FAIR AND WARM TODAY—UNSETTLED WITH RAIN TOMORROW.

Toronto, Sept. 12-11 p.m.—The tropical storm mentioned on Saturday morning's chart as being near the coast of Florida, has moved to the west coast, whence it is likely to move north and northeast with decreasing energy towards the lake region, where in all probability the weather will become very unsettled and perhaps stormy. The weather has been fine and comparatively cool throughout the Dominion. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 46-62; Kamloops, 56-82; Calgary, 36-54; Qu'Appelle, 44-68; Winnipeg, 52-72; Port Arthur, 54-78; Parry Sound, 48-70; Toronto, 52-71; Ottawa, 57-75; Montreal, 44-64; Quebec, 58-85; Halifax, 46-56.

**In the Dining-Room.**

TUESDAY, SEPT. 13.

BREAKFAST—Sugared peaches, Apple omelet, Rye puffs, Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Sweet potato puffs, Swiss eggs, Chicago rolls, Small almond cakes, Cocoa, hot or iced.

DINNER—Green pea soup, Roast lamb, Celery salad, Steamed potatoes, Eggplant baked in bread crumbs, Cantaloupe, Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Apple Omelet—Beat separately to a stiff froth the whites and yolks of four eggs, add a pinch of salt to the whites. Cut the whites into the yolks; sift in two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, four tablespoonfuls of iced water; turn into a larded frying-pan, and when it thickens spread quickly with apple sauce, sweetened to the taste. Fold the omelet, turn it upon the platter and serve hot.

Rye Puffs—Beat together one tablespoonful of sugar and one egg; add one cupful of milk, one cupful of rye-flour, half a cupful of wheat flour, one teaspoonful of baking-powder, added to the flour before mixing; beat hard and bake in quick oven.

Swiss Eggs—Six eggs, one-quarter a pound of cheese, one-half of a cupful of cream or milk, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one teaspoonful of mustard, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-tenth of a teaspoonful of cayenne. Cut the cheese into thin shavings; place an egg dish or a grating dish (if you have neither use a small stone china platter) and spread the cheese in it. Upon the cheese distribute in small portions the remainder of the butter; mix salt, cayenne, mustard and cream; pour half the mixture over the cheese; break the eggs into the dish, and after pouring over them the remaining liquid place in oven. Bake eight minutes.

Sweet Potato Puffs—Steam six sweet potatoes and mash fine; add one tablespoonful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one large saltspoon of salt; beat very light. Grease custard cups, fill nearly full, brush top with white of an egg and bake in a quick oven; serve hot.

Chicago Rolls—One pound of flour, one pint of milk, one egg, one ounce of butter, two tablespoonfuls of yeast, one saltspoonful of salt; heat the milk, add the butter and salt. When lukewarm beat all together and set to rise in a warm place not less than three hours before wanted. When rising form into rolls with as little handling as possible; let stand half an hour, or until light. Bake on tin.

French Dressing—One-half teaspoon of salt, one-half saltspoon of pepper, three tablespoonfuls of oil, one-fourth teaspoonful of onion juice, one tablespoonful of vinegar. Mix in order given, adding oil slowly.

Eggplant Baked in Breadcrumbs—This recipe requires one young and tender eggplant, one tablespoonful of chopped parsley, on tablespoonful of vinegar; season with one teaspoonful of salt, and three dashes of pepper; two tablespoonfuls of butter, if you can spare it, if not, one will do; two cups of breadcrumbs and two onions grated. Peel the eggplant and cut it in inch dice. Put it into the sauce, and simmer very gently until tender, but not entirely done, ten to fifteen minutes. Then throw it into a colander

and drain as dry as possible, squeezing out the water with a vacuum. Meanwhile fry the onion and butter. When the eggplant is thoroughly drained, remove the sauce-pan and onions from the fire and stir the eggplant, parsley, pepper, salt and vinegar, and butter. If the eggplant has been thoroughly dried it will absorb the butter entirely. Put in a baking dish, cover the top with browned bread crumbs and dots of butter, and bake twenty to twenty-five minutes in a good oven. There should be nearly one quart of the stewed eggplant for the above preparations, therefore, if you have not one large one, use two small ones. This is worth trying.

—Mr. J. Hill, driver of one of Millar's delivery wagons, who was struck by the Lehigh express on Saturday afternoon at the Egerton street crossing, and badly injured (his horse being killed), is progressing favorably. The doctors have not as yet ascertained just what Mr. Hill's injuries are.

