OLD WORLD WHEAT PROSPECTS

London, May 31.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the crop situation, says: "We are unable to share the view that wheat is making seasonable progress. It is not thick, and the ground growth since Easter has been extremely slow, but last summer's warmth is still in the ground, and the autumn store of moisture beneath the soil should protect us from at least moderate drought. The outlook is for a mediocre yield of 27 to 28 bushels. A hot dry June may improve the plant, but we don't believe the full average can now be obtained even under the most favorable circumstances. In France the weather has not been favorable. Even the Minister of Agriculture's good report of wheat only augurs a yield of 35,000,000 quarters, leaving 4,000,000 quarters to be imported. The Prussian and Polish wheat is promising, but cold rains in Austria have reduced the prospects. Russian reports are mostly encouraging. The population of American flour increases."

MONTREAL.

Montreal, Que., May 31.—There were about 550 head of butchers' cattle, 400 calves, 400 sheep and lambs and 50 store hogs and small pigs offered for sale at the East End Abattoir today. The butchers were out in full force and trade was good, with the prices firm all round, especially for small stuff.

Mr. George Nicholson bought 20 head of prime beefs at 4 1/2c per lb; pretty good stock sold at 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c; common animals at 2 1/2c to 3 1/2c; and the leaner beasts were bought before reaching this market. Among these was a lot of four good calves, which brought 3 1/2c. Common veals sold at from 32 to 34 each. Shippers are paying 4c per lb for good large sheep.

Butchers' sheep bring 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c per lb. Lambs sold today at 32 1/2c to 34 1/2c. Very few bringing over \$4 each.

Pat hogs sold at about 5 1/2c per lb. Store hogs sold at from \$4 to \$7 each, and young pigs from \$2 to \$4 each.

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The Plebiscite Discussed

By the Ontario and Quebec Baptist Convention.

Delegates Object to a Rider Being Attached to the Question—Close of the Church Convention.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The final session of the Baptist Church convention of Ontario and Quebec for 1897 was held this morning.

After devotional exercises the report of the superannuation board was read and discussed freely by Messrs. Revs. Sanderson, W. H. Cline, S. A. Dyke, Stark, Dempsey and James Couits.

It is to be noted that the conference is to be held in London this week. Special sermons will be preached in St. Andrew's Church on Sunday, June 20, jubilee day.

Rev. H. J. Uren, of London, occupied the pulpit of the Frank Street Methodist Church last Sunday, both morning and evening. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Hazen, preached Epworth League sermons in Hill Street Church, London, that day.

The committee interested in the jubilee celebration will meet in the hall of the Baptist Church next Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock.

At only one place on the globe has it been possible as yet for the meteorologist to make long-time forecasts meriting the title of predictions. This is in the middle Ganges valley of Northern India. In this country the climatic conditions are largely dependent upon the periodical winds called monsoons, which blow steadily inward from April to October, and seaward from October to April. The summer monsoons bring the all-essential rains; if they are delayed or restricted in extent, there will be drought and consequent famine. And such restriction of the monsoon is likely to result when there has been an unusually deep or very late snowfall on the Himalayas, because of the lowering of spring temperature by the melting snow. Thus here it is possible, by observing the snowfall in the mountains, to predict with some measure of success the average rainfall of the following summer. The drought of 1896, with the consequent famine and plague that devastated India last winter, was thus predicted some months in advance.

This is the greatest present triumph of practical meteorology. Nothing like it is yet possible anywhere in temperate zones. No one can say what may not be possible in times to come, when the data now being gathered all over the world shall at last be coordinated, classified, and made the basis of broad inductions. Meteorology is pre-eminently a science of the future.
