The General Elections.

Another Great Demonstration in Mr. Laurier's Honor.

Most Unscrupulous Tactics of His Quebec Opponents.

Yesterday's Gatherings in Various Parts of the Country.

Six Candidates Now in the Field in Hamilton.

MR. TARTÉ'S GREAT FIGHT.
Montreal, May 21.—Mr. Tarte is making a great fight in Beauharnois against Mr. Bergeron. He held a meeting the night before last in Valleyfield. It is a great manufacturing center, and the Conservatives declare that a Liberal victory would close up the mills. Hon. J. K. Ward, one of the directors of the Montreal Cotton Company, agreed some time ago to speak on behalf of Mr. Tarte in the face of the desperate efforts made by others interested in the company to refuse to support Mr. Laurier's policy, although he has several times spoken on behalf of Mr. Madore, the Liberal candidate. This Hochelaga, expressing perfect confidence as a manufacturer in the result of the Liberal success. Mr. Ward accordingly wrote Mr. Tarte as follows:

"Montreal, May 19, 1896.
My Dear Mr. Tarte—I am sorry that I cannot carry out the promise that I made you that I was to attend a meeting of yours to be held in Valleyfield. It is not necessary to give my reasons for coming to this conclusion. You can, however, state that I am quite in accord with the policy enunciated by Mr. Laurier that a revenue tariff, such as we must have to raise the necessary amount to run the government, must be sufficiently high to give all the protection required. I, therefore, am not afraid that either the working people or the proprietors will be injured by the Liberals coming into power or by Mr. Tarte being elected. The workingman has the ballot to protect him in the exercise of the franchise should any attempt at coercion be made. I hope that the people at Valleyfield will believe the ridiculous rumors that the mills will be closed in the event of the Liberals coming into power. Yours truly (Signed) J. K. WARD."

THE WESTERN OUTLOOK.
Winnipeg, May 21.—The Liberals of the city confidently count upon the election of Messrs. Martin, McCarthy, Richardson and Ashdown in Manitoba; J. M. Douglas in Frankfort; J. M. STILL THEY JOIN LAURIER.

Dr. M. A. B. Smith, formerly acting mayor of Dartmouth, N.S., and a life-long Conservative, is now a splendid worker in the Dartmouth Liberal committee rooms.

Laurier, and J. H. Ashdown are among the prominent Manitobans who were devoted followers of Sir John Macdonald up to and during the last elections, but are all now in the Liberal ranks and carrying thousands with them.

A gentleman who has arrived in Ottawa from Winnipeg says Mr. Martin will defeat Mr. Macdonald by 1,200.

AGAINST PRIDHAM, THIS TIME.

At a meeting of Conservatives held in the township hall, Blanshard, Monday night, a number of strong Conservatives got up and said they would not support Mr. Pridham in this election. There are also a large number of Mr. Pridham's former supporters in town who are talking and working against him.—St. Mary's Argus.

MR. LAURIER IN LEVIS.

Levis, May 22.—The great Liberal rally in Levis county which took place here last night was an immense success. Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Chas. Howard, J. A. A. Laurier, Hon. Senator Pelletier, Dr. Guay, ex-M.P. for Levis, Messrs. A. Turgeon, M.P. for Levis, F. X. Levesque, M.P. for Levis, M.P.P., and several other members and influential citizens were on the platform. In every street through which Mr. Laurier passed to reach the hall, flags and streamers were flying. Never before this day has the hall contained such a large and enthusiastic crowd. It was filled to its utmost by Liberals, Conservatives and ladies, many of them having driven 25 miles to come to greet the chief. At least 5,000 participated in the demonstration. It is true that for the last eleven years the electorate has always returned Dr. Guay with a large majority for Levis to the House of Commons, but

the town of Levis has always given about 500 majority to the Conservative nominee. Judging by the enthusiasm which prevailed at this meeting tonight, the majority will be totally reversed on the 23rd of June next.
When Mr. Laurier was called to the front of the platform a storm of cheers burst forth from everyone present. The chief of the Opposition argued with ability the various political questions of the day. His speech was well listened to by the Blues as well as the Rouges. Far from being interrupted, as predicted by some fanatics, Mr. Laurier was acclaimed with great favor. "Should the intelligent voters of the country elect me in preference to Sir Charles Tupper," said Mr. Laurier, "I would settle the school question within six months after the election." Mr. Foster and Mr. Lemieux also made good speeches, after which the meeting broke up amid frantic cheers.