—Dame Fashion is booming steel. All the new buckles and ornaments for belts and shoes, sometimes enriched by real or mock gems. The woman who is gowned correctly will wear the silver and gilt buckles, brooches, buttons and ornaments and go in for steel, say the leading decorators of the autumn girl.

—Mrs. Will Hopkins, sister of Mrs. J. K. Elliott, city; Mrs. Mark Hopkins, Mrs. W. S. Hopkins and daughter Frances, of St. Clair, Mich.; Mrs. Rice and daughter, Kate, of St. Louis, and Miss Layman, of Cincinnati, who have been spending a few days at the Tecumseh, started on the return coaching trip Saturday to St. Clair, Mich.

—The funeral of the late Rev. F. R. Ghent took place Saturday afternoon from his father's residence, Main street east, Hamilton, Rev. Canon Bland, Rev. W. H. Wade, and Rev. G. A. Foran officiating. The pallbearers were selected from members of the Knights of Pythias and Canadian Order of Foresters, to both of which orders deceased belonged.

—Master Ward Wright, of Elmwood avenue, South London, is lamenting the loss of a fine large tent, which was taken from the lawn of his father's residence a few nights ago. The tent was occupied by Ward and some of his young friends during a portion of the summer, and it was certainly a most glaring theft on the part of those who took it.

—Mrs. Eselle Anderson, of con. 3, Westminster, was fined \$1 and costs by Squire Lacey for assaulting the daughter of James Johnston, a neighbor. The assault consisted of Mrs. Anderson striking the Johnston girl on the ankle with a stone. Mrs. Anderson and her daughter Kate will come up on Saturday on a charge of malicious damage to Mr. Johnston's property.

—Mr. A. C. Attwood, of Vanneck, was in the city Saturday closing the purchase of the northeast portion of lot No. 20, in the 9th con. of Lobo, from Richard Tindle, for \$3,000 cash. This lot was owned by Mr. Attwood 40 years ago, but he lost it by indorsement in the crisis of 1857. He then made it a point to redeem it if possible, if it ever came in the market, with the result that he has now done so.

—Mr. John W. Fogg, the Chicago engineer who was so seriously injured near Blue Island, Ill., this summer by the locomotive exploding, is on a visit to relatives and friends here recuperating. He has been sojourning at Port Stanley for several days, and feels much benefited by the bathing and lake air enjoyed there. He will remain here during Fall week, and subsequently visit Montreal.

—At the last regular monthly meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home Board a large number of ladies were present. During last month three children were sent to the asylum at Orillia, a number placed in good homes, and three more will be sent out this week. The trustees would like to remind their many friends that they will commence their annual collecting the last week in September, and trust they will meet with their usual generous support.

—Dr. Chamberlain, of Toronto, provincial inspector of prisons, visited the county jail here on Saturday, and found everything in excellent condition. He made a thorough inspection, and complimented Governor Boston on the discipline and cleanliness of the institution. He found 23 prisoners in the jail, 21 men and 2 women, 2 of the latter being insane. There are 6 drunks, 4 vagrants, 10 thieves, 1 charged with fraud, 3 held for assault, 1 for malicious damage to property, and the insane boy, Louis Munro. The doctor recommended some repairs to the kitchen windows.

—Stratford Herald: There have been a number of changes recently in Salvation Army circles. The old staff have gone to London, and the new staff have arrived. Adjutant McCann, late in charge of the Soul Saving Troop, takes charge of the Stratford district. He is assisted by Captains McCutcheon and Hoddinott, Ensign Wiggins, Bandmaster Keller and Captain Redburn have all gone to London, and will enter the Marine Band of Western Ontario, an institution similar to last year's Seraphic Band. Capt. Taylor, formerly stationed at Stratford, is also a member of the Marine Band.

—"Speaking on behalf of the Seventh Fusiliers' Band," said a member of that organization today, "I see it stated that the leader of the Seventh Band objects to children at the concerts in the park. This is not the case, but I understand that the public who love music object to a number of boys, who are old enough to know better, or to be taught by the police, that the park, on the occasion of a concert, is not the place to play noisy games. The Seventh Band have played in the park for the last three seasons, and will continue to do so as long as the city fathers desire them to, and will always furnish

the full number of men that pay is drawn for. They have not for that time, and will not, take up collections at the gate. They have given one free concert in the park each season. They are giving full value for the admission charged at the rink concerts, and hope to succeed, as they desire all other bands and musical organizations in the city to do, as they believe that people cannot spend their leisure and a part of their money in a better way than furnishing or listening to good music."

