

CABINET CRISIS IN FRANCE

Melnie's Government Outvoted, 296 to 248.

Scene of Excitement in the Chamber of Deputies.

The British Military Commander for Canada Gazetted.

BRITISH MILITARY COMMANDER IN CANADA.

London, June 15.—Lord William Frederick Ernest Seymour, uncle of the Marquis of Hertford, has been gazetted commander of the British troops in Canada, to succeed Lieut. A. G. Montgomery Moore.

Sir Arthur Lawrence Halliburton, who was permanent under secretary for war from 1885 to 1897, has been gazetted Baron Windsor of Nova Scotia, where he was born in 1832.

RUSSIAN CONTROL IN CHINA.

London, June 15.—The Pekin correspondent of the Times, commenting on the increasing activity of Russia in China, says: "When the railway concessions are completed, Russia will have control of all the railways along which it will be possible to move troops for the defence of Peking. China was deluded into giving the contract for the Peking Han Kau Railway to Belgium as a small and unaggressive power, but the Belgian minister, Baron de Vinck, was merely acting on behalf of Russia and France, England sought to insist upon the right of first refusal of all railways in the Yang Tse region."

THE BERING SEA AWARD.

London, June 15.—The Times, in an editorial, which pretty fairly represents the feeling expressed by the other morning papers, says: "The resolution to pay the Bering Sea award is one of the gratifying instances of the growth of the spirit of friendship and justice toward England in a quarter where until recently such feelings were rare. It is a proof of the good feelings which we cordially recognize and reciprocate, as well as a good omen for the future. It is a proof of the closer and more cordial relations between the two countries toward which the best minds on both sides of the Atlantic have been steadily moving."

TROUBLE IN EUROPEAN TURKEY.

London, June 15.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Vienna reports fierce and sanguinary conflicts between the Albanians and Christians in the Uskub district of European Turkey, northwest of Salonica, and that there is great unrest along the Montenegrin frontier. The ports, according to the dispatch, has sent a threatening note to the Montenegrin representative.

VIENNA, June 15.—The Neue Freie Presse reports anti-Semitic excesses in the Gorlice and Pilzno districts of Galicia. At Lemberg (sometimes called Leopold), the capital of Galicia, a mob has pillaged shops and begun to attack the property of rich land-owners. The government has dispatched troops to the scene of disorders.

DEPUEW MISREPRESENTED.

London, June 15.—The Daily Chronicle publishes an interview with Dr. Chauncey M. Depew with reference to his recent report on the subject of French newspaper men on the subject of an Anglo-American alliance, and the relations between France and the United States. In the course of the interview Mr. Depew explained that the French papers had not correctly represented his views, declaring that he did not say that there would be an Anglo-American alliance, but that what he did say was that a specific alliance was not necessary or possible, because it ought to be a constant and cordial co-operation. Mr. Depew said also: "My statement regarding France and America was similarly colored."

RELATIONS OF BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES.

London, June 15.—In the House of Commons Mr. Douglas H. Coghlin (Conservative), member for Stoke-on-Trent, asked if, in view of the improved relations between the United States and Great Britain, the former could not be induced to modify its custom tariff. The parliamentary secretary for the foreign office, Mr. George N. Curzon, replied, saying that the government would be glad to avail itself of any opportunity for improving the commercial relations between Great Britain and the United States. But, he explained, Great Britain had the most-favored-nation treatment in all matters of commerce and navigation, and the government had no reason to believe that any favorable treatment would be accorded Great Britain.

CABLE NOTES.

Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, has requested the Dominion Government to execute the necessary papers in connection with the military burial ground at Montreal.

OUTVOTED

Crisis in the French Cabinet—Scene of Confusion in the Chambers.

Paris, June 15.—The Chamber of Deputies yesterday, by 296 to 248, voted a vote of confidence in the government.

Later, however, the Melnie ministry was defeated by a vote of 296 to 248, amid intense excitement and uproar.

Premier Melnie opened the proceedings by vehemently repudiating the statement that he was engaged in an anti-democratic policy, but he declared that the accession of socialism to power would mean ruin for France.

Ex-Premier Loubet, who had been unwilling to cut himself free from the Rightists, and several Extreme Leftists continued their severe strictures of the premier's "undemocratic policy."

M. Ribot then delivered a warm eulogy of the premier, and proposed a vote of confidence in the government.

But his terms elicited loud protests from the Rightists, and excitement ensued. M. Melnie, however, accepted the terms of the motion, whereupon M. Cassagnac charged him with throwing over the Leftists.

The premier retorted that he had never asked for the support of the Rightists.

The chamber, approving the declaration of the government, was then dissolved by a vote of 296 to 248, and the

second part—"is determined to put in force the policy of democratic reforms based on the union of Republicans"—was adopted by 255 to 5 votes. Thus far matter were comparatively smooth.

Then M. Henri Rivet moved to add the words "supported by a majority exclusively Republican." M. Melnie refused to accept this addition.

