—Mr. Thos. D. Hastings, of Detroit, has

—A number of interesting communi-
cations received to-day are held over on
account of lack of space.

—The annual missionary meeting of
Christ Church, Glenworth, will be ad-
dressed by the Bishop of Huron on Wednes-
day evening.

—The patrons of the Cove Rink have
formed a "shinney" club. They are mak-
ing arrangements for a match with one of
the city clubs.

—Charles McKenzie, the boy without a
home except police shelter, has found em-
ployment with a benevolent citizen and has
been released from jail.

—Mr. H. Johnson, of 230 Piccadilly
street, has disposed of his 290-acre farm in
Haldimand and purchased the stock and
goodwill of T. Parkinson, Thedford.

—A Beachville correspondent writes: The
Beachville line men expect to have the new
process of manufacturing lime by petroleum

in operation the coming week. James
Fairbairn, of London, is making the
burners.

—The bursting of a waterpipe in the
King street school yesterday caused a
miniature flood in a corner of the room.
The fluid was turned off without the neces-
sity of dismissing the pupils.

—The Princess Rink had a large quota
of skaters on Saturday. The Seventh
Band was in attendance. Since street
Central avenue, Westminster and the Cove
rinks also had large crowds.

—The Cove Sunday did not have its
full complement of skaters, as on previous
Sundays. There was a noticeable falling
off in the number of girls who allowed
themselves to break the Sabbath.

—The special services in connection with
the Wellington Street Methodist Church
will be continued this evening during the
present week. Conductor Slater will ad-
dress the meetings on Tuesday and Thurs-
day evenings.

—Rev. A. Tolmie, well known in this
city, slipped on the ice at Purgoyne the
other evening and was rendered un-
conscious by a severe blow on the back of
the head. With care he will soon be
around all right.

—Rev. Anthony Gilmore, a missionary
from the Algoma district, preached in the
Memorial Church Sunday morning. The
reverend gentleman took his text from
Matthew, x., 42, from which he delivered
a very impressive sermon. During the
course of his remarks he pictured to the
congregation the many trials and hardships
that missionaries in that country were
compelled to undergo.

—It is now thought that the Board of
Dundas Street Center Church will prevail
on Mr. Hicks to decline the offer which he
received from Montreal. Final action
will be taken at a meeting which will likely
be held this week.

—The Y. F. S. C. E. in connection with
St. Matthew's Church held an "at home"
Friday evening at the residence of the pas-
tor, Rev. Mr. Seaborn. Over 70 guests
were made perfectly at home and enjoyed
themselves thoroughly.

—Rev. G. Trotter Carr, in his Sunday
morning discourse, referred to having met
boys and young men walking through the
streets, each carrying a pair of skates, and
made the incident the text of some special
remarks to the young people of his con-
gregation.

—Mr. and Mrs. A. Jury, formerly of
London, entertained the choir of the King
Street Methodist Church at their residence
on Thursday evening last. An excellent
lunch was provided and a most enjoyable
evening was spent by all. Prof. Hicks of Lon-
don, was present and entertained the com-
pany with some very fine instrumental
music and songs.—Ingersoll Chronicle.

Anniversary in London West.

The anniversary services of the London
West Methodist Church Sunday were
well attended, two interesting sermons
being preached by Rev. Dr. Briggs, of To-
ronto, a pioneer in the London ministry.

In the morning his remarks were based on
John i., 35-46, in which Christ asks the
disciples who saw him and followed him to
"Come and See." The speaker held per-
sonal religion as a personal knowledge of
Christ, and the foundation of the Christian
structure to be brotherly love. The reverend
gentleman's discourse in the evening was
another able and timely one. From this the
text was taken: "That which is sown in
the world in Ezechiel ix., 28: 'That these
days of Purim should not fail among the
Jews, nor the memorial of the fast which
celebrated the frustration of the plot to
destroy the Jews in the days of King
Ahasuerus, and which has ever been com-
memorated by that nation.' From this the
speaker pointed out the lesson to the
Christian Church, that it should keep in
remembrance such days as were momentous
in its history. In individual life the days
of regeneration, days of conversion, days of
bereavement and of providential inter-
pretation should always be remembered. As
gratification was to neither so no memory was
to mind; even imagination found the sub-
stance of the dreams in the memory it
held, and every association unlocked its
treasures. "I am glad to be in this old
building again," said the speaker, "where
memory is dear. I can talk of the old
members of twenty years ago. It seems
but a short time, and the coming years
shall soon pass by, when we shall be no
more; but I trust we shall be in a better
land. Let us make the present better than
the past."

