#### Holland Would Help to Bring About Peace.

Boers May Be Ready to Accept the Terms of Britain.

Blockhouse Garrisons on the Alert for a Brush With Dewet-Canadian Scouts Get Honorable Mention.

London, Jan. 29.-The Government of Holland has offered, in the most friendly terms, to help in bringing about peace in South Africa. In a communication to the British Government the Dutch Government suggests that it might be permitted to act as a sort of diplomatic agent for the Boer delegates. But the government expressly disowns any attempt of intervention, and does not mention any

The British Government infers that it would not have been approached way clear to accept the services unless the Dutch authorities were convinced that the Boer delegates now in Europe were willing to accept the cardinal points of the British peace terms so frequently announced in parliament.

Lord Lansdowne, the foreign secretary, replied in friendly terms to the Netherlands' proposal, but he instituted inquiries in order to ascertain the extent of the powers delegated to Mr. Kruger and the other Boer representatives in Europe to act in behalf of the burghers in the field. SATISFACTORY GUARANTEES RE-

QUIRED. Great doubt is expressed at the foreign office here as to whether any negotiations carried on by the Boer delegates through the Dutch Government or other channels will prove effectual. If satisfactory guarantees in this respect can be secured, negotiations will be immediately commenced.

WHO IS THE MOVER? The announcement of Mr. Balfour aused a sensation in the lobbies of parliament. Lord Rosebery is generally credited with having brought about this movement on the part of the Dutch Government. It is recalled that Dr. Kuyper, the Dutch premier, in an interview published about Christmas time, was represented to have urged the impossibility of Hollond's intervening in South Africa unless she had reason to think that both parties wished it. Consequently it is regarded as certain that the present move was inspired by the Boer dele-

The Petit Bleu, of Brussels, the organ of the Krugerites, flatly denies that the Boer delegates had charged any one to make a peace proposal, and professed to be in entire ignorance of

the Dutch communication. The Hague correspondent of Daily Mail claims to have ascertained that Dr. Leyds inspired the Dutch foreign secretary, who was further advised by Prof. Asser, the internajurist, and adds that Dr. Levds, the European representative of the Transvaal, is apparently attempting to draw Mr. Chamberlain, the British colonial secretary, to disclose the terms conditional upon the waiving of independence.

A NEWSPAPER'S CLAIM. The Daily News claims credit for the initiation of the peace movement. This paper says that after Lord Rosebery's speech at Chesterfield they sent Dr. Bisschop, who was recently coun-sel for the Dutch Government before the compensation commission, and who is neither Briton nor Boer, on a mission to the continent to invite the Boer delegates to a consideration of basis of negotiations, which Lord Rosebery suggested, namely, to grant the Boers self-government on the Canadian model; no unnecessary prolongation of the military occupation; complete amnesty to Boers and colonial rebels, and grants of money to enable the Boers to restart the farms. Dr. Bisschop had long conferences with the Boer delegates on the continent, with the exception of Mr. Kruger. But he was assured that the ex-president had delegated his authority, and that it was not necessary to see him. According to the paper, Dr. Bisschop persuaded the delegates to hold a conference and discuss his proposals. Then followed the visit of Dr. Kuyper to London.

# FOOD SUPPLY IN WAR TIME

Britain Is Not Afraid of Any Shortage.

Australian Premiers Charged a Commission on Their War Office Bills.

#### Another Delay in the Negotiations for Miss Stone's Release-Success of Dumont's Air Ship.

London, Jan. 29.-Gerald W. Balfour, president of the Board of Trade, in the House of Commons, rather contemptuously dismissed an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne at the opening of Parliament, proposed by Hon. Seton Karr (Con.), regarding the old-time question of the food supply in war time, saying that the subject was threadbare, and that so long as the United Kingdom retained the command of the seas it was quite sufficient to depend upon the ordinary operations of supply and demand. A system of national graneries would necessitate an outlay of

£30,000,000 (\$150,000,000). He added that war risks ought not to entail a rise of more than 10 per cent in the price of cereals. The government saw no reason to appoint committee of inquiry on the subject.

CHARGED COMMISSION. There has been no dispute between the colonies and war office in regard the payment of colonial troops. Canada, Australia and New Zealand expended large amounts in behalf of the war office, and in making up the bills some of the business-like Australian premiers added 3 per cent The war office referred the matter to the colonial office. commission. # SIX MONTHS IN THE CENTRAL

Ransom Norton Pleads Guilty and Is Sentenced.

P. M. Love Talks Severely and Promises Heavy Punishment to Future Offenders.

Ransom Norton, the South London young man, charged with stuffing ballots at the last municipal election, pleaded guilty to the charge in police court this morning, and was sentenced to six months in the Central Prison, besides being treated to a severe lecture from Police Magistrate Love, in which a warning to future offenders was given in no uncertain terms.

The private prosecutor, Mayor Beck was in court, as were also his legal representatives, Messrs. Moore Judd. Norton occupied a seat in the dock, the only change in his appearance since his arrest being that his small dark mustache has been removed. A large crowd of citizens occupied the space reserved for the public

Norton's name was the first called by the police magistrate after he assumed the bench. The prisoner stood up and Mr. Macpherson announced that he appeared to represent him. The magis trate asked that the prisoner elect

"He elects to be tried by your worship," said Mr. Macpherson, "and he pleads—guilty," with a little dramatic pause before the final word.

"Crown Attorney Magee arose and said before he moved the sentence of the court he wished to briefly recapitulate the circumstances of the case as he knew them. The prisoner was pollclerk at the same polling sub-division at which his father was the deputy returning officer.
At the foot of each of the twelve pages of the poll-book the prisoner added a name, and either himself, or with the collusion of others, inserted ballots to correspond in the box. Fortunately the voters' list kept by the prisoner's father showed the correct number of voters, and on subsequent investigation,

the discrepancy was discovered. The extra ballots were initialed, but evidently not by the deputy returning officer. Mr. Magee then moved the sen-On the magistrate's inquiry of what the prisoner had to say before sentence was passed, Mr. Macpherson, on be-

half of the prisoner, pointed out in the first place that the prisoner's wrong had had no effect on the result of the election. He said that the prisoner, little more than a boy, was a mere tool in the hands of others, and was not at the bottom of the rascality. The stupidity of the act showed that he was a mere tool, that he was told by somebody "Here are a certain number of ballots; you must account for them by supplying names."
