REV. E. H. PEATFIELD PREACHES FIRST SERMON

New Pastor of First Congregational Church Greatly Impressed His Hearers.

Rev. E. H. Peatfield, the new pastor of the First Congregational Church, opened his ministry at this church yesterday morning. From the impression he made at his initial appearance, Mr. Peatfield has been regarded more favorably than this book of Psalms, because it is so human and so humanly practical. These psalms are the cry of a heart that is trying to live well rather than the product of some poetical genius. In them you find a wonderful knowledge side by side with a deep humility, a great tenderness, and yet severe condemnation.

Mr. Peatfield chose as his subject the First Psalm. "In the Psalm," said the speaker, "you see some of the inner workings of David's life; his grief over sin, his sincere repentance and his restoration to God. There is no book that has been regarded more favorably than this book of Psalms, because it is so human and so humanly practical. These psalms are the cry of a heart that is trying to live well rather than the product of some poetical genius. In them you find a wonderful knowledge side by side with a deep humility, a great tenderness, and yet severe condemnation."

At the morning service at Christ Church, Rev. R. S. W. Howard preached an eloquent sermon on "Travel."

At the Colborne Street Methodist Church last night, Rev. F. E. Malott preached the fourth of a series of sermons on "The Seven Deadly Sins."

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR UPPER SCHOOL WORK

Principal McCutcheon Explains the Grant Made by a Sarnia Man.

The Carter scholarships are for general proficiency in upper school work in the Collegiate.

Principal McCutcheon stated today that the prizes would be awarded for the aggregate marks in the faculty of education, honor matriculation and scholarship examinations in July.

"The grant is a most important one," said Mr. McCutcheon. "It is given for the most important work of the Collegiate, the upper school work, and will have a tendency to keep the students at school longer than otherwise. In addition, it will induce the student in the upper room to take more subjects. This, I think, will be of much benefit. The marks in every subject upon which they write will count for the scholarships, and consequently the student will write on every possible subject in order that he may obtain more marks. It will have a broadening effect upon the education of the students."

Mr. Carter is very liberal with scholarships in Sarnia, I understand, and is most fortunate in being considered by him in the distribution of his wealth."

STORY OF JESUS IS NO INVENTION
Rev. Dr. Johnson's Sermon Last Night in First Methodist Church.

At the anniversary service at the First Methodist Church last night Rev. Dr. Johnson, of Baltimore, spoke from the text Matthew viii, 16: "Ye shall know them by their fruits." "The Bible is not inspired by God, then it is the greatest imposture of the ages," so asserted Dr. Johnson with strong conviction. The master theologians of all the ages have drawn their inspiration from its pages, artists have taken the local of their masterpieces from Bible characters. Musicians, under its spell, have composed the greatest music which has ever been given down to posterity. It is the only national account that has yet been given of the creation. The Bible has been an interference with the literature of all the ages that to destroy it entirely would be to destroy all the existing libraries of the world.

"There are men," continued the speaker, "who disbelieve the inspiration of the Bible and claim that the story of Jesus is a fabrication. If this were so then the disciples must themselves have been greater than the greatest of all the philosophers of sacred or profane history, and the names of Homer and Plato and Socrates pale into insignificance beside the shining glory of the name of Christ. But Jesus died over nineteen hundred years ago, but today he is honored more and loved better than he was then, and so from year to year there grows more perfect the invisible supremacy of Jesus Christ."

At the anniversary services a request was made for \$1,000 to aid in reducing the parsonage debt. There was no attempt at a canvass, but at the close of the evening service it was found that something over that amount had been subscribed.

BRINGING MEN AND BOYS NEARER TO JESUS CHRIST

The Work of Brotherhood of St. Andrew Explained in Christ Church.

Mr. A. Birmingham, travelling secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, addressed a large audience at Christ Church last evening on the work of the society. The brotherhood, he pointed out, originated in St. James' Church, Chicago, 25 years ago, and at that time was intended to be purely local in its work. Its obligations only consist of promising to pray at least once every day for the extension of the work, to bring one man or boy nearer to Christ. The brotherhood, he explained, now has hundreds of thousands of members throughout the world.