Rivet insisted on a vote, and the addition was carried by 296 to 248 votes, whereupon there was a terrible uproar. The members of the Extreme Right rose en masse and shouted for the retirement of M. Melnie.

M. Bertheaux yelled "Get out! You are defeated!"

Others, pointing to the ministerial benches, indulged in a chorus of "boos." The Socialists vociferated: "Resign! Resign!"

When a full occurred another vote was taken on the entire motion, which M. Melnie accepted, swallowing the noxious addition, and the motion was adopted by 284 to 272 votes. The Chamber of Deputies then adjourned until Monday.

In the lobbies of the chamber the opinion was freely expressed that M. Melnie would resign after the council.

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THE ASSEMBLY

Deals With Missionary Trouble in India.

Resolution Passed in Favor of Incorporation—First Board of Trustees Chosen.

Montreal, June 15.—At the session of the Presbyterian general assembly the committee on correspondence, recom-

mended that the ordained missionaries from Canada who have been one year in the field, and who have passed their first examination in the language, shall be a finance committee to prepare yearly estimates for their own work, to be forwarded to the foreign mission committee, and to have general supervision of the finances of such work.

The effect of the change would be to keep the finances within the control of the Canadian members of the missions. The fourth regulation they proposed should read as follows:

"That the Canadian members be constituted into a council, with the right to meet, discuss and formulate their views of all matters bearing upon their work, and to prepare estimates for that work, and to take such action as may be necessary for conducting the work, subject to the direction of the foreign mission committee; with right also to forward a statement of their views, with estimates of their work, to the foreign committee, and through the finance committee, and that in preparing their estimates the ladies' council be recommended to invite the assistance of the treasurer, and be eligible for membership in this council, missionaries must have passed the first examination in the language."

The committee's recommendations were adopted unanimously.

A resolution of condolence on the death of Rev. R. J. Grant, of Nova Scotia, who was killed in a street car accident, was unanimously passed.

Rev. Dr. Warden presented an overture from the synod of British Columbia, which recommended the general assembly to take the whole subject into consideration, and to adopt such modifications of the methods hitherto adopted as it may judge to be necessary, in view of the vast changes that had taken place in the mission field.

The discussion was not concluded when the assembly took recess.

At the afternoon sederunt Mr. Mortimer Clark, Q.C., of Toronto, explained the proposed act of incorporation.

There was no intention of incorporating the church, but it was proposed to incorporate a body of trustees, in which the property of the church might be invested, this body to be known as the Board of Trustees of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, which would be empowered to receive gifts and conveyances, and to make a legal transfer of them.

The committee on legislation appointed at the last assembly is to be re-appointed, with instructions to obtain such an act of incorporation from the various legislatures and the Dominion Parliament.

The body will consist of Rev. Dr. Warden, Rev. Dr. Morrison, Rev. Dr. MacLaren, Mortimer Clark, Hamilton Cassels, Justice McLennan and A. R. C.

It was decided that the next meeting of the assembly should be held in the central church in Hamilton, on the second Wednesday of next June.

Mr. J. K. Macdonald, of Toronto, presented the report of the aged and infirm ministers fund. The recommendations of the report that the executive committee of the previous year will be continued until the November meeting of the following year, and rule 6 be repealed and the following substituted: "That the rates shall be paid on or before the 15th day of January in each year," were adopted. It transpired that there was a deficiency of \$1,500 in the fund, although the books of Rev. William Brown, the late agent, were absolutely correct.

Rev. Dr. McCrae presented report of the special committee appointed to consider the aged and infirm ministers fund. Dr. McCrae said that the deficit in the fund was due to general dissatisfaction with the administration. The discussion was not concluded when the hour for adjournment arrived.

Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Renfrew, presented the report of the augmentation fund, western section. He referred to the fact that 250 congregations had been taken from the home list during the last fourteen years, and over \$40,000 were given during the year before last by congregations on the augmented list for missionary work. They not only had been able to make ends meet during the past year, but they had a balance on hand.

At the evening sederunt, Rev. Mr. McGillivray, of St. Johns, presented the report of the augmentation fund for the Maritime Provinces, expressing regret at the deficiency, which necessitated a reduction of 7 per cent in the grants, but recognizing the success of the working of the system.

Rev. Dr. Robertson, of Winnipeg, presented the report of the church and manse building fund during the past year. The board had assisted in building 22 churches and 5 manse. During the sixteen years it had been in existence the fund had assisted in building 306 churches and 63 manse. When the fund was started there were only three churches between Lake Superior and the Pacific coast, and now there are 305 churches, worth half a million dollars in money.

The various reports were adopted.

There was a solemn scene at Knox Church in the evening, when a funeral service was held over the remains of the late Rev. Mr. Grant, of Nova Scotia, a delegate, who was killed by a trolley car on Friday last. The remains were followed to the Grand Trunk station by nearly all the members of the assembly.

PUNDITA RAMABAI

Her Work of Saving Indian Child-Widows Vividly Described.

The Stirring Words of a Wonderful Woman.

