

Sir George E. Cartier after recess replied on behalf of the Government. He pointed out that the High Joint Commissioners had acted strictly under the instructions of the Home authorities; and whilst admitting that it would have been better had the claims been presented, he argued that Canada could not control the Imperial policy. England, he said, had acted "gentlemanly" in making an apology for the Alabama raids, and that step had raised her character in the eyes of the world. She had been at nearly as great expense as Canada in repelling these raids, and withal her own claims as well as ours. In direct contradiction not only of Sir John A. Macdonald's recent statements but the record to be found in the official correspondence just published, Sir George declared that the Pacific Railway guarantee was given to satisfy the Fenian claims alone, and that the Treaty stood solely on its own merits.

Mr. Harrison moved an amendment to the effect that the discussion of the question was inexpedient. Mr. Mackenzie said the Government urged their censure in no measured terms, and surely the House was not to be precluded from also expressing its opinion. Mr. Mackenzie went on to show that many of the claims were direct and in no sense consequential or inferential. This was not a mere question of money; they had to consider what consequences must follow the condonation of an offence against the country's honor. The Fenians had received pardon and practical impunity. Whilst he proposed to amend Mr. Cartwright's resolutions in Committee, he should support the motion to go into Committee upon them.

Sir A. T. Galt held that we were continually expressing our opinion on the Imperial policy, and if entitled to thank or congratulate, surely we could censure. He pointed out that the commissioners at Washington had withdrawn but had not exceeded the Fenian claims; and that they went beyond their duty in expressing any opinion that weakened the ultimate hope of their settlement. He would vote for the motion to go into Committee. Dr. Tupper made a violent attack on Mr. Cartwright, and with a good deal of energy resisted the adoption of the resolutions.

Mr. Blake followed. He proved that all the speeches of the opponents of the resolutions went to show we might approve but not condemn; and if any one had been rash enough to propose a motion of praise it would have been welcomed by those who affected to condemn the utterance of a contrary sentiment. He criticized the proposed amendment, showing that no man could endorse it who had a proper sense of independence or a true national spirit. He admitted that the present relations of Great Britain and Canada were anomalous, but he urged that the best mode of arriving at a good understanding was by plain speaking. He moved an amendment: "That this House concurs in the view expressed by the Canadian Government with reference to the subject of the Fenian raids in their minute of Council, dated 1st July, 1870, in the following words:— 'The Committee of the Privy Council feel it their duty to express very strongly to your Excellency for the information of Her Majesty's Government the deep sense entertained by the people of the Dominion of all shade of party that they have not received from Her Majesty's Government that consideration and protection which, as loyal subjects of Her Majesty, they had a right to claim.' and in their minutes of Council, dated 28th July, 1871, the following words:— 'The principal cause of difference between Canada and the United States has not been removed by the Treaty, but remains a subject for anxiety.' And in the following words:— 'The fact that this Fenian organization is still in full vigour, and there seems no reason to hope that the United States Government will perform its duty as a friendly neighbor any better in the future, than in the past, leads them to entertain a just apprehension that the outstanding subject of difference with the United States is the one of all others which is of special importance to the Dominion.' And in the following words:— 'The failure of the Joint High Commission to deal with the question has been one cause of the prevailing dissatisfaction with the Treaty of Washington.' After considerable discussion the House divided on the H. H. Blake's amendment, with the following result:— For the amendment, 57; against, 100. The amendment was therefore lost.

Mr. Harrison's amendment was then put and declared carried on the same division; and the main motion, as thus amended, was also carried on the division.
