The attendance at today's market was larger than it usually is on this day of the week, as Thursday next will be a holiday, and there will consequently be no market on that day. This fact probably accounted to a certain extent for the large offerings today. Sales were as a rule fairly brisk and mixed for the large offerings today. Poultry-This line was well represented, but the quality was not up to the usual standard for a Thanksgiving market; for turkeys, 10c to 12c per pound was paid for gobblers, and 12c to 14c for hen turkeys; chickens sold at 60c to 85c per pair, dressed, and live birds at 45c to 60c; ducks, dressed, were in good demand at 75c to \$1 per pair. Fruits—Apples were quite plentiful and sales were on the slow side; prices ruled at 50c to 65c per bag or \$1.25 per barrel; a few barrels of choice Snow apples were sold at \$1.00 per bytels, reaches sold at \$1.40 per bushel; peaches sold at 35c to 55c per 12-quart basket; grapes 35c to 55c per 12-quart basket; grapes were in fair supply, at 20c to 30c per