Pundita Ramabai addressed a large gathering at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church last evening. This bright, heroic Hindu woman has a striking personality, and the story of her work among the destitute women of her native land was greatly impressive. She vividly described social conditions of her country, and the pitiful thrall of womanhood there.

Very Rev. Dr. Morrison, who presided, and when introducing the speaker briefly indicated the great success which had crowned her efforts among the child widows of India, a terrible scourge as one of the greatest blessings of that land.

The Pundita wore the snowy flowing costume of the Hindu woman, and as she spoke, frequently adjusted the white fold of the garment, which was thrown over her head, and made a striking contrast with her black curls and locks and pleasant bronze features. Her mastery of English is remarkable. She speaks fluently and vigorously, and although her accent seems difficult to follow, that is little sign of her personality.

HER LIFE.

Ramabai, when a child, spent her time in the forests, wandering around with her parents, in destitute circumstances, and in 1875, when the great Indian famine was felt so keenly in that country, her father, mother and a sister succumbed. Shortly after this loss, at the age of 22 years, she married a young lawyer, with whom she was going to establish a school for these young widows, but ere this plan was carried out the young husband perished. Not long after his death Ramabai accepted an opportunity to visit England, where she was appointed professor of Sanskrit at Cheltenham College, and where, at the same time, she improved her own education by studying the higher mathematics.

About ten years ago she accepted an invitation from a cousin to attend his graduation at Philadelphia. She was then filled with a desire to do something for the destitute women of her country, and she realized that in America she might find willing hands and hearts to assist her. She went about from city to city, endeavoring to organize the work of the Ramabai Association, and soliciting subscriptions for the establishment and maintenance of a mission school.

HER WORK.

She prospered immensely. The school situated at Poona, about 125 miles from Bombay, and is valued at \$60,000. It is a large stone building, and is the annual expense is \$5,000, and the average number of widows who attend each year, 50. That the same time, she is indicative of the liberality of the woman at its head. The inmates may cling to their old religion if they choose, but they almost invariably appreciate the blessings of Christianity sufficiently to accept it. Ramabai expresses great pleasure with the way the support of her work has been given, and now she urges that other schools be established. The association had been organized for a term of ten years only. Results fully justify its reorganization, and Ramabai is here for that purpose. After visiting Cleveland, she returned to India, and is now returning to her native land to take up her work with the support of a stronger organization than ever.

PEPULTRY SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

In the course of her address the Pundita made some remarkable statements about the social conditions in India. Widows were held responsible for their husband's death, and their lives are made as miserable as possible. Man is considered to be the incarnation of God, and women are considered to be his servants. Her only religion is husband-worship. Her babies are considered a dishonor and are often destroyed. They are married as quickly as possible, the parents often giving money to the husband. The girls are sold for 400 to 500 rupees in India from 4 to 4 years of age, 30,000 under 14 years, and 23,000 over that age, and all have to endure the life of drudges, rather than face which many women kill themselves. The noble life-work of Ramabai is to better the condition of these poor degraded creatures, and at her school many are taught and trained so that they are able to support themselves and their families. There are hundreds and fifty widows have been taught, and of these 23 are today engaged in active Christian work, and twice this number are Christians.

RAIN AND CROPS

Effects Upon All Kinds of Grain, Roots and Fruits Most Beneficial.

There were happy faces among the farming community on the market on Tuesday, on account of the recent rains throughout the country during the past few days. Hay and oats were specially in need of copious showers, and had it not been for the few wet days, hay would have been a decidedly slender crop. As it is now it will be one of the best on record. Many farmers feared that after the showers the heat would be excessive. This, they said, would have a tendency to burn out the pea crop and rust the wheat, which in this section of country produces to excel all other crops. Concerning roots, the general opinion was that they were in "fine shape." Potatoes in the low-lying and heavy lands have been washed out in some places, and at others it was feared that the seed would rot. Now that the cool weather has followed the rain, the farmers will feel gratified, but not so with the gardener, whose crop of berries will be put back some. The crop of small fruits from over all this district is reported to be exceptionally heavy.

THE RAILWAYS.

Continue to Show Increased Earnings—Freight Business Booming.

Grand Trunk earnings from June 1 to June 7, 1898, \$420,000; same week in 1897, \$418,185; increase in 1898, \$1,815.

Receipts from traffic on the C.P.R. for the week ending June 7, \$512,000; for the same week last year, \$469,000; increase, \$43,000.

An application will be made to parliament next session for a charter to build a railway from Pyramid Harbor to Fort Cudahy.

According to reports brought by the steamer Amur, from Skaguay, 220 men have been put to work grading the way to the lake. This work has been undertaken by the Pacific and Arctic Railroad Navigation Company of West Virginia, which, according to the charter and holdings of the British Yukon Company. Under the charter part of the road must be in operation by January.

Toronto Note: Freight business on the Grand Trunk Railway is increasing wonderfully. Yesterday two special trains left the cattle market for New York State points; 52 cars of boxed meats, valued at \$10,000, and \$14,000 worth of flour, were also sent for export over this line. A \$30,000 shipment of lumber was made yesterday from the Midland lumberyard, consigned to a New York lumberman.
