ponsible for the amount of the ticket. No one can sue for the prize. Anyone can withdraw from an illegal lottery at any time before or after the event, provided it is before the prize has been distributed, and he may get back all the money he put into the lottery, but no more. Anyone may sue a person who conducts an unlawful lottery and is entitled to half the fine. Advertising a lottery which is not lawful is an offence, and in some cases a newspaper item may amount to an advertisement. A person who cheats at a lottery, or at any game of chance, lawful or unlawful, may be indicted for obtaining money by a false pretence. Betting on a sure thing, though unsportsmanlike, is not a breach of the law unless the bettor does or says something calculated to deceive. One of the stock arguments used by extremists is that what their opponents call a reasonable law will be no better observed than the extreme law. I think that the public should show them that they are wrong. In this way we shall do away with a lot of fanatical legislation. If some way could be devised to regulate lotteries for gain -that is, lotteries which give a profit to private individuals conducting them -there could be little objection to the lottery run by the bakers. Until then, we shall have to observe the law. Yours truly.