—Mr. George C. Gibbons, Q.C., city, and Mr. John King, Q.C., Toronto, represented the Monetary Times newspaper in the recent action for libel brought against it by Mr. A. E. Rondot, merchant, Amherstburg. In 1895, the Monetary Times made certain statements with relation to the failure of the plaintiff, and drew certain inferences from them which did not please Mr. Rondot. As a result the Times had an action for damages on its hands, which had been pending ever since. After many delays the case came on for trial at Sandwich last week before Mr. Justice Falconbridge and a jury. The defense put Mr. Rondot in the box to prove their case, and he was examined by Mr. Gibbons for several hours. The result was a verdict by ten of the jury in favor of the defendants, and two in favor of the plaintiff, and the action was accordingly dismissed with costs.

—The many friends of Mrs. J. E. Thompson will hear with deep regret of her death, which took place at St. Joseph's Hospital early yesterday morning. The deceased lady had been in the hospital for only eleven days, having suffered from typhoid fever. Mrs. Thompson did not enjoy robust health, but on Saturday appeared better than at any time since her illness. A relapse occurred about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, and Mrs. Thompson died about one hour later. The deceased was a most popular young woman, and will be greatly missed in social circles. She was 31 years of age, and had been married only two years. Mrs. Thompson was the only surviving daughter of the late John Matheson, marble dealer, Stanley street, and a mother and brother survive her out of a family of thirteen. Mrs. Matheson's numerous friends in London, Huron and Oxford will sincerely sympathize with her in this additional bereavement, and the sympathy of all will go out to Mr. Thompson.

**A LONDONER ROBBED.**  
The Winnipeg Nor'Wester of Sept. 8 says: "Samuel Gibson, an old man who reached St. Paul Friday from London, Ont., reported to the police that he had been robbed of \$45, but in what manner he did not know. He said that he had stopped at a hotel Friday night, and intended to leave on the Great Northern for Neche, N. D. He stopped, and all efforts of the police to gain a clue to the robbery were unsuccessful. Mr. Gibson said he did not miss the money until he was about to take the train. Mr. Gibson had other troubles to tell Chief Schweitzer at St. Paul. He said he had made the mistake of marrying a young girl, and wanted to know how he could recover \$1,000, which he said the young wife had secured from him. Gibson had a through ticket, and was able to proceed to his farm in Neche."

**SHOWMAN KILLED.**  
A Toronto dispatch says: At one o'clock Saturday afternoon, Wendall H. Ordway, 35 years old, was run over and killed at the foot of Bathurst street, Toronto, by a Grand Trunk freight train. He had been for years employed with Mr. Kemp, of the South American company, and was with the show at the exhibition, and came down to witness the departure of his manager and comrades. They were going to London, and he intended to go to his wife, who lives in Boston, when the freight train on which the show was being loaded slowed up at Bathurst street. Ordway got aboard and shook hands with his friends. Just as he was getting off the train started, and he fell between the cars. Both his legs were cut off and his body terribly bruised and mangled. He died almost instantly.

**HENRY WEST'S FUNERAL.**  
The funeral of the late William Henry West, who committed suicide at the City Hospital here on Thursday evening, took place at Woodstock Saturday afternoon. He had been following the occupation of a paper-hanger and painter in Merriton for the past eight years. He was 31 years of age, and single. Henry West, contractor, Riddell street, was the father of the deceased. In conversation Mr. West said that he had gone down to his residence in Detroit where his daughter Florence was united in marriage to Arthur J. Stock. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. R. Gundy. Both parties are favorably known and much respected in the city. Miss Abel has for years been teacher in the city schools, and is also superintendent of the primary department in the Windsor Avenue Methodist Sunday school. As they intend taking up their residence in Detroit they will be very much missed in social and religious circles. The Record extends very hearty congratulations and best wishes for their happiness and prosperity.

**SERIOUS RUNAWAY.**  
A serious runaway occurred about 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon on the Wharncliffe road, in London West, near the C. P. R. bridge. Miss Maggie Peden, of Adelaide township, was driving home with her young brother, and had just reached the bridge when a heavy train pulled out of the city. The horse took fright and bolted, throwing the occupants of the rig on the road and turning the rig on its side. The animal continued north, until the lines, having come in contact with the hub of the fore wheel, the horse was turned into the ditch. The harness was wrenched off, and the vehicle brought with great force against the horse's legs, the tendons of which were badly torn. The occupants of the rig were uninjured, but the horse may have to be shot.
