

## NETTED \$190,000 IN SINGLE VOYAGE

The Oldest and Most Successful  
Whaling Master of World,  
Dies Poor at Age of 92.

Nantucket, March 26.—Capt. Chas. Grant, the oldest whaling master in the United States, and the most successful the world has ever known, died today at his home on Orange street, at the age of 92 years. He suffered a paralytic shock last Thursday, and remained in a semi-conscious condition up to a few hours before his death.

Capt. Grant was the most remarkable whaler on record, but although he made several large fortunes in his lifetime, he died a poor man. He was born in Nantucket, June 14, 1814, went to sea when 11 years old, and spent a total of 56 years of his life on whaling ships. Every voyage was successful, and when he took command of the ship, Walter Scott in 1844 at the age of 30 years he had helped to bring into port nearly 30,000 barrels of sperm oil.

His first voyage as a master netted the owners over \$100,000, and some of his voyages netted as high as \$190,000. He was considered the luckiest man that ever trod the deck of a ship, and consequently commanded an unusually large pay.

Each voyage as captain netted him a snug fortune, but through his extreme benevolence and poor investments his wealth went to his friends, and although his last voyage in 1871 cleared him nearly \$30,000, he became a poor man a few years later, and when he died he did not own the house he lived in. He never refused to lend a man a dollar, yet never wasted his fortunes, every cent being devoted to some worthy cause.

After being famous the world over as a whaler, Capt. Grant was considered the position of custodian of Nantucket's famous landmark, the old windmill, when it fell into the possession of the historical society about a dozen years ago, and in that capacity he became popular among the summer tourists. Last September he tendered his resignation owing to gradually failing health, and devoted his whole time to making ships' hammocks, completing his last one two days before being stricken with his fatal illness.

Capt. Grant's life story is unequalled in the annals of the whaling industry. On nearly all of his voyages as master he was accompanied by his wife, who died two years ago, and all of his children were born at sea. His daughter, Mrs. George Pierce, of New Bedford, was born in New Zealand waters, and his only living son, George Grant, a member of the Surfside life-saving crew, was born at the Samoan Islands.

**A Railway Rumor.**

Ottawa, March 26.—A story has been going around for several days past to the effect that the Canadian Northern Railway company has bought the Parry Sound division of the Grand Trunk Railway.

No confirmation was obtainable as the head officers of both companies are not resident here.

The advantages of the line to Mackenzie and Mann are obvious.

The rumor has been heard in several quarters and prominent railroaders seem to think it quite probable.

**An Extension for Blake.**

London, March 26.—At the county 25 Derry assizes, John Muldoon made application on behalf of Ed. Blake for an extension of time in which to transmit his declaration of expenses to the returning officers, and submitted an affidavit from Mr. Blake, saying that he was in Canada until Feb. 9, since when he has been confined to bed for a couple of weeks. Justice Debnay allowed a week for the order to be complied with.

## ROUNDING UP THE GANG

Toronto Police Believe Have Caught  
Some of Bad Crew.

Toronto, March 26.—Some of the members of the gang of safe blowers, who have been operating successfully through Ontario for a year past, and who on Friday night last blew open the safe of the Toronto Carpet Company and also robbed the Puritan Knitting Mills and Young & Company's Sash and Door Factory in Toronto, are believed to be in the hands of the police.

John Crosby, 22 years of age, who refuses to tell anything of himself, and James Hunter, of Toronto, were arrested on York street tonight, and evidence connects them with Friday's safe-blowing exploit.

On Crosby was found \$40 in bills, blown full of holes, and one particular five-dollar bill had a piece torn off, which exactly fits into a piece found in the Carpet Company's office after the robbery.

What connects both men with outside robberies are their boots. Recently the postoffice at Newburgh was robbed and a general store of a man named Bull blown into, a number of pairs of Blucher boots being taken. Both the prisoners wore comparatively new Blucher boots.

Hunter was also found a punch used for boring holes in a safe. Hunter is a son-in-law of a man named Kombe, a locksmith, who served a term in the penitentiary for being connected with the Williams and Curtis gang of safe-blowers, a gang that killed a grocer named Varcoe here some years ago.

It is expected that further arrests will be made tonight.

## A MILVERTON ROMANCE

Hired Man Elopes With Employer's  
Daughter, But Is Headed Off.

Stratford, March 26.—The Stratford police give out no names, but they stated on Saturday night they nipped an interesting elopement in the bud. The participants were two young people of Milverton, the young lady, or rather girl, as she was only 15 years of age, being the daughter of a well-known businessman of that place, and the man, 35, and unmarried, who had been employed for some time past with the father of the girl. The girl is now safely at the parent's home without having taken the marriage vows, as was the intention, while the man took the advice of the local police and got out of the city at once.

It appears the infatuation was quite mutual, and that on Saturday the man asked the girl's father for the hand of his daughter which was refused, whereupon the elopement was decided upon.

Early Saturday evening, the couple secured a rig and a man to drive them to Stratford, but their absence was discovered very shortly after they had gone, and a telephone message was sent by the father to the Stratford police to hold the runaway couple on their arrival in Stratford.

