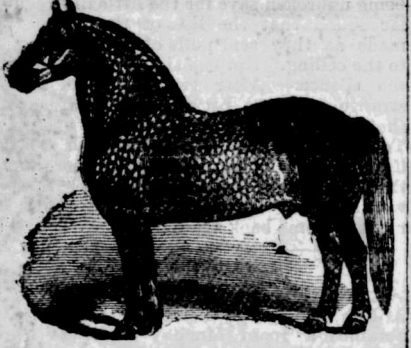

Randles presenting a gold ring, pin and cuff buttons, all beautifully engraved with the Masonic emblem, of which order he is a member:

To Mr. W. G. MacLachlan, B. A.—We, your present and former pupils in the Wardsville High School, learning with deep regret that your plans for greater usefulness necessitate your early removal from our midst, desire to express our appreciation of your constant and earnest endeavors to assist us in our studies and in our preparation for our work of life. We especially thank you for the deep interest you have always manifested in our temporal and spiritual welfare. We will always look back with pleasure to the days we have spent here together and we request you to accept these as a token of remembrance. We trust they may be the means of calling up pleasant memories of bygone days. Accept also the expression of our earnest wish that you may long live to wear them and accomplish much good in your future sphere of labor. Mr. MacLachlan replied in a very suitable manner. He spoke of the very pleasant times he had spent with his pupils in school, wished them all success in their school work, also in their career through life, and urged them above all things to take some great man as their ideal in life, and pointed them to one Great Man, Jesus Christ, as their best example.

Mr. MacLachlan has been in Wardsville for the last eight years and his departure will be deeply regretted.

Education and Crime.

Mr. Editor: Dear Sir,—Kindly allow me a space in your valuable paper in reply to a letter which appeared in the TRANSCRIPT, dated August 11th, and signed "Farmer" and headed "Does Education Prevent Crime." Now, Mr. Editor, Farmer says, "he has had the experience of the rate bill and free school system, but never could see the justice of taxing the land to educate the public," or, in other words, educate those that may not be so fortunate as to sign themselves Farmer. Mr. Editor, it seems to me if the late Mr. Ryerson, or Mr. Crooks, and lastly Mr. G. W. Ross, as Ministers of Education, were ornamented with craniums like Farmer our present school system would be a blank. But it is not only we as Canadians who boast of it, but it is a fact acknowledged by all civilized nations that it is one of the most liberal school systems in the world, not excepting our cousins across the line.

Again, Farmer says the village of Middlemiss wants to tax the neighboring farmers for a village school, which is as far from the truth as his narrow, diseased and contracted brain from honesty, charity and benevolence. There is an old adage which reads thus, "Do unto others as you would wish to be done by," which I would like Farmer to commit to memory, for I am afraid he has never heard nor seen it. Now, the village school as he calls it will not be nearer than a mile to the village if the section is divided as prayed for in the petition. Again, Farmer says, "Education encourages Crime," forsooth, what a statement to make in a public journal! To show Farmer that he has rooms to let in his upper storey concerning such a statement I will refer him to any of our common jail records. There he will see out of every twenty committed probably four can read and write perfectly; perhaps six can read and write imperfectly, and on the other hand ten can neither read or write. So much for education producing crime. Now, I would like to ask Farmer what has been the means of enlightening, or I might say civilizing the world? Was it pursuing a course like Farmer advocates, or was it our educational institutions, viz., our high schools, colleges, &c., which municipalities and Governments have endowed annually with large sums of money, thereby showing liberality, which Farmer seems to know nothing about. Gladstone, the late Premier of England, and styled by both sides of politics, "the grand old man," said on one occasion, "Give me educated men and I will show you a prosperous people." Then Farmer goes back forty years to get evidence to bear out his case, citing the postmaster of Glencoe, the treasurers of Ekfrid and Caradoc and county warden, all men of education who made free with other people's money. To show Farmer how absurd his argument is I would ask, Who ever heard tell of a township treasurer, postmaster, county warden or a bank teller being an illiterate man. I can name hundreds, nay thousands of educated men who have turned out ornaments to church and state to Farmer's one who have turned out bad. I can understand Farmer's motive for rushing into print. In such an elaborate epistle he no doubt thought he was dealing a death blow to the school difficulty which has been agitating the eastern portion of S. S. No. 1, Ek-

frid, for the past two years, which will be arbitrated upon in a few weeks when the facts will be laid before the arbitrators, showing the disadvantages some 50 children in the village of Middlemiss alone, not counting children residing east of the village, will be under in being obliged to travel three miles to school, a distance out of all reason in this enlightened age, I am satisfied that the grievance will be removed.
