THE TOP.

Twenty-five horses from the Pleasanton Stock Farm, California, sold at auction at New York on Wednesday for \$26,675.

Mr. Christopher Armstrong, of Kintore, has purchased from A. Rosier, of Crompton, the famous Clyde stallion, Storm Signal.

Membrino Wilkes, son of Great George Wilkes, by Lady Christmas, was sold at auction at Oakland, Cal., a few days ago for \$3,300.

The Port Huron Driving Park Association will give \$7,000 in purses at a meeting to be held about July 1, and \$10,000 in purses and purses at the fair in September and October.

A bill regulating racing has been presented in the French Chamber of Deputies. The bill contains four clauses. It provides that no racecourse shall be opened without Government sanction, and that no racing society shall be authorized unless it has been formed to encourage horse breeding and has been approved by the Government. The police and other arrangements for the racecourses are entrusted to the society concerned. There is no reference to betting in the bill.

A Louisville, Ky., dispatch says: Judge Thompson this morning rendered a decision in the celebrated pool room case. It is in the nature of a sensation. He holds that horse racing is not a game of chance and that pool rooms cannot be prosecuted under the gambling laws. He therefore dismisses the defendants, who include the proprietors of the five pool rooms in the city. An appeal will be made, and, if the judgment holds in the higher court, at least a dozen new pool rooms will be started in the State.

Rev. Mr. Arney, who was reprimanded by the Michigan Conference for giving a trotting matinee, has sold a horse from his string of trotters to New York parties for \$3,000.

The entries for the colt races at the fall meeting of the Cleveland Driving Park Association, include 40 2-year-olds, 48 3-year-olds and 32 4-year-olds. The purse for 2-year-olds will be \$1,500, for 3-year-olds \$2,000, and for 4-year-olds \$3,000.

An experiment has been tried in France during the recent cold weather in riding horses without shoes on ice and snow. Ten horses were picked out at haphazard, their shoes taken off, and the riders ridden on different pieces over all sorts of ice and snow, doing 60 miles for five days, at the end of which time their feet were not in the least damaged.

The novel coaching race between the Earl of Londale and the Earl of Shrewsbury, which resolved itself into one against time by the former, was started on Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock from Kinnerley Manor, and the road was between Relgate and Crawley. The time occupied by the Earl in covering the 30 miles, which was the length of the course, was 26 minutes, 50 4-5 seconds. On the completion of his task the Lordship received a perfect ovation. The time Lord Londale took to beat was one hour, so that he finished with over three minutes in hand, a truly remarkable achievement under any circumstances, but more remarkable still when it is stated that the roads were deeply covered with snow. Lord Londale rode in an American buggy, the property of Richard K. Fox, who has cabled him a present of the breed in Ontario.

CHIEFS. Chess players in London are anticipating the visit of a Russian lady and her husband who have beaten everybody in their own country. The lady has, so the story goes, already won back by her successful play the fortune her father lost by gambling.

THE KENNEL. A meeting of gentlemen interested in the organization of a kennel club in Toronto met Thursday, R. W. Boyle in the chair and 20 or 40 present. A committee was appointed to draft a constitution and rules and will report next week.

Mr. J. P. Bumpfield has a kennel of deerhounds at Niagara Falls, the only ones of the breed in Ontario.

BASEBALL. Manager Martini, of New York, offered Pitcher Tim Lincecum \$5,000 to sign a contract to play in the Giants. Lincecum refused to sign for less than \$4,500.

A certificate of incorporation of the Buffalo Olympic Baseball Association (the International club) has been filed. The capital stock is \$5,000, divided into 200 shares of the par value of \$25 each.

At a meeting of subscribers to the Worcester, Mass., baseball club Thursday night it was voted to discontinue further communications with the International League, and to send two delegates to the meeting of the New England League at Boston next Saturday.

THE HORSEMAN.

Lady Smuggler, an American trotter taken to Germany last fall, has been sold to go to Russia.

At Bradford & Co.'s recent sale in Kentucky, 437 horses were sold in the week for \$227,640, or an average of \$523 per head.

Onward has 22 representatives in the 230 list and is only 15 years old. No other stallion ever had such a showing at the same age.

The dam of Astell recently foaled a full brother, the horse being named Astell. The dam was foaled in 1890. The youngsters are owned jointly by C. W. Williams and Mrs. Barnhart. No name has yet been selected for Astell's brother.

All the leading authorities unite in recommending clean cuts in racing. In former years horses were fed out just as they came from the breeder, and as a consequence with every 100 bushels of oats the horses got from four to five bushels of dirt, weed seed, etc.

