Story of Mingled Achievement and Disaster.

Brigus, Nfld., Sept. 12.-Lieut. Peary's steamer Windward has arrived here from West Greenland, having wintered in the Far North. She brings a story of mingled achievement and disaster. Peary's chief work consisted in getting the Windward 50 miles farther north than Sverdrup got the Fram. His disaster took the form of his having his feet badly frost-bitten, and losing seven toes, four off the left foot and three off the right. This occurred on Jan. 6, the very night Mrs. Peary's second baby was born. Peary had got out four days before from Fort Conger, pushing towards Cape Columbia, on the northern extremity of Grinnell Land. The party met a series of accidents, and then had to retreat to Conger. They could not find the Greely House in the night, and had to take shelter in a cave in an iceberg. Here Peary's exertions caused a re-action. His feet became frozen, and

Thus crippled, Peary could do little this spring and summer in advancing north. He made one trip in April, but two days' travel showed that his feet could not stand the trip, and he had to abandon further effort. He therefore made some exploring trips round Grinnell Land, delimiting the western

coast, and finding that Buchanan Strait was really a closed bay. Briefly stated, the expedition's work Etah, Whale Sound, and spent six Etah, Whale Sound, and spent six days working to Cape Durville, 80 miles north. Here she was frozen in for the winter, about a quarter mile from the shore. Peary immediately began preparations to work north. He landed stores, and with his five Estimate families began a series of jourkimo families began a series of journeys northward, making four trips in all, and cacheing 4,000 pounds of pro-visions. At Fort Conger, Greely's old headquarters in Lady Franklin Bay, Peary found the Greely House and contents just as left by his predecessor fifteen years ago. He also found all the property left by Greely's people, including many relies of previous expeditions.

expeditions. After spending April in crossing Ellsmere Land, Peary worked south in May and June, hunting walrus and musk oxen, securing 100 of the former and 16 of the latter.
