

MOVE TO SETTLE REID CASES \$8,000 POOL TO BE RAISED

Story That the Defendants Are Ready to Settle the Claims and That the Lawyers for the Plaintiffs Are Willing—\$75,000 of Damage Suits Are Involved.

There is every possibility that the damage actions arising from the Reid disaster a year ago last July, when seven people lost their lives and as many more were badly injured, will never reach trial, and this despite the fact that several of the cases are even now set down at the assizes this week. It was stated on good authority that the Advertiser today that some time ago several of the plaintiffs, through their attorneys, went to the lawyers for W. J. Reid & Co., Peter Smirles & Co., Kernohan and Wilson and William Murray, and asked that some settlement be reached.

To Raise a Fund. After consideration, so the story goes, the defendants named decided, or practically did so, that there are still a few details to be arranged—to get together a fund of \$8,000, to be equally distributed among the various claimants, thirteen in number. Whether this arrangement will prove entirely satisfactory remains to be seen, but today over half a dozen prominent local lawyers are holding secret conferences in reference to the matter. It is understood that the pool mentioned is not looked upon by the defendants in the light of a settlement but more as charity, for it is held out that to prove liability in the cases at hand would be most difficult, and would possibly take years to settle.

Many Cases. There are seven Reid cases set

down at the assizes, six more than would be set down possibly in January, and two suits that have not as yet been entered, making fifteen in all.

The two claimants who have put in no claim, however, will not figure in the division of the pool, it is said.

The Damages Asked.

The amount mentioned in the Reid damage actions set down for trial this week is \$75,000, and is made up as follows:

Negotiations toward a settlement began last night and will probably be concluded today.

It is understood that the plaintiffs have all practically decided to accept the pool in the spirit it is supposed to be offered. However, a hitch arises somewhere, owing to the fact that one of the parties named as defendant in the suits has not yet agreed to donate his share of the pool.

"And if a jury finds the prisoner guilty of murder in the broadest sense, evidence such as suggested may result in a recommendation for clemency."

His lordship did not think it fair to the prisoner to decide which of the two doctors, Robinson or Clarke, were right in their surmises as to the importance of the Scotland testimony.

The prisoner, as Mr. Meredith says, might have exhibited symptoms prior to the murder which would lead a jury to believe it possible that at that time he was in a state wherein slight provocation would lead to serious consequences, his lordship continued.

A Serious Matter.

"I cannot feel that I would be doing my duty toward the prisoner at the bar if I hurried him to trial before he was prepared to properly defend himself."

"Until the grand jury brought in a true bill against the prisoner he had not the means of knowing that he would be called upon to defend his life, and he, therefore, is entitled to time."

His lordship acceded to Mr. Smith's request that in case Sergeant Morris could not conveniently leave England in January his deposition could be read to the jury.

"Can you be ready by January?" asked the chancellor of Mr. Meredith. "I feel quite certain that I can," was the reply.

Prisoner Arraigned.

Moir was brought into the court at 9:45. He was attired in a neat tweed suit, and appeared quite at ease.

If he was pleased over the postponement he gave no indication of the fact, and his face was expressionless as he was led downstairs to his cell.

As the attorneys for the defence left the court room, Mr. Wilkins, for the defence, leaned over the reporter's desk and said quite audibly:

"Not half bad, was it, eh?"