It is a mistaken idea to suppose that beauty of form and elegance of style and finish are incompatible with the trotter. Some of the finest performers are horses that even the average farmer would call handsome, extremely so, showing clean lines, a powerful neck, a well set head, and a fine style, and also of extreme trotting speed.

Opinions differ regarding the desirability of photographic representations of horses. It is said by some that the camera's work is calculated to prejudice the public mind, while others declare that only in photography is to be found a solution of the vexing problem: Who has won and who has lost? The management of the Jockey Club has decided to have every finish reproduced and remains an optical record. At Saratoga the books of the season are being made up, and the Jockey Club is busy in determining results. (New York Sportsman.)

Mr. George Anderson, of Greensburg, Ind., furnishes an example of very old horses. Some years ago Mr. Anderson became the owner of a mare by Iron's Calumet, and for a number of years he has been breeding her to produce a fine horse in Indiana at the time. As a result he sold four geldings out of this mare for \$1,700—all of them untraced, and still in the hands of the breeders. The mare, by Pilot Duro, that is worth quite a snug little fortune, and they in turn are producing valuable colts each year.

Horse World: Nearly all the stallions in the country that are standing at fees ranging from \$300 to \$1,000, have their books nearly or entirely filled, while the stallions that are standing at low fees have plenty of vacant places. News of the Day Without Note or Comment.

Cost of the Canadian Militia Department—Stabbed with a Penknife.

CANADIAN.

One hundred and fifty pupils attending the Provincial Model School at Ottawa are laid up with the mumps.

Premier Meier and Provincial Treasurer Shepley, of Quebec Province, sail from New York for Europe to-day.

The expenditure of the Militia Department for the year ending Dec. 31, 1890, is placed at \$1,287,014 55, besides which is \$20,700 paid to 224 pensioners.

At Ottawa yesterday, F. H. Gamache was stabbed with a penknife near the heart by one of two men, Philip Groulx and Adland Riche, in a quarrel. The men were arrested.

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The United States Government has granted a life pension of \$12 a month to J. Bambrick, of Ottawa, as well as a gratuity of something like \$400. Mr. Bambrick went through the civil war.

Friday afternoon a deputation from the Sanitary region waited upon the Provincial Minister of the Interior, Mr. Tupper, to whom some suggestions respecting the new mining policy of the Government in respect to the "nickel belt." The Attorney-General, on behalf of the Government, assured the deputation of their deep interest in the great question of mineral development, and thanked them for their attendance.

At 1 o'clock Friday morning what is believed to have been an earthquake shock was felt at Newburg, N. Y., and in the vicinity.

Miss Nannie Bayard, youngest daughter of ex-Secretary Bayard, is to be married to Count Lewenhaupt, son of a prominent Swedish politician and ship-builder.

A telephone message received last night at Newburg, Tenn., says the insane asylum about seven miles from there is on fire. There are about 500 persons in the asylum.

The collector of the port of San Francisco states that during the past four months 90,000 pounds of prepared opium, has been legally imported into that city. This opium is valued at \$1,800,000.

The United States Treasury Department is considering a proposition to reduce the annual catch of fur seals in Behring Sea, as fixed by the existing laws, in order to guard against possible extinction of the species.

A United States grand jury has found indictments against the Sioux Indian, Plenty Horse, for the murder of Lieut. Casey, during the late uprising, and one against Louis Williams for the murder of Patrick Miller, a ranchman.

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Floods following heavy snow storms have destroyed one-half of the winter crops in many places in Southwest Russia. The Volga has overflowed and inundated a great part of Warsaw. The inhabitants are in dire distress.

A dispatch from Durban, South Africa, says: It is rumored that a Portuguese gambler has attacked and captured the British South African Company's steamer Countess of Carnarvon while ascending the Limpopo with rifles and ammunition.

Educated Baboons. The Hottentots say that baboons can talk, only they will not, for fear they should be made to work; and there certainly is but little work to be got out of those cunning brutes. Nevertheless, we read of some baboons who have been taught to do useful work. There was an obituary notice a year or more ago in all the Cape papers of one of these trained baboons, well known in the colony, who used to act as signalman on the railway in place of his master, who was lame. The story was doubted by the English papers who copied it, but we have met with many people who had seen the animal at his work. Mrs. Carey Hobson, too, in one of her pleasant little "South African Stories," tells of a baboon who had come under her own notice, who had been taught to ride after a Dutch Boer as groom, and to dismount and hold the horse by sitting on the keys of various kinds taught to do a great many curious tricks, but in the same again, they have been rived by dogs—(Chambers' Journal).