EAST BRUCE.

Walkerton, May 22.—At the Liberal convention held here yesterday several nominations were made, but all withdrew in favor of the Conservative candidate of Brant. Mr. Little has been identified with the Patrons and asked until Saturday to decide. A committee was appointed to deal with his decision on that day.

A FLAT AFFAIR.

The supposed "grand Conservative rally" for East and West Lambton at the Flattest and most spiritless political demonstration ever held in the county of Lambton. A large number of the seats in the town rink were empty. Of those who were seated fully one-half were ladies, and of the voters present more than one-half were women. Mr. Moncrieff's opponents, the speech fell upon unresponsive ears, and the effect upon the orators of the evening was exceedingly frosty. Mr. Foster did not come up to the expectation formed of him as a speaker. He was far from being a success. The discouraging outlook generally has had a depressing effect upon him, and he talked like a man who saw defeat and discomfiture staring him in the face. Tuesday night's meeting at Forest has done harm to the Conservative candidates in the Lambtons. It has served only to emphasize the fact that the party chances are hopeless. The party following in the two ridings is split into factions, and that the courage and confidence of the Conservative party is shattered. Down by the Sea.

Prominent Conservative Manufacturer Joins the Liberals.

A Stirring Speech in Favor of a Change of Men at Ottawa.

Halifax, N. S., May 20.—At a mass meeting of electors last night, Mr. Thomas Forhan, a well-known manufacturer and shipowner, was asked to say a few words.

Mr. Forhan said he did not expect to be called upon, as he only came as a listener, but he felt that in this campaign, if a man could only say even half a dozen words to try and change the wretched administration of public affairs, the duty should be said. He had been a Conservative all his life time, and had worked hard in past campaigns to maintain the Conservative Government. But he now felt that it was in the best interests of the country that there should be a change of Government. After what occurred at Ottawa during the past few months it was surely time for the people to wake up and let the sea breeze blow from their eyes. (Cheers.) The Conservative Government had promised wonderful things to the people of Halifax for years. This city was to be the greatest Liverpool of America. (Laughter.) In fact, our commerce in the harbor was to be so great, we were to be able to handle the town across the water because of the many ships in the way. (Laughter.) Well, gentlemen, Dartmouth could not now stand the growing predictions. (Laughter.) Today he only saw two coal barges and a steamer laying in the harbor, and these were lying up. But the Spanish Government had come to the rescue and had taken pity on us, and sent us up a corvette, the "Albatross," the old predictions. (Boars of laughter.) He sincerely thought for years that some of the benefits promised by the Conservative Government would be realized, but it must be frankly confessed that the end was most disappointing. There was not a ship coming out of the city of Halifax that could get anything to do at the present time. Conservative orators assured us that the Government would be so many factories established that the people would hardly be able to see the day because of the volumes of smoke from the tall chimneys—cheers and laughter—but the glowing promises were far from realization.

Some years ago a number of merchants and others, carried away by the rosy promises of the Conservative Government, invested a few thousands in a cotton factory in Halifax, which was to bring wonderful prosperity to the investors, but the result was that after running a few years the investors were paid off at the rate of 50 cents on the dollar.
Since then these factories were placed in a combine, and in order to get any article from that combine the purchaser was compelled to pay the combine price.

What constitutes the prosperity of a country? He was inclined to think the best test was population. It was claimed by the Conservatives that every citizen of a country was worth yearly to that country \$500. But what did the census return show? The population of the ten years from 1881 to 1891, so far as the Maritime Provinces were concerned, the result was most disappointing. The census returns showed that published must have been a shock and a sad surprise to every well-wisher of his country. The total population of the city and county of Halifax during these ten years was only 3,441 persons. Did that look like prosperity?

Now, gentlemen, I have not been a speaker at elections, but as many of you know, I have been a worker, and I want to be a worker with you all. (Cheers.) I sincerely believe that it is the duty of independent men in this campaign to support the Liberal candidates.
