number of statements that sound extremely amusing now. He points out that few details should go into the government guarantee, as they might provoke too much discussion of the house. Such details, he suggested, should be contained in a private bill.

The Town Site Proposition. The use of the words town site should be avoided, because the opposition might insist on the government's getting a share. We must be careful to avoid any references that might provoke criticism.

On March 30, Clarke telegraphed from New York to Minty that "Friend had started and advised him not to get 'tangled in Winnipeg.'" The same date Minty wired Clarke from Edmonton that Biggar and Woods could not keep track of Cross, and that he might go to California or Honolulu as well as New York, and they did not know whether he had reached that city yet.

The Judges Laughed. Then Mr. Walsh read a letter of September 14, 1909, from Minty to B. R. Clarke that was so funny that the judges smiled. The Winnipeg lawyer outlined exhaustively a mode of procedure for organizing, in which he gave some pointers in jockeying shareholders, principals, and still kept within the law. His object apparently was to show how W. R. Clarke, with the assistance of his brother, could be the whole thing, as he expressed it, in the construction company as well as the railway company.

A Supply Company Also. To this he suggested that a supply company might also be organized to sell things to the construction company.

For the moment you and your brother do not want to appear in the construction company," he said, "a supply company, in which you could be interested, might be organized."

Keep Woodman's Mouth Shut. Another interesting letter was that from Minty to B. R. Clarke, in which he pointed out the expediency of keeping Woodman's mouth shut, as he talked of having made a lower estimate of the cost of construction than Goldfarb, and his associates advised that Woodman's claim be paid.

The Whole Thing Anyway. On May 3, Minty sent a telegram to W. R. Clarke, in which he said that he could act as the broker in the sale of the securities, take the commission, and use it as he saw fit, as he was the "whole thing" anyway.

W. L. Walsh, counsel for the Royal Commission, said this morning that the attempt of Minty and his associates to have the order of the King's court of Manitoba ordering them to give evidence before the commission at Winnipeg set aside would not deter the commission from going there. It is not thought probable the effort to block the investigation will have any serious consequences.

The order set aside was made by H. A. Robson, counsel for Clarke, who when he made his sudden flight from the commission, announced that he had withdrawn as counsel for Clarke, intimating the reason was that Clarke had refused to come to Edmonton. This move indicates that he is still interested with the Waterways.

The commission has appointed Pittblado, K. C. of Winnipeg, to represent it in the case. The application to have the order set aside will come before Judge McDonald Saturday morning. If the decision goes against the commission, such voluntary information as can be obtained will be procured any how.

Talking of the Bonds. Woods in the early part of the day told of Minty's first visit to Edmonton in the fall of 1908, saying that Cross had come to his office and had introduced him, and spoke of the contemplated construction of a railroad to the north.

He believed the month was spent at that time, and he said that in presenting Minty was that the latter and Woods might discuss the form of the mortgage bond. Woods said he did not intend to do so, but he would be reasonable, because the bonds would be in competition on the market.

Woods said that he had called into his counsel Prince Furstenberg, and he said that the latter had been told by the Berlin society, that he declared that the price in the market was \$100,000.

Prince Furstenberg is the real maker of Germany's policies today, not Imperial Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg. Silent, solidly, skilful, he is the most vexatious problem European diplomats have to grapple with. Tenders of the chancellery are ordered, preferring to prompt the emperor and be free from the drudgery and responsibilities of office.

After Maximilian Harden's notorious disclosures made Prince Philip zu Eulenburg permanently an outcast from the Berlin court. Emperor William looked earnestly about for a new confidant to whom he could unburden himself at intervals, and in whom he would be certain not to be disappointed.

The World Mourns AT AUTHOR'S DEATH. Press From All Parts of World Refer to the Work of Mark Twain.

London, April 22.—The British public, who report the death of Mark Twain's last illness with deepest sympathy and the news of his death will be felt as a national loss. All of the London newspapers publish extended sketches of his career with portraits and reminiscences, especially recalling his last visit to England in 1909 when Augustus Burrell, chief secretary for Ireland, presiding at the Pinner dinner, paid an eloquent tribute to Mark Twain as a man of letters.

The Morning Post says that he enjoyed a popularity in Great Britain rarely exceeded by any American man of letters.

The Daily Mail says that it is no exaggeration to say that Mark Twain was the greatest humorist the modern world had known.

"With the exception of Tolstoy," says the Morning Leader, "scarcely a more universal emotion of respect and regret." Mark Twain leaves a blank in the purely human literature.

Nearly Four Score Years. Salt Lake City, Utah, April 22.—"Mark Twain lacked only six months and nine days of four score years," said Judge C. C. Goodwin, a veteran editor, in commenting on the death of the humorist. "I know he said that he was only 72," continues the Judge, "but when we were in Virginia City, Nevada, Mark was older than I, and I am 78. Here is the record of it." He owned a book of biographies by Amelia J. Carver, published in 1899. There it was, "Samuel L. Clemens, born Nov. 30, 1834."

At His Boyhood Home. Hannibal, Mo., April 22.—The news of the death of Samuel L. Clemens was received with profound sorrow in Hannibal, his boyhood home. Many of the characters in his earlier books are still living here. All business places and city offices will be closed on the day of his death, and the funeral services will be held at the same hour as the services in the east. A movement has been started to have the "Clemens Boyhood Home" purchased by the state and State Senator McAllister, said that a bill to this effect would be introduced in the next legislature.

Mark Twain Memorial Library. Reading, Conn., April 22.—The free public library which the Literary Colony here is building, will start as a permanent monument to the town's most distinguished humorist. The building is to be known as the "Mark Twain Memorial Library."

One of Mr. Clemens' last acts was to donate a cheque for \$500 to the contribution towards the building fund. Dan Beard, Ida Tarnell, Jessie Child and Dr. W. C. Denning, whose wife is a great granddaughter of Nathaniel Hawthorne, have raised \$7,000 more and the work of erecting a building is to begin at once.

Besides his financial assistance, Mr. Clemens gave a great part of his private library to the institution. A few hours before his death Mr. Clemens conversed at length with his literary executor, A. Bigelow Paine, regarding his manuscripts. There is a large amount of unpublished work, besides his autobiography, which is a collection of incidents, and short stories of his life.

According to Mr. Paine, there are many who who, several long, and works and all the odds and ends of a lifetime of literary activity. There are stories which Mark Twain began and cut short either from fatigue or lack of interest. Then there are others which he finished, but discarded because he did not like them.
