Two coach loads of settlers from the States brought here by the Canadian Pacific Irrigation Colonization company will arrive this morning. A coach load of English settlers arrived at Starland yesterday.

There will be a special meeting of the directors of the Alberta Horse Breeders' association in the offices at Calgary on Thursday, May 12, at 2:30 p.m. to discuss matters connected with the proposed horse show building and general business.

Four new sprinkling wagons like those already in use will arrive from London, Ont., in three weeks, when Commissioner Clarke says it will be possible to sprinkle outlying areas such as those at Riverside and East Calgary, which are now very dusty.

The provincial license commission will meet in Calgary on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock to consider applications from district No. 4. On Tuesday they sit at Banff and on Tuesday they sit at Calgary again to deal with district No. 10, which is the Calgary district and city.

The Alberta Biscuit factory on the corner of Ninth avenue and Fourth street west was yesterday sold to Wm. Georgeron & Co. for the sum of \$40,000. The property consists of a substantial brick building on four and a half lots, with the truckage in the rear. The sale was put through by Messrs. Solan & Richardson.

Hugh Allan Fraser, 71 years old, died yesterday at his home, 625 Seventh avenue west, following a paralytic stroke he received a week ago. He is survived by a widow, two daughters, Misses Hattie and Carrie Fraser, and a son, Charles, residing in this city, and by a son in Chicago and two others on a ranch near Sturtevant. Mr. Fraser had lived in Calgary five years, coming here from Ontario.

City Engineer Child yesterday recommended to the commissioners that John Gunn & Sons, the contractors who built the gravity system, be compelled to pay Mr. May \$10 for the loss of his cow. When the excavation for the pipe line was filled in, it became very soft during the rainy season, with the result that when Mr. May's cow accidentally waded into it, it could not get out again.
