O. R. F. U. EXECUTIVE DECISIONS
Toronto, Nov. 3.—The executive of the Ontario Rugby Football Union, at a meeting here last night, gave the Argonauts the game played with Hamilton last Saturday night, which was stopped six minutes before time, owing to darkness. The score was 12 to 0 in favor of the Argonauts.

The final game in the junior series was ordered to be played at London on Nov. 18, between London and the Nationals, of Kingston.

New York, Nov. 3.—At the Broadway A. C. last night, George Dixon, the feather-weight champion, more than held his own against Will Curley, of England, and after fighting 25 rounds, many of which were rather tame, the American was declared the winner. Dixon's victory was well-earned, Curley has no excuse to make for his defeat, other than that he was outclassed. Dixon was a big favorite, as much as 100 to 30 being wagered on him.

THE LIBERAL RESOLUTIONS

Passed by the South Wellington Association.

Guelph, Nov. 3.—At the recent meeting of the South Wellington Liberal Association the following resolutions were passed by acclamation:

Moved by Mr. J. E. Day, seconded by Mr. A. Johnston, "That this convention of Liberals of the south riding of Wellington endorse this early opportunity of extending to the Hon. George W. Ross our hearty congratulations on his accession to the premiership of this province. We look with pride upon his magnificent parliamentary career both in the Dominion House of Commons and the Provincial Legislature, which career has marked him as a man of unquestioned personal integrity, of keen intellectual and perceptive powers, of distinguished administrative and executive capacity, and as a broad-minded, progressive statesman. We express our unbounded confidence in the new premier and the government he has formed, and believe that under his leadership the affairs of this province will continue to be administered with that wisdom, economy and progressiveness that have been so conspicuous in Liberal administration for over a quarter of a century."

THE LAURIER ADMINISTRATION.

It was moved by Dr. Hamilton, of Erin, seconded by James Scott, P. S. DROWNED.

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 3.—Mrs. Nieman, wife of a stevedore, who lives in North Vancouver, has committed suicide by drowning in the inlet.

FELL FROM A CABOOSE.

Hagerville, Ont., Nov. 3.—Yesterday afternoon brakeman Tom Bryce, of St. Thomas, fell from the caboose while shunting cars on the M. C. R. at Hagerville. Four cars passed over his leg and left shoulder, crushing in his ribs. He is in no hope of recovery. Bryce is an unmarried man, an Englishman, and it is said has no relatives in Canada.

INSTANTLY KILLED.

Watford, Ont., Nov. 3.—Peter Smuck, a Sarnia, brakeman on a through freight, fell off the train about half a mile west of here about 5:30 yesterday evening and was instantly killed. His head and both legs were cut off. He leaves a wife and family residing in Sarnia.

SOLDIER SHOT BY A GUARD.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Nov. 3.—Private Simon Downer, of the 42nd Infantry, United States Volunteers, was fatally shot at Fort Niagara yesterday while attempting to escape from the guard. Downer was under arrest for assaulting five of his comrades with a knife. He was shot through the right shoulder, a ball from the Krag-Jorgensen penetrating his lungs and coming out of his breast. The dying man's home is at Wales Center, Mich. He enlisted in Cleveland.

PARIS GREEN AND GUNPOWDER

Details of the Terrible Tragedy in Wilberforce.

Horrible Death of the Insane Murderer by His Own Hand.

Eganville, Ont., Nov. 3.—Further particulars of the Yaster tragedy in Wilberforce township, show that Wm. Yaster, after killing his wife and daughter on Tuesday night took a dose of Paris green.

Three black coffins, lying side by side in the residence of Wm. Yaster, in Wilberforce township, about eight miles above Eganville, tell the story of the most terrible combination of murder and self-destruction that has ever shocked the people of Randolph county. Two of the boxes contain the bodies of the murdered; the other incloses the remains of the murderer.

Wm. Yaster, who lived at Germanicus, postoffice, in Wilberforce, was the murderer and suicide.

THE STORY OF THE CRIME.

On Tuesday night about 10 o'clock Yaster secured an axe, approached the bedroom in which his wife and daughter were sleeping, and without warning cleft open their skulls. He hacked at the heads until he left them almost unrecognizable. The maniac next pulled the dead bodies out on the floor, got into the bed they had occupied and slept soundly until morning.

At break of day he awakened two younger children, told them that he had murdered their mother and sister, and asked them to go out and inform the neighbors. After the children's departure Yaster mixed up a dose of Paris green and swallowed down two draughts.

The neighbors, on their arrival at the house, found the murdered women

where they had lain all night, and discovered Yaster in horrible agony. The dose of Paris green, however, failed to work, and Yaster filled his mouth with gunpowder, touched it with a lighted match, and succeeded in distorting his features most frightfully. But again his attempt at self-destruction was a failure. As a last resource he took another dose of Paris green, and so finished the last chapter of a dark tragedy.

HEAVY LOSS BY FIRE.

Windsor, Nov. 3.—Henry Bennett's wine house in Sandwich East was destroyed by fire yesterday morning. Several thousand gallons of wine were lost. The high wind carried sparks to the outbuildings of Patrick Parent, and they were also destroyed. Parent lost nearly all his crops, but saved his horses. There was only partial insurance.

BANK MANAGER ARRESTED.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—Pierre Riopelle, manager of the Bank of Hochelaga at Joliette, was arrested yesterday on the charge of having, as manager of the Ville Marie branch at Hochelaga, paid preferential payments to creditors at the time of its suspension. Riopelle appeared before a local magistrate, pleaded not guilty and was admitted to bail.
