The wind has been light westerly on Lake Ontario, and easterly on the other lakes. E. Lewis, Belmont, had his hand badly cut by a circular saw the other day.

Mr. G. Cooper, of Missouri, formerly a resident of Belmont, is visiting friends at the latter place.

Charles Ryckman, charged with a breach of the Fire Arms Act, was discharged at the Police Court to-day.

Michael O'Meara and John Mason, charged with being disorderly, were fined \$2 each by Police Magistrate Parker this morning.

There was a very small market to-day, evidently caused by the large number of electors attending nominations throughout the county.

Union village expects to be connected with St. Thomas and London by telephone in a few days. This will be a great convenience.

Examinations are in progress at the Chapter House. There are eleven candidates for deacon's orders, five of whom are from Huron College, two from Wycliffe College, Toronto, and four from elsewhere.

Two panes of glass were broken in a window in the rear of J. & D. Ross' store, Richmond Street, by some person or persons evidently with the object of robbing the store. Bars on the inside of the window prevented them from accomplishing their object.

Miss M. K. Thorne, of Mitchell, sister of C. S. and W. H. Thorne, of this city, was married recently to Mr. Wm. Levy, grocer, at the residence of her father, Mr. Wm. Thorne, of that place, by Rev. Mr. Mills.

Death has been unusually busy of late among the priesthood of the London

Diocese. Rev. Father Herfman, of Lis-towel, who has just died, making the third death in the district since the departure of Bishop Walsh for Toronto last November. The little son of Mr. Fred. Fortnaier, who was mysteriously shot while standing in his father's doorway on Monday, is in a very precarious condition, and little or no hope is held out for his recovery. The mystery has not been cleared up yet, but it is learned, a slight pastorate has been obtained which would point to an accident on the part of some boys using a gun on the day of the shooting.

An accident of a very serious nature occurred on the heights at Fort Stanley Monday afternoon. A number of young men were playing ball, when one of them threw the ball wildly, with the result that a book agent, who has been in London for a short time, was struck behind the ear and knocked senseless. He was picked up, restoratives applied and brought to consciousness. He fainted three times after this, and in the evening was scarcely able to take the train for home. His name could not be learned.—[St. Thomas Daily Times.

Rev. Calvin Shaw, brief mention of whose death appeared in yesterday's Advertiser, was one of the best known and most earnest workers in the mission field of the Methodist Church in the Dominion. The reverend gentleman's health had been failing for nearly two years, and in November last he was reluctantly compelled to abandon work in connection with the church. He was placed on the superannuation list, and went to Toronto with his family on Saturday, but on Tuesday he died of a combined attack of apoplexy and asthma. Mr. Shaw was born in Lancashire, England, in the year 1836. He came to Canada at the age of 31, and engaged in mission work for the New Cession Methodist Church. He has held charges in various parts of the Dominion, and was regarded as one of the most earnest and zealous ministers in the Methodist circuit. His first pastorate was in this city, whence he was transferred to Montreal. During his ministry of over 30 years he was called to labor in many fields, his last charge being at Novar, Muskoka, which he undertook about a year ago.

His Record.
A correspondent writes: "Probably the electors of West Lambton will not be acquainted with the record of W. W. He has been a standing applicant for a Tory nomination in East Middlesex for many years, but never succeeded in having enough popularity to carry the convention."**The Festival.**

Last night at the promenade concert friends began to file in very early in the evening, and soon the building was crowded by a thoroughly appreciative audience, moving round the central booth. "D" Company land was in attendance, and under the management of Bandmaster Fisher, assisted by Drum Major Burns, discoursed suitable music, much to the enjoyment of those present. The rendering of "Ella Waltzes," "The Soldier's Lost Charge," "Return of the Warriors," "Light and Shade Waltzes," "Harp of Erin," "Medley Rhythms," and "Sally Maria" were especially well performed. The sales during the evening were very gratifying, and the ladies in attendance feel highly elated over their success, which they hope will continue till the festival is closed, which will be to-morrow. A good programme has been provided for this evening and an enjoyable time may be looked for.**Legal Decisions.**
The following cases were dealt with yesterday at Osgoode Hall: Whitlam vs. Kidd—Counsel for the execution creditors Whitlam & Co. and E. Leonard & Sons, appeared from Mr. Galt, C.J., in chambers, affirming an order of the master in chambers directing the appellants to pay to the execution creditors the Bank of Hamilton a portion of their costs of a certain action brought by them and of interpleader proceedings. Appeal allowed with costs here and in chambers and orders set aside in so far as it relates to the cost of the sheriff upon the application of the interpleader order. **Hueston vs. Village of London West.**—Counsel for the defendants moved to set aside the verdict and judgment for the plaintiff in an action for damages for negligence in keeping a road in bad repair and to dismiss the action. The plaintiff, while driving over Walker street in a cab, met with an accident owing, as he alleged, to the bad repair of the road. The defendants contend that Walker street is not within the village of London West, according to the construction of the by-law incorporating it as a village, and also that upon one of the findings of the jury the plaintiff is guilty of contributory negligence. Counsel for the plaintiff showed cause. THIRSTING FOR FAME.**A Host of Applicants for Positions on the Fire Brigade—No. 3's Deliverations.**

No. 3 Committee met last night. Present: Aldermen Boyd (chairman), Heaman, Wallace, Bartlett, Chief Roe, Electrician Crawford, Inspector Bell and Secretary Graydon.

Mrs. Thomas Whistow applied for space No. 13, west of the Market Square, which was granted on the condition that she pay \$12 in advance.

The monthly report of Inspector Bell showed that \$2,708 50 was collected for licenses since April. Report filed.

Charles Dunn, W. J. Brazier, C. Lindsay, Michael Welch, James Webb, John Tanton and W. O'Hearn applied for positions on the fire department.

Ald. Boyd said they had about 100 applications now and they would have to get them all on the Market Square to decide on the best one.

Thomas Garside was granted \$2 40 rebate on a market stall, on motion of Ald. Heaman.

Mr. Ball, who was present, was heard in reference to a stall rented to Mr. J. Egget a short time ago, which he claimed should have been rented to him. On motion of Ald. Bartlett, Mr. Ball will be allowed to rent the stall in a month, by which time Mr. Egget's lease will be expired.

The monthly pay-sheet of the fire department, amounting to \$680 40, was presented by Chief Roe.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid: Smith Bros., \$8 89; Wm. Ironsides, \$2 91; Wm. Ironsides, \$2; Wm. Ironsides, \$7 10.

Chief Roe called attention to the condition of the roof of the stable at the fire hall, and said that a new roof was required.

Ald. Boyd and Ald. Heaman thought that repairing the old building was throwing money away, and that a new building was needed.

Ald. Wallace said there was a great many calls on the finances at present, and that he did not think they could spare the money.

Ald. Bartlett was in favor of building, but nothing more was said on the subject.

The Engineer was ordered to repair a ditch out of order at the corner of the Masonic Temple and the market.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Western Fair Board re the electric light competition and see what steps had been taken.

Ald. Boyd said some information about the electric light plants had been gleaned somewhere, and that the committee should see some aerial ladder trucks, so that they could pick out the best one.

A number of specifications were read by Chief Roe to guide the committee in the purchase of a truck.

On motion of Ald. Wallace a recommendation will be presented to the Council to send the committee to Buffalo, Toronto, and Hamilton to examine electric light systems and fire trucks and also be accompanied by the City Engineer and the Chief of the fire department.
