Cover Their Tracks.

New York, Jan. 6.-Adams Express Company officials and Pinkerton detectives are investigating the strange loss of an \$18,000 package from an express pouch. It is presumed that the

package was stolen. The loss was discovered yesterday when the pouch was opened at the office of the express company, No. 59 Broadway. What adds to the strangeness of the theft is that in the same pouch was found intact a package containing \$50,000 in bills, which, it is understood had been consigned to a downtown national bank from one in the south.

The discovery of the theft created such a commotion that General Agent Barrett, of this city, of the Adams Express Company; Superintendent H. E. Huff, of Baltimore; Superintendent Sadler, of the Southern Express Company, of Charlotte, N. C., are among officials who have gathered in Washington to conduct an investigation as to when and how the express pouch was opened.

Detectives working on the case believe that the finding of the \$50,000 package will in a large measure restrict the scope of the inquiry and eliminate certain persons who might be implicated if the entire contents, or the pouch itself, had been stolen.
