In order to keep pace with their ever-increasing trade Messrs. Smallman & Ingram have secured a new device in the shape of a parcel delivery. It consists of wire baskets constructed on a similar plan as the ordinary cash carriers, running from all parts of their large establishment to an elevated inclosure. By meaus of these carriers the clerk avoid the delay of wrapping up the purchases of the oustomers. The goods, bill of sale and cash are all deposited in the basket, which is operated by gravitation, and by it carried to the inclosure. Here the proper change is made, the goods neatly done up and returned to the department from which they came in an incredibly short time. By use of the new contrivance the firm rightly calculate that the work of attending to the wants of the large number of customers can be simplified and conducted with greater dispatch.
