediately to settle Silesian troubles, it was stated in official circles this afternoon.

Struck an Iceberg.

It has been learned that a.s. Stord, which left Bell Island on Wednesday night for Rotterdam with a load of ore, struck an iceberg, which about 130 miles off the coast. The ship though somewhat damaged is not leaking, and it is likely will proceed on her voyage. It was the Stord that rammed the a.s. Empress of Ireland some years ago in the St. Lawrence River with a consequent great loss of life.

Truck Leaves Road.

Whilst taking a load of luggage to Topsail yesterday afternoon, the big 16 ton truck belonging to the Colonial Cordage Co. skidded on Topsail Hill and left the road, going over a slight embankment on to marshy ground. After considerable difficulty it was replaced on the road, the luggage it was carrying having, in the meantime, been taken to Topsail on a smaller truck.