The police were on the lookout and the couple were placed under arrest as they drove into the city. The father arrived shortly after, and took his daughter home with him. He decided to prosecute the man, so the latter was released.

It is stated that the latter asserted that it was his intention to marry the girl at the earliest possible moment.

## JIMMY'S TREAT FAILED

New York Theater Manager's Story  
of a Street Arab.

New York, March 26.—A mile of a boy, with neatly-patched knickerbockers and a patched coat that comes from want of nourishing food, plucked at the sleeve of George Kingsbury, manager of the Hippodrome, yesterday afternoon. "Say, mister, are you Mr. Dundy?" he inquired hesitatingly.

"No, son," replied the busy manager. "What do you want?"

"I want a seat for Granny down where de big bugs sit, an' one for me, self up in de peanut gallery, but de day in de cage can't sell 'em—says I'm toubtful for de space on de walk. Oh, I've got de mizama all right," he added, diving into a pocket and bringing out a handful of coppers, nickels and dimes.

Mr. Kingsbury was interested, and drawing the lad out, found that his name was Jimmy King, and that he lived in Harlem when he wasn't selling papers on Broadway.

"You see, it's dis way," he explained, "Granny, she's old an' sick an' takes care of me an' I thought it would cheer her up to see de elephants an' tigers an' Marceline an' things at de Hipp, an' so I saves me spare cash since New Year's. "We can't come; Granny died to-night."

## NATAL REBELLION QUICKLY CRUSHED

Colonial Troops Round Up Bel-  
ligerent Natives and  
Severely Punish.

London, March 26.—Natal papers received by the last mail contain detailed accounts of the operations against the natives who were in resistance to the poll tax recently imposed or failed to come in and pay.

The leaders at the beginning appear to have been Ethiopian Christians, as they are called, but later the movement seems to have been taken up by the natives generally.

The colonial authorities acted with great promptness, and not only avenged the deaths of the police inspector and trooper who were killed in the first affray, but were rounding up the natives all over the disaffected districts and compelling them to surrender their assegais and shields and bring in their cattle.

The colonial force at the disposal of the authorities were 3,300, with sixteen field guns, seventeen maxims, and a pom-pom section.

Martial law was proclaimed and correspondents were not allowed to accompany detachments in the field; in addition a censorship was established over the press and all persons, white or black, repeating rumors likely to cause uneasiness, were being arrested and punished.

Two whites were court-martialed and natives were sentenced to long terms of imprisonment and flogging, and several were shot.

The Durban correspondent of an English agency for putting into the cable office a despatch for transmission dealing with the troubles was arrested and taken before a magistrate, who discharged him after a warning and severe reprimand.

The impression of persons qualified to judge of the situation was that there was no organized resistance on the part of the natives, and that the colonial authorities lost their heads. The British regular troops were asked for and a battalion was sent to Maritzburg to restore confidence and overawe the natives, who, since the withdrawal of the British garrison, from the colony, had been able to communicate to the naval intelligence department some interesting general particulars of this forthcoming floating fortress.

The most remarkable innovation in this new battleship will be a return to yards and sails. She will carry two tall masts, fitted with light steel control platforms. On each of these a modern battleship with the most up-to-date armament, top-gallant sails and lower courses.

It will be difficult to the British naval mind to reconcile the very questionable utility of tacks and sheets to a modern battleship with the manifest disadvantages of so much additional topplance to deal with in clearing for action.

The new vessel is to have a displacement of 13,000 tons, and a speed of twenty-one knots is being aimed at. It is known that she is to embody all the lessons of the late war. This undoubtedly means that she will have a record of performance of heavy gunfire and very massive armor.

In appearance, this gigantic Japanese battleship will mark a striking departure. Not only has the ship been omitted from her design, but she has a "schooner bow."

The over-hang of the bows to the cutter is expected to keep the fore-part of the ship comparatively dry in a heavy sea.

## SCOTTY LAID BY HEELS

Death Valley Miner Charged With  
Shooting His Brother in Ambush.

San Francisco, March 26.—Scotty, the Death Valley miner who has been in the limelight because of his rapid trip across the country, and of his stories of a fabulously rich mine on the desert, was arrested here late last night on a warrant from San Bernardino, charging him with being concerned in the shooting of his brother Warren and ambushing a party of Boston mining men and experts who had hired him as a guide.

Scotty got bail after being in jail about four hours, and this afternoon he appeared at the Grand Opera House in a woolly melodrama. Tomorrow he must answer the charge made against him.

At San Bernardino Scotty's brother and another member of the party declare that Scotty arranged an ambush at Wingate Pass, and that it was planned to shoot a mining expert. In the confusion Warren Scott received a dangerous wound and will not be out for several weeks.

The theory of the Boston men is that Scotty did not want the expert to investigate his mine, and hence devised this ambush to frighten the party off. The ruse succeeded, for the entire party hastened back to San Bernardino. Scotty ridicules the charge, and says he can easily refute it.
