Portsmouth, England, Nov. 1 .- This historic old town has witnessed so many naval reviews and state functions that it has ceased to be excited by displays of bunting and maneuvers of steelsheathed fleets. Flags were fluttering everywhere along the waterfront when the Ophir entered the harbor, under the escort of the Victoria and Albert and other yachts, and there were swarms of spectators on the Southsea Esplanade, but the town was decorated with a meager hand, and the crowds were listless and undemonstrative. turn of the Duke of Cornwall from a circuit of 50,000 miles could not have been regarded as a trivial event, but naval pomp and imperial spectacles had been witnessed so often that the populace had learned to take its pleasures sadly. Probably the heir to the throne had not heard such half-hearted cheering since his departure from England as that which greeted him along the waterfront at Portsmouth. The flotilla passed Clarence pier about 3 o'clock, and the spectators were silent, until at the last moment a conscience-stricken enthusiast took off his hat and called for cheers, and then the response was feeble. There was more enthusiasm when the Ophir reached her berth in the harbor, but the duke's reception on the whole was singularly

NIGHT ILLUMINATIONS EXCEL-LENT. A naval spectacle is always disappointing, even on a clear day. Modern ironclads are improving in lines, but are not picturesque objects even in the full regalia of holiday bunting. They are forced to anchor a long way apart, and all cannot be seen at once, affoat or ashore, until nightfall, when searchlights are operating, and broadsides are aglow with electric lamps. Spectators by daylight could see ilttle, excen smoke from the funnels and the en-circling lines of bunting, and as the riching lines of bunting, and as the wind was off the land they could barely hear the strains of the National Anthem and the booming guns.