Original Remarks.

The missionary anniversary services of
Wellington Street Methodist Church, drew
large congregations to that place on
Sunday. Rev. Dr. Burr, principal of
the Wesleyan Ladies College, Hamil-
ton, occupied the pulpit at both
services, and preached two sermons, in
which the work of the Methodist Church
was clearly shown. In the morning the
doctor based his remarks on Romans, x.,
14: "How, then, shall they call on him in
whom they have not believed, and how
shall they believe in him of whom they
have not heard, and how shall they hear
without a preacher?" The reverend gentle-
man, after pointing out the growth of
Christianity during the past 1,800 years,
when there still remained two-thirds of the
human race who had not heard of the
Gospel severely criticised the action
of the churches for spending such a
large portion of the money collect-
ed on church-building and church-
decorations. There seemed to be too much
pride taken by church members in the
growth of home missions. The church in
America gloried in building at the rate of
four churches a day, while it gave but two-
thirds of a cent per member every 30 days
for the support of the foreign mission.
To convert the heathen. In the early years
of the Methodist Church the contributions
to missions amounted to about 2 cents per
member a week. It raised until in 1862
it amounted to 5 cents per member; but at
the present it was a fraction less. "Sup-
pose," said the doctor, "that every member
of the Methodist Church in the United
States, Canada and Europe gave just 1 cent
a day for one year, about \$17,000,000 would
be raised, which amount would be more
than the total contributed by all the Chris-
tian churches for the same period of time."
The distribution of the funds collected for
missions in Canada he declared to be un-
equal, and stated that there were men in
Toronto, who were manipulating almost 50
per cent. of these funds for their own use.
In conclusion, the preacher urged the
Methodist Church to wake up, not that
they were behind other churches, but be-
cause they could do more if they wished.
They did not need more preachers, but
they needed more of the spirit of Christ.
The evangelization of the world depended
upon them, and without the effort on their
part the world would remain as it was.
The discourse proved highly instructive and

was doubtless appreciated by the large and
attentive audience.

A Winnipeg Divine.

At St. Andrew's Church Sunday morn-
ing Rev. Dr. Robertson, of Winnipeg,
preached an excellent sermon on mission
work in the Northwest, taking for his text
Luke, xiv., 45-48. Dr. Robertson gave
an outline of the work being done among
the Indians and Chinese, and said that the
great deal more might be done if the
church only had the necessary funds, and
read several urgent letters sent to him
asking for missionaries to be sent. The
work was being greatly kept back, and he
urged the people to do all they possibly
could to aid in this work. "Among the
Chinese," he said, "a great deal is being
done, but there is not enough, as many go
back to their native country and tell of the
little that is being done to aid them in this
respect. Dr. Robertson told of a settler
who came to him during one of his visits
and said he had been a settler for 25 years
and a missionary had not been sent to
them. "We have," he said, "about 2,500
settlers in the schools at the mission sta-
tions. There are several gentlemen who
give the church enough to send out a mis-
sionary, and several have been sent out in
this way during the past year. During a
recent visit to Nova Scotia and New
Brunswick I received several such offers.
There are 20 districts waiting for a mis-
sionary to be sent, but until the funds come
nothing can be done." Several stations
had built their own churches, manse, and
supported their own minister. Others had
no church, but would have to pay \$5 for
the rent of a hall for every service.

In the evening, Rev. Dr. Robertson de-
livered a stirring address to a large con-
gregation in St. James' Presbyterian
Church, basing his remarks on Acts, i., 6-8.
He believed the West had a great future
before it. There were gold, silver and coal
mines to be developed, but mission work
had to be advanced also. Two-thirds of
the religious people of the Northwest were
Presbyterians, and the speaker contended
that it should be the duty of that church
to support the Northwest mission work before
the India, China or African fields, and be-
lieved that Great Britain, instead of laying
its millions of pounds as every year, should
assist those foreign mission fields. The old
country was quite willing to dump its
surplus population on this side, but did not
give much towards attending to their
spiritual welfare. He closed with an appeal
to the Presbyterian churches to assist the
mission work in the Northwest, and gave
several instances of how sin abounded where
people were left to themselves, more par-
ticularly in mining and lumbering camps,
where drinking, gambling and other sinful
pastimes were perpetrated on the Sabbath.
The collection taken up at this service was
for the benefit of the mission work.
