SIDE LIGHTS ON
MANY SPORTSTIGERS TO SECURE
CHAUCER ELLIOTT

As an Assistant Coach, the Sug-
gestion Has Been Made By
Sep. Dumoulin.

HIS CRITICISM OF TEAM

They Have No New Plays and Their
Old Ones Are of Very Little
Use, He Says.

Hamilton, Nov. 17.—Sep. Dumoulin,
the former Tiger captain, who is coach-
ing the Tigers in preparation for the
play-off with Varsity on Nov. 26, gave
the boys their first drill last evening,
and as a result of the workout and his
observations, he has confronted the Tiger
executive with the demand that Chaucer
Elliott, the Montreal coach, be engaged
at once as assistant coach for the ten
days between now and the Dominion final.

Dumoulin also made his report to the
club today as to the condition he found
the Tigers in. He said in part: "I find
that the material possessed by the club
is the best I have seen on a Tiger field
in a long time."

Lack Coaching.
"The boys lack coaching, however, and
are slow with what few plays they have,
while their old repertoire of tricks have
 dwindled away to nothing. The back
division is the best part of the team.
The wings, while possessing speed, are
weak in their tackling."

"I find that I can hardly hope to bring
the boys around to the best form in the
time allotted without assistance, and
would suggest that you lose no time in
securing Elliott."

"If he is secured I will take personal
charge of the half-backs, while he will
look after the wings and the line. I
will, introducing a half dozen new
ones, installation of aggressiveness in-
tackling will be my object."

Will Go After Elliott.
The Tigers will likely follow Dumoulin's
request.

Tiger will tonight face Dundas in a
practice game. Friday night they will
again turn out, and every night next
week.

Saturday they will attend the Varsity-
T.A.A. game in a body.

Dr. Barton and several of the Varsity
athletic directors were in Hamilton to-
day making arrangements with the Tiger
for the final game here on Nov. 26. It
was decided to place admission tickets
at 50 cents general, admission to reserved
seats at \$1 and \$2.

Increased bleacher accommodation
will be erected. The present accommoda-
tion is good for about 5,000 people, and
the additional space will provide for at
least 2,000 or 4,000.

PRO. HOCKEYISTS
REBEL AT LIMIT

Declare They Will Get Together
and Form a New League
This Season.

SALARY LIMIT ABSURD

Ottawa Will Try To Have \$5,000 Rule
Rescinded at Next Meeting—Bruce
Stuart Talks.

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—Despite the fact that
the National Hockey Association at last
Saturday's meeting recommended its
adoption, the opinion now prevails in the
capital that the \$5,000 salary limit is due
to cause a heap of trouble before mat-
ters are finally adjusted.

The constitution allows each team to
carry ten men, which means that each
player cannot receive much more than
\$500. On the average they may get this,
but no more.

Now, Renfrew and Ottawa paid last
season, respectively, \$12,000 and \$15,000.
On the average they may get this, but
not more. Renfrew cannot
hope to get the Patriks, Miller or Taylor
on that basis, and Ottawa would hardly
have the nerve to offer Stuart, Walsh,
Kerr or Small \$500 each.

Favor Limit.
Some of the Ottawa officers are in
favor of a salary limit, but others are
opposed, and at the next meeting of the
league the clause may be rescinded.

Members of the Ottawa team seem to
regard the salary limit as a big joke.
"No, I'm not going to play hockey at
all this winter," laughingly replied Bruce
Stuart, when questioned last night as to
his intention. "I am going up the bush
for the winter; there's more money in
shantying."

Another member of the Ottawa team
declared that the players would get to-
gether and form a new league of their
own.

GEORGE SMITH CANT
PLAY IN THE FINALS

It is hardly likely that George Smith,
the Tiger half, will figure in the Canadian
final. Smith's knee has come around in
nice style, but is still very weak, and
will hardly prove strong enough to per-
form the duties of his position.

After waiting in the cold until almost
midnight for the main event, a twenty-

Just as they were stepping into the
ring two deputy sheriffs notified the
promoters that the fight was off. There
was an approach to a riot when the
crowd learned that there would be no
fight, but order was restored when the
admission money was refunded.

Palatine station where they remained
until morning waiting for a train back
to Chicago.
