New York, Dec. 26. - According tatistics compiled by the Journal of commerce, dividend and interest disby the leading railroad and industrial companies, local banks, trust comanies, and traction corporations, also nterest payable on the Government ebt, will reach a total of \$134,000,000. This sum is about \$2,000,000 greater than the total payments of January, 903, but a decrease compared with the semi-annual payments in July last, which were \$136,000,000, the highest on record. Interest payments by railroads would have shown a much heavier inrease, had it not been for what seems o be a general effort to make pay-nents on new issues fall in some other season of the year, this undoubtedly being to avoid disturbances to the
