THE BRITISH ISLES TIED UP BY STORM.

London, Dec. 27. - The blizzard which commenced Christmas night continued throughout Great Britain. The country districts in most of the northern parts of the country are snowbound, trains are blocked, the roads are impassable, and isolated villages are temporarily cut off from communication with the neighboring towns. A number of deaths have been reported of pedestrians who were overtaken by snowstorms in the bleak Scottish hills. Telegraphic communication with the north of England and Scotland is generally interrupted, and steamer traffic across the channel and Irish Sea is greatly impeded. In some instances mail steamers had to suspend their trips owing to the fierceness of the gale and heavy fall of snow.
